We live in the gray areas. And there are times I wish the world was more black and white; there's a kind of comfort in absolute moral certainty, in knowing what is right and what is wrong. There are black-and-



white times like that, moments of total clarity when we know the correct path to choose, the right decision to make. But most of the time, things aren't that simple. Most of the time, we have to navigate a world full of complicated issues that have no simple answers.

What can we do to curb gun violence?

How can we care for the sick and the poor when health care is expensive? How can we house the houseless when the cost of living is shooting through the roof?

These are important questions to ask ourselves, but none of them have simple answers. It's difficult to live in the gray areas, but we hear in the gospels that the gray areas are where Jesus meets us. In the messy valleys of our lives, God promises to abide with us, to make her dwelling place among us.

And just because the gray areas are difficult doesn't mean we should sit on the sidelines. We're called to take action, putting our faith into practice for the good of all creation.

It takes courage to follow the call of Jesus, knowing that we don't have all the answers. But if we have the humility to learn and the courage to follow where Jesus is calling us, we might just be surprised at what we're able to accomplish together.


CONGRATULATIONS AND BLESSINGS TO OUR GRADUATES

DURING THE WEEK, IMMANUEL IS TEEMING WITH ACTION

Even without YouthWorks, which will transform Immanuel's building into "teenager central" for two months this summer, Immanuel is brimming with action during each week. In addition to congregation events and meetings, a variety of organizations regularly meet in our building.

Chief among those groups is Purple Dragon Day Care, which educates preschoolers Monday-Friday in Immanuel's lower-level classrooms.

Other groups that meet in our building, some of which are on summer break, include:

- Shin Do Ryu Karate.
- Dance groups, including Scandinavian Dancers, German Folk Dancers and World Folk Dancers.
- Music groups, including Soundwave Academy, Youth Chorus of Kansas City and Choral Spectrum. Other music schools and music students also hold recitals in our sanctuary.
- Health- and recovery-focused groups such as OA-KC.
- Neighborhood groups, including the West Plaza and Volker neighborhood associations.

FROM THE CENTRAL STATES SYNOD: EMERGENCY CLIMATE DECLARATION AND RESPONSE TO THE RECENT SCHOOL SHOOTING



BISHOP SIGNS EMERGENCY CLIMATE DECLARATION

Along with the bishop of the Episcopal Dioceses of Missouri, Central States Synod Bishop Susan Candea has signed an emergency climate declaration that challenges all members of our synod to pursue justice for creation through sufficiency and sustainability actions, learning, deiberation and advocacy. RESPONSE TO THE RECENT SCHOOL SHOOTING

From the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America -

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid" (John 14:27).



Gracious God, news of the mass shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, has ripped our hearts and torn our souls. We are walking through the valley of the shadow of

death. In the depths of pain and anger, we come before you, O God, our rock and our refuge. You are our only comfort. You are our only hope. Merciful God, you know the depth of our suffering. We have only begun to mourn those we have lost.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America grieves with the families of the 19 students and two teachers killed in Tuesday's mass shooting in Uvalde, Texas. Mass shootings in this country during the past two weeks have deepened the wounds of grief and sorrow. This follows the racially motivated shooting of 10 people in Buffalo, N.Y.; the shooting in Laguna Woods, Calif.; and the 27 other school shootings that have occurred in 2022. Many of the shooters have targeted children and older adults — some of the most vulnerable in our society.

We reaffirm our commitment in calling for greater gun safety, including preventing easy access to assault-style weapons and strengthening our federal system of background checks for all gun sales. As people of faith, we hold on to our belief in caring for our neighbors and striving for justice and peace in all the earth.

We ask for continued support for first responders that arrive at a moment's notice and place their lives in harm's way for the sake of others. We ask for continued support for those providing medical, mental and emotional support as we grieve. We lament for those who have perpetrated violence against others. We thank the leaders of the Southwestern Texas Synod responding to the shooting in Uvalde, and for ecumenical and interreligious partners committed to accompanying this community for the long term. *(continued on next page)*

The ELCA social message Community Violence calls on our church to continue partnering with other religious and community groups in anti-violence initiatives that offer vital spiritual and moral resources, and that replace the fear and violence plaguing our homes, schools, communities and nation with hope and reconciliation. We join with others in pushing to stem the proliferation of guns in our streets, schools and communities, and to end the culture of violence that pervades our media and society.

From the Central States Synod -

Our help comes from you, O Lord, who made heaven and earth. In the midst of grief, you are our comfort. In the face of uncertainty, you are our rock. In the wake of tragedy, you are our hope. Even as we weep, we praise, and place our trust in you. We pray in the name of the one who suffered, died and was raised for us, our Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

That prayer concludes the Service after a Violent Event in the new ELCA hymnal, All Creation Sings. I am struck that we now include this service in our hymnal because these events are becoming all too common in our society. Once again, our children are paying the ultimate price. We are left grappling with how to understand, let alone move forward in the midst of such tragedies. How can we comprehend the incredible grief surrounding the violent death of 19 school children in Texas?

As people of faith, we take our grief, outrage, frustration and despair to God, knowing that God's heart is big enough to contain our grief. God's peace is deep enough to sustain our spirits. God's love is powerful enough to usher in a new way of being community, without hate and violence, without fear and death. We start with prayer, which is what empowers us to act as followers of Jesus for the sake of God's beloved children.

We must move beyond our laments and grief to examine how our own actions, our words and our treatment of others contribute to a society that has become so violent. We must look within ourselves and ask, "How can I participate in building a kinder, gentler, more peaceful society for all?" What is my responsibility? What is my call?"

Whether we are Democrat or Republican, liberal, progressive, conservative or middle of the road, it is time to come together and advocate for sensible gun safety. The right to bear arms can't be a higher priority than the rights of children to go to school and come home safely. We must unite, across political and social divides, to protect our children.

I urge you to write to your government representatives and call upon them to carry out their responsibilities to govern with wisdom and compassion, to be courageous, and to take action to make our society safer for all.

The Service after a Violent Event ends with this charge: Go out into the world in peace; have courage; Hold on to what is good; return no one evil for evil; Strengthen the fainthearted; Support the weak, and help the suffering; Honor all people; love and serve the Lord, Rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit.

BEWARE OF SCAMS

UKRAINIANS NEED OUR HELP

To date, the war in Ukraine has displaced about 8 million people who now are considered refugees, the economic cost is exorbitant, and the conservative estimate is that more than 4,000 people have been killed, including children.
