TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

The Church is a Vineyard, with Christ as the True Vine. In the First Reading, Israel is compared to a vineyard which fails to produce fruit, in spite of the fact that God has lavished the utmost love, care and attention on it. Sadly, it is destined to become a wilderness.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul is encouraging his converts to put their full trust in God. Fervent prayer of thanksgiving and petition will keep their hearts and minds on Christ. They should live exemplary Christian lives, following the teaching and example of their Apostle. Their reward will be peace of mind in this life and everlasting peace in the world to come.

The Gospel speaks of the infinite goodness, patience and mercy of God and also the infidelity and ingratitude of the chosen People of God. In the Old Testament, God chose the Jews to be His People and made covenant with them. But many times they failed in their relationship with God. Yet God was patient with them; again and again He pardoned their infidelities. He sent them prophet after prophet to invite them for conversion, but they maltreated these messengers of God and refused to listen to them. Finally God sent His own Son to them. But they put to him to death on the cross.

In God's plan of love and mercy, the death of Christ on the cross brought salvation and life to the world and opened the gates of God's Eternal Kingdom for all nations and races and today we Christians are the Chosen people of God. But we too many times fail to be faithful, grateful and obedient to God.

Therefore, let us sincerely pray for the grace to be faithful, grateful and obedient to God and produce good fruits of our Christian life.

Teaching your child to pray Make family time to reflect on Scripture together

Similar to making personal time for prayer, praying together as a family is a very enriching and spiritually healthy practice. Spend time reflecting on stores from the gospels, asking your children to describe the scene, or why Jesus said or did what he did in that passage. Conclude by asking everyone to make a short prayer of petition or thanksgiving to God.


Give your child prayer suggestions
