**THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT**

**Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré**

Today, The Third Sunday of Advent, is traditionally known as Gaudete Sunday. “Rejoice” sets a tone of joyful anticipation of The Lord’s Birth and Second Coming. The Lord our God tells all of us, also to be always happy and joyful, because, we Christians are people of hope, and people of Resurrection. Jesus Christ Our lord is the reason for all our joy and happiness.

In The First Reading, The Prophet Isaiah, brings words of promise and encouragement to the Jews in exile in Babylon. But these words were fully and truly realized only when Christ The Messiah came. Christ applied the first two verses of this text to Himself when He first preached in the synagogue of Nazareth.

In The second Reading, writing to The Thessalonians, St. Paul counsels happiness, prayer and thanksgiving to all who wait for Christ’s Coming.

In The Gospel, St. John The Baptist provides the classic example of witnessing: he points not to himself, but Christ The Light coming into the world. He knew his call; he knew his mission; he his identity. He was absolutely sincere to the role, he was called to play. His life of austerity, integrity and holiness was enigmatic to many groups of people. Hence they curiously asked him, “who are you?”. St. John The Baptist was transparent in his reply, “I am neither Elijah nor The Messiah; but a messenger sent by God to prepare the world for the coming of The Messiah.” Thus he kept his mission ever clear before his mind and never overstepped his claims.” Christ should be made known and Christ should become great” was his motivating force.

Each and every one of us is called to play the role of St. John The Baptist. So, let us sincerely pray for the grace, to follow the great example of St. John The Baptist and to prepare ourselves properly and worthily, both for the celebration of Christmas and for the coming of Christ, at the end of the world, through a life of true conversion, a life of prayer, penance and true charity to those most in need.

OUR LADY  
of Guadalupe

The life-sized image of Our Lady of Guadalupe was a recent gift to parish by an anonymous doner. (The Knights of Columbus acted as intermediary. One of them made the frame.) This is one of the most honored images of Our Lady in the world.

On December 9, 1531, a 57-year-old Aztec, Juan Diego, saw the Blessed Mother on a hill in Mexico City. She told Juan to have a church built in her honor.

When Juan went to ask his bishop about this, the bishop—who did not understand the Indian dialect—did not believe in the vision Juan described. Three days later Mary appeared again to Juan Diego, and this time she gave him a sign for the bishop. "Take these roses to the bishop," she said, as she arranged in his cloak beautiful roses which she had Juan Diego pick from the hillside although it was winter. When he met with the bishop again, Juan Diego opened his cloak, and out dropped the roses. On the cloak there remained an image of Mary as she had appeared to him. Mary appeared to Juan dressed as an Aztec woman to show her love and compassion to an oppressed group of people. Mary had heard the prayers and pain of these people, and she came to give them hope. Mary's visit to Guadalupe is a reminder that God will remember his mercy for all people. In Mary's song of joy, the Magnificat, she praises God because he has put down the mighty, exalted the lowly, filled the hungry, and sent the rich away empty. People honor Our Lady of Guadalupe because they recognize her motherly concern for them.
