We don't know what's going to happen next, but as the people of God, we have hope that it gets better. That the promise of the resurrection isn't something that limited to what happens after our death —the resurrection is the work of the Church today, the work of all the people of God to proclaim new life for all of creation.

From the President



Less than a month ago, on May 25, an unarmed black man named George Floyd was murdered by a white police officer in Minneapolis, MN. While Floyd was handcuffed and lying face down, the officer had his knee on Floyd's neck for 8 minutes and 46 seconds, during which time Floyd begged for his life, repeatedly saying he couldn't breathe, and calling for his mother. The last 3 minutes he was motionless and without a pulse. The officer continued to use lethal force.

Floyd was taken by medics to a nearby hospital where he was pronounced dead. Witness videos of the

event went viral, igniting the city. Protests have occurred in U.S. cities and many countries throughout the world. Enough is enough, people say. End racism once and for all. Justice now! What are we to make of this? Importantly, what are we going to do about it? There is no denying we live in a racist society, that people of color, particularly black people, suffer from centuries of persecution



and mistreatment. Our libraries are full of books, articles and films on the subject. The stories of pain and suffering abound in works of art, music, dance, poetry, plays and movies. It's on each of us to learn our racist history, and, to understand the how and why of it, and how it continues to harm people of color today. My answer to the first question I asked is this... the Holy Spirit is shaking the world to its core, awakening the dry bones in Ezekiel to new life that is right with God. And my answer to the second question? We are to live our faith in Jesus Christ by loving our neighbor, dismantling racism, and working toward a truly just and equitable society. Doing nothing is not an option. Inaction only perpetuates existing policies and practices that deny racial equality and justice for our brothers and sisters. We can, we must do better. God is counting on us.
