As the last Monday of May arrives, flags lower, and a quiet reverence settles across towns and cities nationwide. Memorial Day is not a celebration—it is a commitment. A solemn promise that the lives lost in service to our nation will never be forgotten.

In 2025, Memorial Day carries the same weight it always has: a day of collective remembrance. It asks nothing more than our time, our reflection, and our gratitude. And it offers us a chance to reconnect with the values our fallen fought and died to protect—freedom, unity, and duty.

Memorial Day has its origins in the wake of the Civil War—America's deadliest conflict. Known then as Decoration Day, communities across the country began honoring Union and Confederate soldiers alike by decorating their graves with flowers, flags, and personal tributes. On May 30, 1868, the first official national observance was held at Arlington National Cemetery, where both Union and Confederate soldiers are buried side by side.

Over the years, as America found itself called to battle again and again—from the trenches of France to the shores of the Pacific, from the jungles of Vietnam to the deserts of the Middle East—the meaning of Memorial Day deepened. It became not just a remembrance of past wars, but an enduring tribute to all who gave their lives in every era of service.

Today, the red poppies, folded flags, and 21-gun salutes remind us that the freedoms we enjoy came at a great and personal cost.

Somewhere between cookouts and road trips, Memorial Day risks being lost to convenience. But it is not about the unofficial start of summer. It is about remembering a young Marine who never came home. A nurse who volunteered and died on foreign soil. A pilot, a medic, a soldier—each with stories that ended in sacrifice so that ours could continue.

We owe it to them to pause, to reflect, and to teach the next generation what this day truly means.

While Memorial Day honors all fallen service members, this year also marks the 81st anniversary of D-Day—the largest amphibious invasion in history and a turning point in World War II. On June 6, 1944, more than 73,000 Americans joined Allied forces on the beaches of Normandy. Thousands died that day, but their sacrifice helped liberate a continent and end a global tyranny.

D-Day remains one of the most enduring examples of courage, coordination, and commitment in military history. And it serves as a reminder: Memorial Day does not honor just one generation, one war, or one branch. It honors them all.

So this Memorial Day, visit a grave. Share a story. Listen to a veteran. Lower a flag. Raise your heart in gratitude. Whether in quiet prayer or public ceremony, what matters is that we remember.

Because in remembering, we honor. And in honoring, we ensure that the names engraved in stone are never erased





The tradition of placing flags on the graves of fallen soldiers can be traced

back to the American Civil War. It is a deeply ingrained practice in American culture, and it is a way to honor and remember those who have made the ultimate sacrifice in service to our country.

When a flag is placed at the grave of a fallen soldier, it represents much more than just a simple decoration. SUN SAFETY

- Limit your sun exposure between the hours of 10 am and 4 pm
- · Get some sun-protective clothing
- Wear a hat and sunglasses with UV ray protection
- · Replace any sweat-saturated items with dry clothing
- Apply sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15
- · Apply sunscreen on both sunny and cloudy days
- Apply sunscreen every two hours, or after swimming or sweating

HEAT SAFETY

- Reduce the intensity of activities 15 minutes or longer in length Make sure you are well-hydrated
- Limit outdoor physical activity in a place with a warmer climate Allow your body to acclimate to the change in temperature

SAFETY ON THE ROAD

- Driving and texting don't mix
- Never drink and drive
- · Plan your outing...know the area and pack accordingly
- · Perform a vehicle check-up
- Slow dow...enjoy the drive
- Get a good night's sleep the night prior and take frequent rest stops
- Keep emergency supplies in your vehicle

POOLSAFETY

- · Never leave a child unsupervised in or near a pool or spa
- · Teach children 4 and older to swim
- Avoid inflatable swimming aids such as "floaties"
- If possible, install a 4ft tall or higher fence around all sides of the pool Do not use a pool or spa if there are broken or missing drain covers
- · Do not dive in less than nine feet of water
- Always employ a feet-first entry
- · Be aware of sandbars

PROTECT AGAINST BUGS

- · Use insect repellents to guard against ticks
- Wear long sleeve shirts and long pants when going outside Never leave stagnant pools of water around the house Avoid using scented soaps or perfumes

FIRE SAFETY

- Never use gasoline to start a BBQ grill or campfire
- · BBQ grills are meant for outdoor use only
- Ensure charcoal is cool and completely out before disposing
- Hot surfaces are not limited to cooking surfaces
- Build campfires in appropriate areas

Some of the best opportunities include:

- · Trout, bass, yellow perch, and other gamefish in lakes
- Shad along the Lower Columbia River shoreline
- Flounder, sole, lingcod, and other bottomfish in Puget Sound
- · Surfperch and rockfish from jetties on the Washington coast

Not all species are included in Free Fishing Weekend. A license is still required for all shellfish, salmon, steelhead, sturgeon, and halibut. All other fishing rules and regulations remain in effect.

Look up! The Strawberry Moon appears on June 11. Will the last full Moon of spring be strawberry red?

June's full Moon—typically the last full Moon of spring or the first of summer—has traditionally been called the Strawberry Moon. While strawberries certainly are a reddish-pink color and are roundish in shape, the origin of the name "Strawberry Moon" has nothing to do with the Moon's hue or appearance. A Moon usually appears reddish when it's close to the horizon because the light rays must pass through the densest layers of the atmosphere.

This "Strawberry Moon" name has been used by Native American Algonquian tribes that live in the northeastern United States as well as the Ojibwe, Dakota, and Lakota peoples to mark the ripening of "June-bearing" strawberries that are ready to be gathered. The Haida term Berries Ripen Moon reflects this as well. As flowers bloom and early fruit ripens, June is a time of great abundance for many.




