"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear." 1 John 4:18a

There are times when a healthy dose of fear is a good thing. When you're camping in bear country, it's important to take simple precautions, such as hanging up your food so you don't wake up in the middle of the night with a bear helping itself to your provisions. When you're driving in a snowstorm, it's best to slow down so you don't spin out. Living through a global pandemic, it's a good idea to wear a mask and get vaccinated, if you're able, to keep yourself and others safe.

These are good things to keep in mind, but not all fear is created equal. A healthy dose of fear can keep us safe, but when we allow fear to govern our lives, it can have the opposite effect. Unchecked fear of those who are different can lay the groundwork for prejudice and hate. A fear of change can lead us to stagnation instead of growth. Such fears are understandable, especially when we consider how much brokenness there is in the world.

It's into this world of danger that the gospel speaks. Through the perfect love of God revealed to us in Christ Jesus, fear is answered with hope, division is answered with reconciliation, sin is met with forgiveness, death gives way to new life.

Whatever reason we have to fear, in Christ we have an even greater reason to have hope.

GET READY TO FEED THE HUNGRY HUNDREDS BY DONATING SACK LUNCH ITEMS



Feeding the Hungry Hundreds is the theme of the 2021 God's Work Our Hands service weekend, Sept. 11-12 at Immanuel.

One activity planned for the weekend is a long-time favorite — packing sack lunches for needy people, especially children and the homeless, who are served by Metro Lutheran Ministry and may have no other source of nourishment.

"We first introduced the sack-lunch-packing event several

years ago, with the goal of gathering enough items to pack 500 sack lunches. But thanks to your generosity, we packed more than 600 lunches that first year," recalls Karen Bame, a Social Ministry Committee member. "We increased the goal by 100 sack lunches every year since then, and you always have far exceeded it. For 2019, our goal was 700 sack lunches, and you donated items to pack more than 800 brown-bag meals."

That's why, as we joyously return to in-person ministry after more than a year apart, **our** goal is to gather enough items to pack 1,000 sack lunches.

"It's an ambitious goal, but a worthy one," Karen says. "The people of Immanuel always step up when there is a need and, since we took a year off from the sack-lunch ministry because of COVID-19, this is an opportunity to extend extra kindness to the many hungry hundreds." To create 1,000 sack lunches, we will need:

- 1,000 tuna salad or chicken salad kits, which are available at Dollar Tree stores.
- 1,000 Slim Jims or beef jerky sticks.
- 1,000 snacks (granola bars, or individual bags of Cheez-Its, chips, pretzels or cookies).
- 1,000 pre-packaged cups of fruit or applesauce.
- 1,000 bottles of water.

Please add these items to your weekly shopping list between now and Sept. 12, and place your donations in the purple bins in the main hallway on the sanctuary level. You'll see updates about how many of each item we still need in upcoming Weekly Announcements emails.

During July, several Immanuel families joined those who sponsor needy young people through Immanuel's global mission




