

Bible Study Lesson: *Sin Separates, God Restores* - 12/31/2025

Focus Scripture (NIV – Isaiah 59:1–8)

1 Surely the arm of the Lord is not too short to save, nor his ear too dull to hear.
2 But your iniquities have separated you from your God; your sins have hidden his face from you, so that he will not hear.
3 For your hands are stained with blood, your fingers with guilt. Your lips have spoken falsely, and your tongue mutters wicked things.
4 No one calls for justice; no one pleads a case with integrity. They rely on empty arguments, they utter lies; they conceive trouble and give birth to evil.
5 They hatch the eggs of vipers and spin a spider's web. Whoever eats their eggs will die, and when one is broken, an adder is hatched.
6 Their cobwebs are useless for clothing; they cannot cover themselves with what they make. Their deeds are evil deeds, and acts of violence are in their hands.
7 Their feet rush into sin; they are swift to shed innocent blood. They pursue evil schemes; acts of violence mark their ways.
8 The way of peace they do not know; there is no justice in their paths. They have turned them into crooked roads; no one who walks along them will know peace.

Lesson Objectives

- Recognize that sin separates humanity from God.
- Understand the seriousness of injustice, deceit, and violence described in Isaiah.
- Reflect on the need for confession and repentance to restore fellowship with God.
- Prepare hearts for the Sunday School lesson on 1 John 1:5–10 and 2:1–6, which emphasize walking in the light and confessing sins.

Verse Breakdown and Insights

- **Verses 1–2:** God's power to save is not limited; separation comes from human sin, not divine weakness.
- **Verses 3–4:** Sin corrupts speech and actions, leading to injustice and dishonesty.
- **Verses 5–6:** Sin produces destructive results—like venomous eggs and useless webs—symbolizing futility and danger.
- **Verses 7–8:** Sin leads to violence, injustice, and the absence of peace. Crooked paths represent lives turned away from God's truth.

- **1 John 2:1–6** assures us that Jesus is our advocate and calls us to obey His commands.
- Together, these passages highlight the seriousness of sin and the hope of restoration through Christ. Studying Isaiah prepares us to appreciate the fullness of God's grace revealed in the New Testament.
