I have long wondered why so many Christian communities are fixated on the idea of persecution. Perhaps it's just how so much of the early church experienced the world; persecution is enshrined in Acts as part of their reality. Jesus warned his disciples that following him could cost them everything, a way to encourage them when times seemed hard and they suffered for their faith.

The modern church doesn't have that problem, at least where we live. Christianity is common, and going to church isn't seen as an act of sedition or treason. Christian language and symbols are common sights in public spaces, in a way

the symbols of other faiths aren't. Yet that doesn't discourage some Christians from claiming they are persecuted for their faith, a claim I've always found confusing because it didn't match my own experience. Certainly, there are places in the world where that's true, but never anywhere I lived.

What fascinates me most about the claim to persecution, which seems to measure the validity of a person's faith by how much they've suffered for it, is that it often ignores the call at the heart of the gospel. Jesus does warn us that following in his steps could cost us everything -- but not because a random cashier says "Happy Holidays" instead of "Merry Christmas." There is a cost to discipleship, as Jesus warns, because we are called to love like Christ, to care for the outcast and refugee, to welcome those who are told they are unworthy, to see the goodness in all people.

That's a bold stance to take. In the waters of baptism, we receive a counter-cultural call to work against the systems of this world that oppress and enslave and divide us from one another. Working against those systems is risky, and might cost us everything, but it's also where we see the work of God being done most readily. It's not easy work, but the cost of discipleship shouldn't be confused with persecution, and I hope the difficulty of

doing ministry doesn't discourage us, because it's through us that God is working in this world.

TENDING OUR GARDEN: SPOTLIGHT ON CROSS-LINES



Immanuel has been providing financial support to Cross-Lines Community Outreach, Inc., for many years. Located in

Kansas City, Kan., this nonprofit organization provides basic needs, hunger relief and housing stabilization for people living in poverty. Cross-Lines was started in 1963 by a group of concerned clergy who had a simple idea: that poverty-borne problems could be answered best by looking to the community for solutions



and working together to tackle them. Collaboration is key. Metropolitan Lutheran Ministry, another nonprofit supported by Immanuel, is one of its valued community partners.

According to Kelley Carpenter, director of development and marketing, the fundamental approach of Cross-Lines has not changed over the years -- meet people where they are in life, extending dignity and respect, and provide an array of programs and services that address the whole person without considering a person's faith tradition. She explained that the 18 staff, 1800 volunteers, and thousands of clients come from different life experiences, including many faith backgrounds.

Carpenter said, "Our doors are open to everyone. If you are hungry, you can get fed here, regardless of where you live. Hunger relief has grown by leaps and bounds in the last several years --11,000 people served in 2019 to more than 22,000 in 2020. Our community kitchen serves breakfast and lunch --57,000 meals during the past year. Our housing stabilization program helps people who are in a bad spot, and at risk of losing their living space and becoming homeless. Our basic needs program addresses personal hygiene -- we operate a shower program -- and offers transportation to the Cross-Lines warming center when temperatures dip very low."

Carpenter emphasized that Cross-Lines could not do all that it does without community supporters like Immanuel. She also said the organization always needs volunteers to box lunches, maintain a community garden and participate in its senior commodity program. the Kenyan Children's Fund, is seeking sponsors for 15 needy children. The cost to sponsor a child is only \$390 per year, which pays



NEWS FROM SYNOD ASSEMBLY UNITED IN CHRIST THROUGH BAPTISM: ONE BODY, MANY MEMBERS

During the Central States Synod Assembly in early June, a gathering of voting representatives from all ELCA churches in the region, Bishop Susan Candea introduced the synod's new mission statement: **United with Christ in Baptism. Traveling the Way of Jesus. Joining God's Reign of Justice and Radical Love in the World**. Judith Roberts, ELCA senior director for diversity, equity, and inclusion, invited us to talk about the complex dynamics of racism. The ELCA Social Statement, **Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity, and**

Culture, continues to express our calling to celebrate culture and ethnicity, to confront racism, to engage in public leadership, witness, and deliberation on these matters, and to advocate for justice and fairness for all people. She encouraged us to continue the conversation, even amid uncomfortable feelings it may raise, for there is much to learn as we listen to one another and much work for us to do.

During the business meeting, synod voting representatives:

- Amended the synod constitution so it conforms with the bylaws and required provisions approved at the 2019 church assembly, including that no more than 50 percent of lay voting members of the assembly shall be of the same gender.
- Approved compensation guidelines for rostered ministers for 2022.
- Received the treasurer's report, which indicated that mission support from congregations increased in 2020 and the response to the annual appeal was the largest ever.
- Approved a budget of 1,674,534.

Voting members also passed resolutions about:

- A season of Global Awareness, which designated Epiphany as a time for congregations to lift up the church around the world; October 23, 2021, as a Sunday of solidarity with our companion synod in Russia; April 24, 2022 as a Sunday of solidarity with our companion synod in Papua New Guinea.
- Embracing the Earth Charter, which calls us to consider actions to take to become better stewards of creation.
- Calling for a social statement about Child Protection, encouraging congregations to adopt child protection policies and engage in education about effective discipline for children.
