TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

Jesus teaches us how to reconcile our earthly commitments with our obligations to God. Today's Readings show that there need not be a conflict between fulfilling our civil obligations and our obligations to God.

In the First Reading, after the Jews had suffered through the Babylonian captivity, the Persian King, Cyrus, permitted them to return to their homeland. The Prophet calls Cyrus God's anointed servant, the only time in the Old Testament that a foreigner is given such a title, though Cyrus himself did not know the true God of Israel who raised him up to serve His interests.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul first thanks God the Father and the Son for the growth of the Thessalonians in the virtues of faith, love and hope. Their growth in these virtues is not and cannot be from their human efforts but purely a gift to them because God chose them to live a life of these virtues.

In the Gospel, Jesus, without answering the question of what is Caesar's and what is God's, tells the people that Caesar indeed reigns and that thus they are bound to pay the tax. Christ makes it very clear that we must do our duty in the world, not as opposed to our duty to God, but because of our duty to God. God has called us to his service; he has called each of us individually so that, through us men will come to recognize that there is a God. Therefore we cannot hide from our responsibility. We have our duties to be faithful and loyal to God. We also have our duties to our country by loyally obeying the just laws of the State, by paying all lawful taxes, and by contributing our share, whenever called on, toward the common good. Both St. Peter and St. Paul stress our obligation to be examples to all in our loyalty as citizens of the state.

So, let us sincerely pray for the grace, to be loyal citizens of the state and true and faithful Christians, all for the Glory of God and for the good of the people.
