If you had told me a year ago that before long getting a haircut would be a significant moral dilemma, I would have been very confused. To be honest, I'm still a little confused as to why it's such a dilemma, and not just with haircuts, but with going to a crowded bar, or going to the zoo, or vacationing in places filled with other people. Not long ago, these were totally normal things to do without a second thought, but right now, in the middle of a pandemic, they are not the same.

It's not that I don't understand the urge to return to some semblance of normalcy, or the need to get out of the house for a few moments to restore one's sanity—I get it! Right now, every time we walk out our front doors, we need to make a decision, weighing the necessity of our trips, balancing our own needs against the needs of others, and what we've seen happening in our country over the past four or five months has been clear: we, as a culture, as a nation, do not value community. We prioritize self over others, we think about how things might affect us, and ignore the impacts our choices might have on someone else, especially if we can avoid seeing that impact for ourselves.

From the President



We live in challenging times. Covid-19 has upended the lives of many people here in the United States and throughout the world. Facing the threat of extinction has had a huge impact on the way we live, and the future remains uncertain. There is talk of an emerging "new normal" but no one knows for sure what that means, what it will look like. Change is all around us and, sometimes, with lightening speed.

Change can be difficult, especially when it comes out of nowhere and is so disruptive. It is easy to become overwhelmed and full of despair. This is especially true for people infected with the virus, their loved ones, and those in health care that treat them. This is also true for the unemployed, the uninsured, and food hungry. And then there are the many families finding themselves having to juggle working at home with parenting duties that include home schooling their children. There are people with elderly parents isolated in senior centers and nursing homes, unable to be physically present.

Six months into this pandemic and what have we learned? We have learned of our capacity to change radically in response to an emergency situation. Who can forget the photo of a vacant Times Square in New York City? It's good to know evacuations can occur so quickly! There are many other examples of communities, states, countries working together swiftly and responsibly to save lives.

We don't have to look far for an example. Pastor Sievenpiper and the Congregation Council early on moved swiftly and responsibly to close the church to in-person gatherings, including worship services. More recently, Pastor created an Advisory Committee of congregation members to review the Covid-19 plan put in place months ago. This group will advise when/how to re-open. Updates will be provided by constant contact emails, announcements, and postings. Watch for these. Many of Immanuel's ministries have moved from facility-based to home-based. Council and Immanuel's staff are working to ensure individuals and families are well-cared for during this transition. We maintain contact with every member through a Tele-Care Ministry Program. From these conversations, we learn of needs and try our best to help out. People seems to appreciate the calls, notes and cards, and it's fair to say that relationships between and among members are deepening. This is a good thing!

Immanuel is working to expand and to improve its digital presence. An obvious change was moving "live" worship from Pastor's office into the sanctuary. As Pastor and others continue to make technology improvements, more offerings will be possible and made available.

While Council grapples with the "new" normal of church and what it means for Immanuel, staff and some members are engaged in community service. This work varies widely, but common is preparing "to go" meals at home and dropping them off to a location serving the homeless, e.g., The Gathering Table. Other efforts include making personal hygiene kits, buying new/used clothing items, preparing devotional booklets, and sending thank you cards to front-line heath care workers, to name a few.

People have become acutely aware that the well-being of everyone depends on the well-being of each of us. This is another good thing!

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights of the July 21, 2020, Council Meeting

- Lori Kueker (MLM liaison) has been in opening discussions with MLM on their plan for this year's MLM Christmas Store. ILC's Christmas Store Committee and Pastor will be working with MLM to determine the extent of our participation.
- As previously reported Immanuel received roughly \$26,300 under the Federal Government's Payroll Protection Plan. ILC will easily have sufficient salary expenditures to qualify under the forgiveness plan. Working with Miller Management ILC will prepare the necessary forgiveness documents once the Federal instructions have been published.
- The Council has begun an ongoing discussion on what it means to be church leaders during the pandemic and beyond. We are using studies written by Carey Nieuwhof outlining 7 current trends and 11 traits of churches that may impact our future. The goal is to try and be proactive in preparing for the new normal.








CONGRATULATIONS ROBERT
