Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

The First Reading from Isaiah The prophet presents several of the paradoxes that are so much a part of the Christian life. God is far away, yet very near. Man is helpless, yet bound to act decisively for what he needs. God's ways are as high as the heavens, yet they must become the normal pattern of action for man.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul, thinking aloud to the Philippians, solves a question we all ask at times: when one has a Christian view of death, is it really better to live or die?

In the Gospel, Jesus chooses to be generous to the last as well as the first. Jesus shows compassion more in detail. God's feeling for the laborers quite consciously passes beyond the fact that some deserve more reward than others. Inasmuch as the wage for those who worked only one hour would be insufficient for them to feed their families, they are all rewarded equally, so that all can be saved from hunger.

Jesus says that the men who worked longest grumbled about an unfair deal. But, he asks, are we going to censure God because his actions don't conform to our rigid and self-regarding standards? St. Paul shows us that Christ bridges the gap between God's ways and men's, for Jesus' own way of living and actions are God's ways expressed in a man. St. Paul loved Jesus and centered his life on him. Thus he was able to go on living for the sake of his fellowmen.

We, too, if our lives are centered on Christ, can offer men and women the compassion, understanding, and care which far transcend mere legal justice. Therefore, let us pray for the grace to have the compassion and understanding to meet the needs of others.
