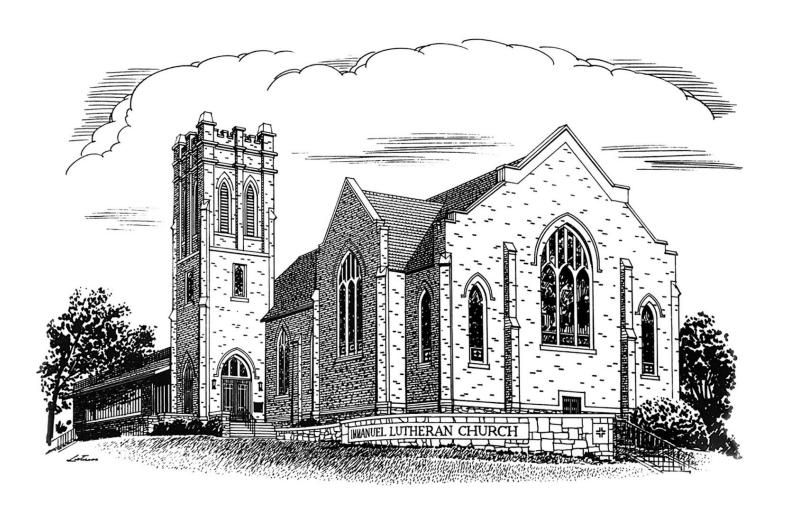

IMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES

February 21, 2021, VIA ZOOM

Due to COVID-19, in compliance with the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines and on the recommendation of Pastor's Advisory Committee, this year's annual meeting was held via Zoom. Previously, an electronic version of the 2020 Annual Report had been made available to members of the congregation.

- 1. A roll call of those joining the meeting via Zoom was captured by Connie Benolkin and Kathy Linder. Their tally resulted in seventy (70) voting members in attendance. Having determined a quorum was present, President Moore called the meeting to order at approximately 10:24 am. President Moore also laid out the Zoom ground rules for conducting the meeting.
- 2. Connie Benolkin moved, and Lynden Peters seconded a motion to approve the meeting agenda. The motion carried.
- 3. Pastor Sievenpiper led the opening prayer.
- 4. President Moore reported that the Congregation Council approved the 2020 Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes during the first scheduled Council meeting following the 2020 Annual Meeting. The 2020 Congregational Meeting Minutes appear on page 3 of the 2020 Annual Report.

5. Reports

a. Pastor Sievenpiper's Report (page 12 of the Annual Report) – Pastor emphasized the impact COVID-19 had on 2020. Following CDC guidelines, in-person gatherings, including worship, were suspended in late March. Shortly after that, we went online with worship services, first from pastor's office and later from the sanctuary. An Advisory Committee was formed to focus on COVID-19 policy, culminating in a three-phase reopening plan. Pastor gave a brief description of the process, which has been made available through our weekly announcements. The process is driven by decreasing infection rates over designated time periods. Presently, if the metrics continue to decline, he felt we could begin limited reopening as early as mid-March.

Pastor is developing a plan (using funds from the Memorials Commission, the Evangelism Fund and an appeal to the Synod) to expand live-streaming capabilities from the chancel. This capability will become an ongoing part of our worship services. To that end, he asked for volunteers to cover the production during services. He is preparing guidelines and training for interested participants.

He mentioned that the Steering Committee work was also delayed due to the uncertainty COVID-19 brought to planning for the future. Work has restarted, and he hopes to have a first draft of a vision for our ministry sometime in the spring. Following its release, there will be time for comments, suggestions and questions from the whole congregation.

b. Congregation President's Report (page 11 of the Annual Report) – President Mary Jo Moore also addressed the impact of COVID-19 on ILC's administration. She highlighted the creation of a telecare ministry to supplement the normal in-person support and communications. It involves members calling members, sending cards and other forms of communication.

She mentioned that ILC applied for and received a \$26,000 loan under the federal government's 2020 Payroll Protection Plan (PPP). The loan covered eight weeks of salaries, and we will follow the application process for loan forgiveness in 2021. Moore also mentioned there may be a second round of loans available in 2021 and that the council will look into applying if we are eligible.

c-d. Financial Reports (pages 16-32 of the Annual Report) – Treasurer Kathy Linder assumed the office in 2020 and offered a special thanks to Mindy Rash for all of the training she provided. Linder also mentioned a gained appreciation for all who are involved in the day-to-day administration of ILC.

Financial Secretary Rick Sundell advised that 2020 giving statements were sent out the first week of February. He asked that anyone who has not received a statement to please call the office.

President Mary Jo Moore pointed out that Immanuel financial reports were available in the Annual Report and asked if there were any questions. There being none, we moved to the next agenda item.

- e. Lynden Peters reviewed the Endowment Trust Fund (ETF) report and indicated that the fund started the year at \$510,000 and finished 2020 at \$548,000, despite pulling \$17,000 from the ETF to support Immanuel's budget. He also indicated that the United Missouri Bank fee for managing the account has dropped to 1.2%.
- f. Committee Presentations President Mary Jo Moore indicated that committee reports were available in the Annual Report and asked if there were any questions. There being none, we moved to the next agenda item.
- g. Nominating Committee President Mary Jo Moore opened the discussion of the Nominating Committee Report by thanking the members for their hard work, culminating in filling the slate of candidates. The resulting list of candidates is available on pages 48–52 of the 2020 Annual Report. Moore walked through the list of candidates for the Council, Constitutional Committees, Standing Committees, Congregational Organizations, and appointments from our congregation to organizations outside of our doors.

New Business

6.a. Elections – After walking through the Nominating Committee's list of candidates, President Moore asked if there were nominations from the floor for any of the positions. There being none, we proceeded to elections.

Election of the Congregation Council –The nominating committee proposed the following slate:

President Mary Jo Moore opened the floor for nominations. There being none, Jean Nuernberger moved and Henrik Andersen seconded a motion that nominations cease. The motion carried.

Jean Nuernberger moved and Roland Pera seconded a motion to approve the candidate selection for Congregation Council. The motion carried.

Election of Committee Members - Following the election of Council, and in lieu of the fact that there were no nominations beyond the proposed list of candidates, President Mary Jo Moore proposed offering a motion to elect the committee positions listed in the Annual Report by acclamation. Henrik Andersen so moved, and Lila Aamodt seconded a motion to elect by acclamation the proposed list of candidates for all committee positions. The motion carried.

6.b. Budget for 2021 – The proposed 2021 budget begins on page 46 of the 2020 Annual Report.

Rick Sundell explained the process and assumptions used in preparing the 2021 budget. A key assumption, impacting all uses of the facilities, was that the COVID-19 restrictions would remain in effect for six months. Rick walked through the various lines of the budget, including the notes when appropriate. The budget calls for a \$117,988 negative balance and relies on the ETF to cover that amount.

Questions were taken and discussion took place as Rick walked through the various sections of the budget. Kathy Linder and Rick Sundell offered answers. Key items discussed were:

a) How were offering revenues estimated (\$281,000)? Rick explained that the final budget figure was developed taking 2020 actuals and subtracting the amount given by the five families we lost during the year. It is customary to then add a small amount called the faith factor for growth. Four of the families lost were due to death and the fifth

was the Fee family. Rick indicated at the time of budget preparation that we had 49 commitments totaling \$212,580 and, since that time, we have received five additional commitments.

- b) Kevin Fewell felt the facility use fees estimate of \$6,140 might be optimistic based on the use fees generated prior to the COVID -19 restrictions. Rick indicated that this estimate, along with many other COVID-19 affected items, will need to be reviewed throughout the year.
- c) There were many discussions concerning what could be done to reduce the deficit.
- 1. President Moore indicated that the council will consider a special appeal to the congregation for increased giving.
- 2. Terry Kueker again mentioned the potential for a second PPP loan.
- 3. President Moore mentioned that should Congress pass a second economic impact payment and, should members not be dependent on these funds, they could consider tithing them to ILC.
- 4. There was significant discussion concerning the sale of property.
- i. One property that Council is currently investigating is the sale of the Genesee Residence. Important considerations are: the outreach mission being accomplished; the ability to separate the property from the church building in the current mortgage loan; and the importance of access to the rear parking lot.
- ii. Sale of the east parking lot property was also brought up. Marc Winkler indicated that the property is currently encumbered by a long-term lease. The lease allows us to defer maintenance costs to the lessor, gives us free use of the parking for church functions, and generates income. It could also be allowing us to meet the parking-space requirements needed for ILC occupancy. Until the current lease expires, it is likely that only the lessor would be a good candidate to purchase the lot.
- iii. The new addition occupies space that was previously occupied by two homes and still is zoned as residential. If we have that space rezoned, could it be used to generate rental income? The costs associated with rezoning, and the potential income tax exposure would need investigation.
- 5. Sally Baehni highlighted the fact that committees spent 30-70% less than their 2020 budgets, showing an effort to control expenses.

Following the budget explanation and questions, discussion was closed. Larry Benolkin moved and Henrik Andersen seconded a motion to approve the 2021 budget as presented. The motion carried.

Other Business

- 7.a. Recognition of New Life Baptisms and Death Pastor presented the report available on Page 58 of the Annual Report.
- 7.b. Recognition of Council members completing their terms Vice President Connie Benolkin thanked the departing Council members, and reviewed their many contributions:
- Mary Jo Moore completed six years during which time she also served as secretary, vice president and president.
- Mindy Rash completed six years, including five years as treasurer.
- Jack Umbach completed a three-year term.
- Kathy Boehmer completed an open term serving for two years as well as working on many other committees and projects.
- Janie Fee served for two years and also served on many other committees.

7.c. Resolutions (page 10 of the Annual Report) – President Mary Jo Moore read through the seven resolutions, after which she asked for a motion to place them into the record. Karole Jacobsen moved to approve all seven resolutions by acclamation. Jean Nuernberger seconded, and the motion carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 12:30 p.m. with Pastor Sievenpiper leading the congregation in the Lord's Prayer.

The work of our church may not have proceeded as quickly as in simpler times, but the dedication of the people at Immanuel to meet the challenges of ministry in this time and in this space have been truly amazing. As we look ahead to 2022, let's ask for God's strength to empower even more participation and even better use of the talents that are so abundant among us.

PASTOR'S REPORT | REV. MICAH SIEVENPIPER

Partners in Ministry,

We are the body of Christ, united in the waters of baptism, filled with the Holy Spirit, and sent to live out the good news of God's grace for all people. We are signs of God's abiding love to the world, a living witness to the power of the gospel as we grow together, and care for one another and the world God has made.

As we have continued to navigate the treacherous waters of the pandemic, it's helpful to remember who we are, and what it is we gather to do. The pandemic is inescapable, and it's impossible to reflect on our ministry together without paying attention to the significant ways in which COVID-19 has shaped our lives and our work. But it is not the pandemic that defines us, either as people or as a community of faith.



While our gatherings have looked different throughout the year, we continue to worship and study together. As the year started, our in-person ministry was limited, and worship was no exception with online worship happening on YouTube and communion services offered in the back parking lot. We began to worship in person on Palm Sunday, and it was a joy to gather in the sanctuary as well as online as we celebrated Easter together. As the year progressed, we've continued to balance the importance of worship with our calling to care for each other and the community beyond our doors.

We've also tried to expand that community, finding ways to be the church together even when we are unable to be in the same physical space. While our weekly online Bible study has been replaced by in-person Adult Forum, we've added the ability to stream live worship services from the sanctuary, and we continue to hold regular meetings either in person or online with outdoor events when weather permits. Many of these changes are guided by the wisdom of the Advisory Committee. Appointed by the Congregation

Council, this group pays close attention to the current situation and to recommendations from public health officials. We also take congregational feedback into consideration, so the ministry we do in person is as low-risk as possible without being overshadowed by precautions.

Our guiding principles continue to come from the gospel as we strive to show the love of God in word and deed. For the past few years, the Steering Committee has been discerning what God is calling us to do as we look to the future. During October, that committee submitted a draft to the congregation for feedback, outlining our vision for what we hope ministry at Immanuel looks like in the future. We are still in the process of soliciting feedback to finalize this vision, and are drafting a companion document that outlines our priorities and next steps. The Vision for Ministry is an aspirational document, one in which we hope everyone in the community can find themselves, making congregational feedback invaluable.

Unsurprisingly, we have had a lot of transition at Immanuel during the past year. We welcomed new members by baptism and by affirmation of faith, and we said goodbye to those who are no longer with us: those who died, and those who have moved on to other communities. I give thanks for all those of this community, past, present and future.

The year ahead offers little in the way of certainty. We don't know what's next for us in the pandemic, or how new variants will impact us. We live in a contentious, divided world that faces great challenges. While there is a lot that remains unknown, we still trust that God is with us, working in us and through us to make known God's boundless love for all of creation. It's a blessing to be a part of that work here at Immanuel.

Our ministry together is witness to God's love that comes only through faith in Jesus' promise of the forgiveness of sins ... a peace that passes all understanding. Guided by that promise, I assisted in Immanuel's ministry during 2021 through:

- **Pastoral care,** including Zoom calls, phone calls, cards, discussions over cups of coffee, and visits to hospitals and homes. Although pastoral care usually is associated with illness, challenges or grief, visits also celebrate life events and better acquaint us with one another. Pastor Micah and I coordinate visitation.
- Recruiting and encouraging tele-ministers and mail ministers. Tele-ministers are teamed up with members
 who often are not able to attend worship or who like having a friendly phone visit. Several mail ministers
 regularly send cards and notes to people on the Immanuel prayer list.
- Women of the ELCA (WELCA), who met regularly via Zoom and/or in person during 2021 to study scripture, learn about our shared faith, and enjoy interesting presentations from Immanuel members Patti Winkler and Kevin Fewell, to whom we again send our thanks. The WELCA group also had lunch together several times this summer, and those were times of joyful reunion.

Confirmation Ministry

- Confirmation. Current students are working through the new Seeds of Faith curriculum, which allows each student to work at his/her own pace and choose from a variety of experiences in the areas of theology and tradition, history and discipleship. Several students will share their impressions about interesting confirmation experiences in upcoming issues of *Parish News*.
- Support for ministries of fellowship and learning. I assisted with an activity planned by the Congregational Life Committee (please see that report), and regularly sent out the quarterly Sparks Family Sunday School curriculum magazine to each participating family.

 In addition, I coordinate the quarterly mailing of *Christ in Our Home* devotional pamphlets, which also are available to pick up in the narthex at church. Please let me know if you would like to receive *Christ in Our Home* via mail.
- **Officiating.** When Pastor Micah was on vacation, I officiated at Mary Nelson's funeral. Mary and I are distant cousins, so it was meaningful for me and our families.
- Connecting the congregation of Immanuel with the congregation of homeless people served by
 Gathering Table. In addition to my part-time work for Immanuel, I also serve as part-time pastor, volunteer
 coordinator, cook and more at Gathering Table in northeast Kansas City. As such, I helped procure

nonperishable food that Immanuel volunteers packed into thousands of sack lunches for people served by Metro Lutheran Ministry and Gathering Table during **God's Work. Our Hands** weekend.

- Helping Immanuel members who own
 Thrivent products apply for Thrivent
 Action Team grants. If you have a Thrivent account, you can apply for an annual grant of \$250 or \$500 to support a specific activity at a church or not-for-profit organization. It's money that goes a long way toward helping others. During 2021, Immanuel members received Thrivent grants to
 - Pay for God's Work. Our Hands,
 Thanksgiving and New Year's meals at Gathering Table.
 - Purchase a bed for a lady who has cancer.



- Provide transportation so veterans served by Gathering Table could attend the Veterans Day parade in Leavenworth.
- o Pay for lunch for Gathering Table friends who shopped at the MLM Christmas Store.
- Purchase modest Christmas gifts for the residents of Westport Oxford House (Genesee Residence).
 Linda Fewell and I also donated handmade blankets and quilts to Oxford House residents who needed them.

I am happy to help with your Thrivent Action Team applications for Immanuel, Gathering Table or elsewhere. And please accept my sincere thanks for being partners in ministry with Gathering Table. Your support feeds the hungry, supports fellowship and builds relationships.

Music Director's Report | Suzanne Anderson

The past year began with virtual Hymns of the Day, virtual Psalms and virtual special musical offerings in full swing. We have been fortunate to have such a wide variety of musical talents and offerings from members as a part of our worship services, and I am very thankful for the dedication of the many people who continued to record for virtual music projects week after week through November! All of these contributions enabled us to keep some communal singing going until we were fairly certain it would be safe to resume limited in-person singing. As we began to transition back to in-person worship before Easter, our media team, organist Robert Barthel and Pastor Micah worked to integrate both live and recorded music into in-person services as well as into webcasts.



During May, small groups of bellringers were our first live ensembles to return to the sanctuary. Observing social distancing guidelines, they rang from the balcony. As the year progressed, we added more ringers and a few smaller vocal ensembles to worship. During the late fall, we began bringing back additional singers from the choir in hopes of transitioning back to the regular presence of the choir in worship. All singers were required to be vaccinated and wear a mask. To maintain appropriate distance and facilitate a change of airspace, we rehearsed in Luther Hall and sang from the balcony.

Advent brought the return of limited congregational singing, with Nico Caruso, our Choral Scholar, functioning as a cantor to fill in some parts of the liturgy that would normally be sung by the entire congregation. Erring on the side of caution, this arrangement cut down on the volume of aerosol particles that would be generated by the congregation singing the full liturgy in the space.

For Christmas Eve, our 5 p.m. service was graced with musical offerings from Lisa Erickson on flute and from a small ensemble of handbell ringers. The 9 p.m. service was enhanced by a string quartet and four singers from our choir.

I am thankful for the caution and wisdom shown by the Advisory Committee and Pastor Micah throughout 2021. Their guidance has made my work at Immanuel much easier and has helped us musically navigate the murky waters of the pandemic so far.

Management Responsibility

The organization's management is responsible for the information contained in these reports and for the development, implementation, and adherence of all financial policies and procedures. We recommend management carefully review all transactions contained in these reports to insure accuracy and clarity.

Table of Contents

> Statement of Financial Position

The statement of financial position gives a financial picture of the organization as of the end of the reporting period. It reflects the assets, liabilities, and net assets of the organization.

<u>Definition of Fund Accounting Terms</u>

Net Assets - Total Assets minus Total Liabilities. Net Assets fall into one of two categories:

- 1. With Donor Restriction funds that may be spent only as restricted by the donor.
- 2. Without Donor Restrictions funds available for general operations. These may be further separated as follows:
 - a. Net Investment in Fixed Assets total fixed assets minus accumulated depreciation minus any loans related to fixed assets.
 - b. Board Designated although not donor restricted, these amounts have been segregated by the board (or finance committee, elders, etc.) for special purposes.
 - c. Prior Years' Net Balance cumulative net activity (revenue minus expenses) from all prior years.
 - d. Current Year Net Balance current year net activity (detailed on the Statement of Activities).

> Statement of Activities

The statement of activities reflects the revenues and expenses of the organization for the current period of time - typically the current month and year-to-date. It can also be used to compare actual revenues and expenses to those budgeted.

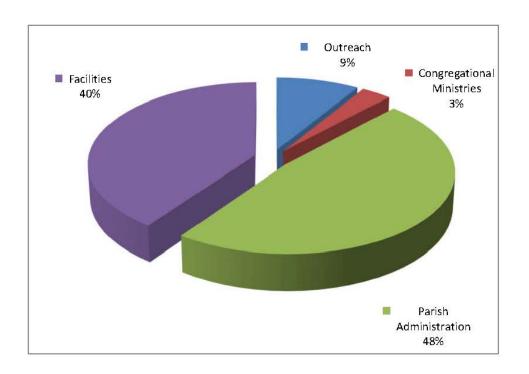

ENDOWMENT TRUST FUND COMMITTEE

The Endowment Trust Fund (ETF) was created in 1979 for the purpose of supporting the ministries of Immanuel Lutheran Church. In May 2005, Immanuel entered into an agreement with UMB Trust Services, which continues to act as the professional investment manager of the ETF. Per ETF policies, UMB is required to maintain a diversified portfolio.

During 2021:

- The diversified portfolio yielded a 10.9% return on investment, excluding cash and/or gift additions to the fund.
- The January beginning fund value was \$548,018.
- The Dec. 31 fund value was \$624,145.
- No funds were transferred from the ETF to Immanuel's operating budget.

Special thanks to Leonard Carr, who annually provides valuable summary-reporting assistance.

During September 2020, the account management fee charged by UMB was reduced to 1.20% for a guaranteed three-year period.

In 2015, the decision was made not to budget a contribution from the EFT to Immanuel's operating budget.

ALTAR GUILD

When you sip Communion wine from glass or chalice, that's Altar Guild. When you look up to see hymn numbers on the board in the front of the church, that's Altar Guild. When the color of the parament on the altar changes from blue to white to green to purple to white to red to green, that's Altar Guild.

Members of Immanuel's Altar Guild work quietly at the intersection of the sacred and the ordinary, preparing the church for worship, and the bread and wine for Communion. We bake the bread, buy the wine, juice and crackers, and water the green plants in front of the pulpit.



During 2021, our work was that of adaptation. As the seasons of the church year changed, but before we had returned to the sanctuary for worship, members of Altar Guild quietly changed the paraments to reflect the colors of the liturgical season for the people watching online.

When we returned to in-person worship, members of Altar Guild prepared the wine and bread in individual disposable cups, working in masked solitude to protect the health of all. As the Eucharist returned to the front of the sanctuary, members of Altar Guild returned to working in teams and adapted their practice by allowing space between individual cups in the tray so worshippers could take their cup without touching others. We continue to use disposable cups.

This fall, we adjusted our flower policy for financial reasons, voting that Immanuel members could provide pulpit flowers for special Sundays, and could contact the office to do so. During services without special flowers, three lovely green plants in front of the pulpit remind us of the living Triune God. We thank Lori Kueker for her skill in selecting and caring for the plants.



During the year, we decorated the church, including with lilies for Easter, lights for All Saints Day, and a tree, wreaths, poinsettias and a Nativity scene for Advent and Christmas. Then we packed away the decorations with care for the coming year.

And we met regularly, initially on Zoom and later in person, to discuss Altar Guild business and enjoy fellowship. Maybe, during 2022, we'll be able to return to our monthly breakfast meetings. We're all looking forward to enjoying egg casseroles and pastries in the company of our fellow Altar Guild members.

Want to join us? Altar Guild generally meets at 8:30 a.m. on the last Saturday of the month in Spong Common Room, with other meetings scheduled as needed for Holy Week and the Advent season.

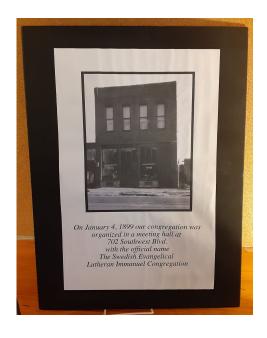

GLOBAL MISSION COMMITTEE: KENYAN CHILDREN'S FUND

For almost 10 years, the Kenyan Children's Fund (KCF), Immanuel's global mission project, has helped meet the basic needs of children in Masii, Kenya, who have been orphaned by HIV/AIDS and are living in deep poverty.

Jimmi Kimuyu, an Immanuel member and KCF founder, returned to his hometown of Masii following the death of his mother. He now serves as board president and volunteer director of the Kimuyu and Dr. John Foundation Self-Help Group, which is the non-governmental organization that operates the KCF program in Masii. He is assisted by Jacinta Kyalo, a caseworker and the KCF's only paid staff member, who

visits and submits reports about the children and their guardians each month.

Jimmi reports that the people of Masii are experiencing drought and famine, and many needy families are suffering. He adds that they are deeply grateful for the well that the KCF funded, which provides 7,000 area residents with water that is safe to drink.

During 2021, the generosity of KCF donors allowed the organization to:

- Provide much-needed monthly food supplements and some household products including maize, beans, rice, flour, soap and cooking oil – for 45 children and their guardians.
- Purchased required school uniforms for very needy children.
- Constructed a bathroom for girls at the local primary school, where only a boy's bathroom had previously existed. The bathroom allowed girls to stay for the entire school day.
- Repaired the badly damaged or nonexistent roofs of several structures in which sponsored children and their guardians reside.

The KCF committee at Immanuel concentrated 2021 efforts on reconnecting with current and former donors, most of whom are current or former members of Immanuel. While some children age out of the program, other young children take their place.

The Immanuel committee recognizes that the current number of sponsors is not adequate to sustain the program, so many 2021 communications were designed to increase sponsorships, including a congregation-wide appeal sent out during December 2021.

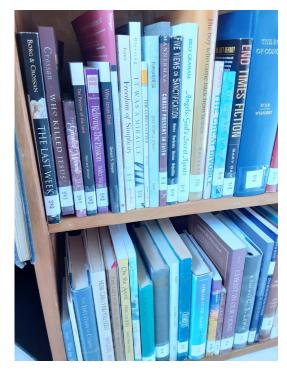
During 2022, the KCF will continue to provide food supplements and household supplies, as well as home repair and construction materials. As contributions allow, the fund also will pay for sleeping mattresses so children and guardians new to the program don't have to sleep on dirt floors, and may help to purchase a used truck that Masii volunteers can use to transport food and other materials.

A donation of only \$390 per year to the Kenyan Children's Fund, in care of Immanuel, will assist one child for the year. But a contribution of any amount is a blessing!

The committee is deeply grateful for Immanuel members' continued work to improve the quality of life for Kenyan children living in poverty. We pray for God's guidance as we seek to maintain this much-needed service.

At Immanuel, we celebrate Christ's generosity as the basis for our commitment to address human needs, social ills and global concerns. The Social Ministry committee serves as the catalyst for that commitment. It supports the congregation's deep-seated impulse to demonstrate acts of love that enrich others' lives, and it helps organize, educate and sensitize the congregation to stretch in mission and enjoy the experience.

Please see the budget categories titled **Ministry to Those at a Distance** and **Ministry to the Community** to view the list of organizations to which Immanuel provided financial support during

2021. Those organizations promote or involve activities or advocacy in which the people of Immanuel are deeply interested, but that Immanuel is not prepared to accomplish on its own. In addition to financial donations, the people of Immanuel support those organizations and others with board service and volunteer assistance.

Highlights of Immanuel's involvement in the community during 2021 include:

- Supporting the ministry at Gathering Table (formerly Children's Memorial Lutheran Church) by collecting more than 100 pairs of socks and underwear for low income and homeless populations in northeast Kansas City.
- Helping to ensure that every shopper at the Metro Lutheran Ministry (MLM) Christmas Store could receive a warm coat if needed. On two Saturdays in early April, before our building reopened, we invited Immanuel members and neighbors in the Volker and West Plaza neighborhoods surrounding our church to donate new and gently used coats. As a result, we added more than 50 coats to those that would be available during the 2021 Christmas Store.
- Collecting new gifts and toys during a Christmas in July in-gathering for the Christmas Store. We publicized the list of most-needed items and collected items throughout the month.



Participating in a God's Work. Our Hands project that set an Immanuel record. Based on a list of required food items that the committee publicized, congregation members donated nonperishable, ready-to-eat sack lunch items during August and early September. At the same time, Pastor Ann Rundquist helped Social Ministry Committee members procure additional sack-lunch items that, thanks to a limited-time offer, were available from the Harvesters Community Food Network for free.

A crew of energetic Immanuel volunteers packed lunches Saturday, Sept. 11, at Gathering Table, and an even larger multi-generational crew packed lunches for MLM during a Sunday, Sept. 12, event after worship at Immanuel. We packed more than a 1,000 sack lunches at each location that fed hungry people at Gathering Table and MLM for weeks!

- Helped combat hunger locally and worldwide through CROP Walk. The October 2021 event was virtual, but three Immanuel walkers set out on foot independently as a way to raise money on behalf of people served by CROP. Immanuel's donations totaled \$2,067.
- Making an additional push during November and early December for most-needed gifts for the MLM Christmas Store.
- Hosting the MLM Christmas Store, which served almost 1,000 needy families during an action-packed
 December week. Immanuel members were on hand throughout the week to receive and sort gift donations, set up the store, help shoppers, offer hospitality and, finally, pack up after the store closed at the week's end.

The mission of the Stewardship Committee is to promote the expression of faith in our daily living, while helping church members see the relationship between whole-life stewardship and a life of

Virtually everything in the pages of this annual report is an expression and example of stewardship — of managing and caring for what God has entrusted to us.

The committee began 2021 by deciding to meet each month to encourage stewardship beyond the fall giving campaign. Highlights of the committee's activities include:

- Developing a Tending Our Garden theme and logo to use in communications.
- Organizing spruce-up days June 5, July 14 and Oct. 2 that brought members together to help beautify the church grounds. More than a dozen Immanuel volunteers participated in one or more spruce-up days.



- Writing monthly Parish News articles featuring organizations that Immanuel supports and helps "tend" in the
 wider community, including Cross-Lines Community Outreach, KC Shepherd's Center, Westport House, Girls
 to School, Mosaic and Oaks Indian Mission.
- Writing a concise "your support matters" message that integrates all the ways to make financial gifts to Immanuel. The message appears in weekly emails, bulletin inserts and *Parish News*.

Importantly, the committee planned a fall stewardship campaign leading up to commitment Sunday, Nov. 14. Using a

During 2021, we were happy to observe COVID-19 protocols to keep each other safe and healthy. But remaining apart meant that the Welcoming & Hospitality Committee members met via phone, text and email again this year.

Immanuel was blessed to receive four new households into our faith family. Information packets and welcome cookies were personally distributed to each household, and sponsors were identified for each new member household. In addition, visitors to Immanuel who chose to sign our guestbook received personalized welcome notes.

The Welcoming & Hospitality Committee had the privilege, along with Pastor Micah, to invite members from the Social Ministry, Steering and Stewardship committees to be part of the ELCA Open Doors initiative for congregations interested in meeting new people as we transition into a time of regathering in our physical space. Our congregation was invited to apply for a grant, anticipated in the range of \$1,500-\$2,500, to help implement our ministry goal of

connecting with our community so people may learn more about Immanuel Lutheran Church and to expand our ministry.

On May 5, Pastor Micah and members from the four committees attended a Zoom meeting to explore the potential of developing a plan that was an actionable idea for meeting new people in our community. The end result was a plan to involve our surrounding neighborhood to join us in participation with the MLM Christmas Store. Pastor submitted the plan to ELCA for the "Open Doors" grant. Unfortunately, our proposal was not selected.

At midyear, our Reconciling in Christ welcoming banner displayed in the front of our building sustained substantial damage. Deborah Crawford was able to repair it, and Mike Boehmer reinstalled it.

The committee's goals for 2022 reflect a continued effort to welcome our community:



- Installing a permanent Reconciling in Christ Welcoming sign when Immanuel returns to a permanent Sunday worship schedule.
- Exploring the prospect of expanding Immanuel's ministry by using the Open Doors plan to involve our local community in the MLM Christmas Store.
- Introducing the Congregation Council to our plans to conduct a hospitality audit spearheaded by Carolyn Wilson. However, pandemic-era safety is a concern that may delay that plan, because the project likely will take about nine months and would require visits to distant churches.

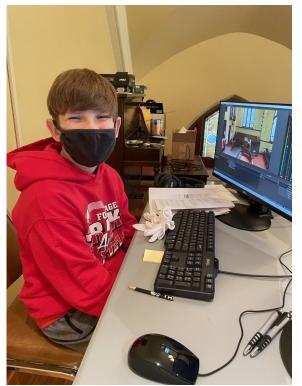
WORSHIP AND ARTS COMMITTEE

The year 2021 saw our congregation and the Worship and Arts Committee begin to return to in-person ministry. Although worship at Immanuel, like other ministries of the church, continues to be affected by the pandemic, our community has come together to create ways to adjust and adapt.

We began January 2021 with fully online worship streamed live each Sunday from the Immanuel YouTube channel. Lay leaders continued to serve as virtual readers, Psalmists, assisting ministers and musicians. Music Director



Suzanne Anderson prepared, led and engineered a weekly virtual choir that continued almost to Advent, even after we returned to in-person worship. Organist Robert Barthel provided meaningful organ music during this time, as well.

Our first in-person worship service of 2021 was Palm Sunday, followed by the Easter Vigil, when we gathered outside around the fire pit. Since then, weekly 9:30 a.m. services have occurred both in-person and streamed, creating the new Media Team ministry, through which members faithfully run technology each Sunday. Limited in-person singing resumed this fall, and a small choir has sung from the balcony. We returned to limited congregational singing during Advent, a joyous and long-desired event.

Expressions of worship and music have continued in other ways, too. Suzanne Anderson led a socially-distant handbell/chime choir most months, including several new youth members. Instrumentalists have once again shared their gifts in worship. Megan Sawyer has continued to offer music for intermittent Sunday School gatherings, via Zoom at the beginning of the year and on the church playground during nice summer and fall weather.

We have made strides toward a return to "normal" worship as pandemic conditions allowed, and while we long to worship and give thanks in the ways to which we are accustomed, we rejoice in the creative ways we have found to worship under these difficult circumstances. We look to the future with hope.

- 2. **RESOLVED**, that we offer thanks to God for the gift of Jesus Christ, God's work, and God's love; that we ask forgiveness for our sins; that we pray for growth in our Christian faith; and that we seek strength and guidance from God to serve faithfully in the coming year.
- 3. **RESOLVED**, that we glorify God through worship and the ministries we offer for the sake of the gospel and to demonstrate God's love in the world.
- 4. **RESOLVED**, that we give thanks to Pastor Sievenpiper for his faithfulness to God's Word and his leadership during the pandemic. We especially are thankful for his technical savvy, and ability to create meaningful worship services for those in person and those online.
- 5. **RESOLVED**, that we thank our capable staff Rev. Ann Rundquist, Suzanne Anderson, Robert Barthel, Ter'Ranay Teague, Sunni Battin and Linda Fewell for their faithful service during the past year and their gifts in ministry as we continue our faith journey together.

- 6. **RESOLVED,** that we thank the many Immanuel volunteers whose service to every aspect of our ministry is as inspiring as it is vital.
- 7. **RESOLVED**, that we will be proactive in developing and implementing strategies to promote the health of Immanuel members and the financial health of the congregation.
