

WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES CENTER OUR LIVES AS WE ANTICIPATE AND THEN CELEBRATE CHRIST'S RESURRECTION

Formed into a new body in Christ, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.






Good Friday, two services, April 15
Participate in the Stations of the Cross at
noon when we are reminded of Jesus' death
and the sacrifice he made to redeem us.

During the **Adoration of the Cross at 7 p.m.,** life and death stand side by side. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the

cross, we pray for the whole world, always with the promise that the cross around which we assemble is a tree of life. We depart silently and anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil.

Easter Vigil, 7 p.m., April 16

This is the night of salvation. Beginning at 7 p.m. at the fire pit in front of the church, we gather around fire and word, then process into the sanctuary to proclaim through story and song that ours is a God who continuously brings life out of death.



On this night, we experience again the heart of God's baptismal promise and the center of our faith: we are claimed and cleansed, renewed in the death and resurrection of Christ.

During this special service, we will welcome **Abby and Sam Wieck into the body of Christ through baptism**, and Abby will take her first communion. Abby and Sam are the daughter and son of Janette Rodecap and Jeremy Wieck.



Easter Sunday, two services, April 17

We gather together with joy during services at 8 a.m. and 9:30 a.m.

IMMANUEL'S PANDEMIC PROTOCOLS EASE



Immanuel's Pandemic Advisory Task Force continues to follow guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control while tracking local conditions. At this time, there are no COVID patients in intensive care units at area hospitals, and reported COVID infections have declined.

That's all good news so, while masks still will be required in our building for a while (N95 or KN95 masks recommended), some pandemic protocols and restrictions that have been in place at Immanuel will be relaxed.

- When the weather is nice, coffee hour hosts can choose to set up outside or in Luther Hall.
- Small groups are welcome to share meals at Immanuel. Examples would be funeral
 meals and the meal during Immanuel's upcoming Earth Day retreat (see the story
 about that in this issue). For the time being, we still will avoid full congregational
 potlucks or other meals that would pack Luther Hall with people. But if current
 trends hold, we should be able to return to sharing congregational meals together
 soon.
- Beginning this Sunday, April 3, ushers will once again carry the communion bread and wine down the center aisle after the offertory.

Beginning with Palm Sunday, the congregation will once again:

- Sing songs and responses that had most recently been sung by a cantor.
- Share the Peace of the Lord with each other, but in ways that avoid direct physical contact (peace signs, waves, quiet greetings, big smiles behind our masks).

The task force members emphasize that these guidelines may change if COVID cases spike in the Kansas City metro. They send their sincere thanks for everything the people of Immanuel have done and will continue to do to keep all who enter our building safe and healthy.

Thanks to the Prayer Team for encouraging us as we travel our Lenten journey.


THANK YOU AND GODSPEED, PASTOR ANN


LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES FOR KIDS AND ADULTS CONTINUE

Immanuel Sunday School families receive lessons each week via email. Lenten Activity packages that Sunday School families received included a Story Garden Bag. The bag contained 12 separate bags, each with a Bible reading, short devotion, prayer and meaningful object. The objects can be added to a "story garden" on certain days during Lent, starting with Ash Wednesday and continuing through Easter. Families also received several other activity ideas to enrich their Lenten experience.

As the weather warms, kids and parents will gather after worship on the east playground. After Easter, Sunday School families still will receive lessons via email, but we will also try to have music or an activity on the playground after worship. 



Women in White Coats tells the story of three pioneering women who, despite countless obstacles, earned medical degrees and paved the way for other women to do the same. Though different in personality and circumstance, together these women built women-run hospitals and

teaching colleges, creating medical care for women and by women for the first time.

STEERING COMMITTEE IDENTIFIES PRIORITIES



The work of the Immanuel Steering Committee continues as the group identifies immediate priorities.

"Now that the congregation has seen and can pick up copies of *Our Vision for Ministry,* the Steering Committee members have spent the past few months soliciting feedback from individuals and working groups within the congregation," says Pastor Micah.

"Using the responses, we're crafting specific recommendations for how we can begin putting our vision into action, as well as outlining a long-term plan for continuing that work," he adds.

Among the goals is empowering Immanuel's new Committee on Justice and Peace. That committee already includes eight members who will begin meeting to discern how to get input from the congregation about its initial direction.

There are many volunteer opportunities at Immanuel. For example:



The event, sponsored by the Adult Forum Committee and the Prayer Team, will begin with a program by **Rabbi Moti Rieber**, followed by a garden tool and plant exchange, and an art experience based on the work of artist **Andy Goldsworthy**.

Rieber is the executive director of **Kansas Interfaith Action**, a statewide, multi-faith issue-advocacy organization that works on a variety of issues, including climate justice. A lifelong activist on peace, social justice and environmental issues, he will bring a prophetic voice to the role faith can, and must, play in saving Earth.

Gardeners and green-thumb wannabes are invited to bring their unused tools, pots and plants to the back parking lot for the garden exchange, which will follow Rieber's presentation.

UKRAINIANS NEED OUR HELP

No food. No water. No electricity. And Russian shelling is constant.

That's the situation faced by many people in Ukraine. Others who have fled the war zone are separated from family and have left all they have and many they know behind.



Lutheran Disaster Response continues working with companion churches in Ukraine, Poland, Slovakia and Romania, as well as with ecumenical partners such as Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies, such as food, blankets, water, hygiene kits, medicine, and psychosocial and pastoral care. They also are ensuring that people in Roma communities and foreign nationals in marginalized groups are treated with respect and dignity as they seek safety.
