February 14, 2021 SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

Today's Readings also speak of sickness. Leprosy is a terrible sickness, for it is a symbol of sin. We are all tainted with the leprosy of sin.

The First Reading tells us that Leprosy was the disease most dreaded by the ancient Jew, because it cut him off from the community and religious life of Israel. Our selection from Leviticus describes the ritual prescribed for one suffering from such a disease.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul asks that whatever Christians do, should be done for God's glory and the building up of the faith community.

In The Gospel, St. Mark describes how even the dreadful disease of leprosy yields to Jesus' power. We also get an insight into the very human compassion of the Lord for those who are suffering. Jesus cleansed the leper and restored him to his world; then the man could enjoy life again, work, company, family and friends. Jesus set up God's Kingdom. In that Kingdom, we are all sinners who have been restored to God's favor.

It seems unusual for Jesus to tell the leper to keep secret the news of his cure. Good News, after all, is for sharing. Yet Jesus had a profound reason for wanting the leper to keep this matter confidential. Jesus is the Messiah, The One who comes to make all things new. His Messianic Secret was meant to be revealed, not at the moment of the leper's cure, but at the hour when He would stretch out His arms upon the Cross.

We are to proclaim The Good News of The Lord to the world around us. This is our calling as Stewards and Evangelizers. Yet our proclamation has to be authentic. Our faith does not promise a quick fix to life's problems. Rather we invite others into nothing less than a sharing in the suffering and death of The Lord through which, and only through which, do we find meaning, purpose and direction for our lives.

We are called to imitate the healing and compassionate Jesus. Let us sincerely pray today for all our sick brothers and sisters for their healing, recovery and good health and also that we become very compassionate, understanding & kind towards all our suffering and sick brothers and sisters.

l turn to you, Lord, in time of trouble, and you fill me with the joy of salvation. Psalm 32

This Wednesday, February 17, we will offer Mass with Imposition of Ashes at 7:00 AM, 9:00 AM and 7:00 PM.

To "rub" ashes on the forehead in the form of a cross has been suspended for this year in light of the pandemic. So the ashes will be distributed by "sprinkling" them on each person's head. If you are not comfortable about this form, you are not required to receive them.

Daily Mass & Rosary

Daily Mass will be celebrated from Monday through Friday at 9 AM. The Rosary will also be prayed before Mass starting at 8:35 AM.

Stations of the Cross

This traditional Lenten devotion will be prayed every Friday at 9:30 AM.

Fasting During Lent

As a sign of regret for sin and rededication to God, Catholics observe two simple obligations about fasting during Lent: First, if we are 14 years or older, (and in good health), we don't eat meat on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent. Second, those of us who are between the ages of 18 and 59 have the special obligation to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday: we eat only one full meal that day and take no solid foods between meals. That means our other regular meals are of much smaller portions, with no snacking in between.

(But remember, health issues excuse a person from these obligations.)
