# PRESIDENTS DAY

Presidents Day, officially known as Washington's Birthday, was established in 1879 as a federal holiday to honor George Washington's birthday (February 22). It was originally celebrated only in the District of Columbia but expanded nationwide in 1885.

### How It Became Presidents Day

In 1971, the Uniform Monday Holiday Act moved the celebration to the third Monday in February to create more three-day weekends.

The holiday was never officially changed to "Presidents Day" at the federal level, but many states and the public began recognizing it as a day to honor both George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday is February 12.

Over time, it became a general celebration of all U.S. presidents, though the focus still leans toward Washington and Lincoln.

### How It's Remembered Today

Government Closures: Federal offices, banks, and many schools close for the holiday.

Sales & Promotions: Retailers take advantage of the long weekend with major sales events.

Educational Programs: Schools may have lessons on U.S. presidents, especially Washington and Lincoln.

Community Events: Some places hold reenactments, parades, or historical presentations.

Federal Observance: It remains officially "Washington's Birthday," though many Americans informally call it "Presidents Day."






