PARISH NEWS



Eight months ago, we made the difficult decision to suspend in-person ministry at Immanuel. At the time, I thought it was going to last a couple of months at the most, and by the middle of summer, we would return to more familiar patterns of church life.

Unfortunately, that didn't happen, and while we've new ways of being the church together, there's a lot that we can't really replace. Coffee hours, pot lucks, getting caught up in conversation as we linger in the narthex—these are all important parts of our life together as the people of God, and there's no substitute for them.

Perhaps the most notably absent in the midst of a pandemic is fasting from communion during our Sunday worship services. I've gotten a number of questions wondering why we're not celebrating communion during our online worship, as some other communities have been. That inconsistency between congregations can be confusing, since unlike some other synods that have made a recommendation one way or another, Bishop Candea of the Central States Synod, has encouraged this discernment locally.

One of the most important parts of my call to Immanuel is the faithful celebration of the sacraments, and after a lot of prayerful discernment, I do not believe that virtual or remote communion is a theologically sound practice.

Holy Communion is fundamentally a shared meal, something recognizable as a staple food and a festive drink blessed by God and shared with all who hunger. Generally, this takes the form of bread and wine, although some localities might use different elements, but each community celebrates with the same elements. If we were to celebrate in front of a screen in our own homes, we would not be sharing those elements in common—we might even be celebrating at different times, depending on when people watched the worship stream on Youtube. It wouldn't be recognizable as a shared meal.

Additionally, central to holy communion is that this meal is a gift. When we celebrate at church, we use bread that's been made for this purpose, prepared by the Altar Guild for the people in this place. Wine is bought with money that's collected during the offering. All these communal acts of worship provide a meal that feeds anyone who hungers for the grace of God. These gifts are freely given; no one is expected to provide their own meal, instead we're all fed with the abundance of the community. Without these communal acts, much of the context that gives meaning to the Eucharist is stripped away, leaving an expectation that everyone must provide their own meal to participate. A small portion of bread and wine might seem insignificant for some members of the community, but it could exclude people from the table of God's grace.

I recognize that we may not all be of one mind on this, and I encourage you to reach out to me if you want to have deeper conversation about this. As our fast continues in the face of this pandemic, we are still offering communion in small groups outside at Immanuel. It's an imperfect solution, but it's the best we have found until we can safely gather together again— a day I am eagerly awaiting.

From the President





HOLY COMMUNION AT IMMANUEL

We are offering service of Holy Communion at Immanuel's back parking lot. Group sizes will need to be limited, to allow for distance between us, so please sign up for a spot ahead of time by clicking this link: <u>https://reopen.church/r/sRh0T9Ql</u>.

We're doing our best to mitigate the risk of gathering, and when we come together in these days of pandemic, there is a risk of spreading COVID-19. To help us limit that risk, we ask that you to keep the following in mind:

- Please do not attend if you:
 - have tested positive for COVID-19, and have had any symptoms within the last 14 days
 - have had COVID-like symptoms (e.g., fever, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, etc.) within the last 72 hours
 - $\circ~$ have had close contact with someone who has tested positive within the last 14 days
- Masks must be worn over your nose and mouth
- Please practice physical distancing, keeping 10 feet of separation from other people (aside from family members)
- Please practice safe hygiene while among other people (e.g., coughing and sneezing into your elbow)
- Bathrooms will not be available for use, as the church building will not be open
- Please do not attend if you have not registered.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights of the November 17, 2020, Council Meeting

- Participation in the 2021 Youth Works (YW) Program Pastor reported that the COVID-19 Advisory Committee has agreed to explore the opportunity to host the 2021 Youth Works program, but will not agree to anything dangerous. Much of their decision may hinge on the availability of vaccine roll out information. The ILC position has been communicated to YW.
- Pastor presented his Preliminary Sanctuary Stream Upgrade Plan to enhance on-line coverage of live worship services, now and in a post COVID-19 environment. It calls for three cameras and associated media totaling roughly \$4,455. The Council approved a motion authorizing use of Evangelism Account 2450 funds totaling \$2,266. Pastor will contact the Memorials Commission for approval to use the Memorial Fund to cover the balance of the cost. The cameras would be located as follows:
 - One balcony camera to cover the pulpit, font, table, and similar action.
 - A second balcony wide-angle camera to cover the chancel.
 - And a fixed camera focusing on the organ and choir.
- Mary Jo Moore has received a letter of resignation from Janie Fee. Following discussion Mason Carey moved and Lynden Peters seconded a motion to accept her resignation, creating a vacancy on the Council. The motion carried.
- President Moore further advised that Linda Fewell has agreed to fill the vacated position. Mason Carey moved and Deborah Crawford seconded a motion to appoint Linda Fewell to the vacated position effective December 1, 2020. The motion carried.


