"You shall love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." Deuteronomy 10:19

September 11, 2001, is a day cemented in the minds of many of us who are old enough to remember it clearly. I was a freshman in high school, and I still can hear my principal's voice crackling through the loudspeaker as she announced what was happening. Teachers discarded their lesson plans, making room for the fear and uncertainty everyone seemed to share. Classroom TVs were rolled in, and we watched the horrors unfold in New York, Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C.

Thousands of people died that day and, during the days that followed, I was transfixed by the subsequent groundswell of unity. We were frightened, but people came together to support each other. Collectively, we donated money, supplies and even blood to help care for victims and support first responders. In the face of tragedy and fear, we cared for each other, hoping to find healing from unspeakable tragedy.

Sadly, mutual aid wasn't the only thing that brought people together. There was a terrifying increase in hate crimes directed at Muslims and anyone who might appear to have Middle Eastern ancestry. Mosques were burned, and Sikh temples became targets for violence.

That violence wasn't perpetrated only by radical individuals in isolated incidents. By a wide margin, most people supported going to war. So for 20 years, we spent trillions of dollars on revenge. More than 70,000 Afghan civilians were killed, a number that's almost certainly an underestimation because, after 9/11, the U.S. military stopped keeping track of civilian deaths.

An entire generation has grown up not knowing what it's like to be a country at peace. And yet, after spending roughly \$300 million on a war effort *every day* for nearly two decades, extending hospitality to refugees created in the process remains controversial.

It shouldn't be. The Bible is clear about the importance of welcoming strangers and foreigners. The stories in Genesis and Exodus are mostly about immigrants and refugees, and about how God cares foremost for outsiders — especially those who are not treated with dignity. King David, one of the most important figures in scripture, is born only because his great-grandfather loved a Moabite refugee named Ruth. And the Gospel of Matthew depicts the holy family as refugees, fleeing violence in their home country.

As disciples of Jesus, it is our duty and our joy to encounter Christ in the presence of those who are strangers. We are called to care for those who are suffering and give aid to all who need it. It is a blessing to welcome strangers, and that's especially true when doing so can save lives. After decades of bloodshed and death, we have the opportunity to do better, to come together and bring hope and healing to people who have suffered unimaginable hardship. I hope we seize the moment.

TENDING OUR GARDEN: SPOTLIGHT ON GIRLS TO SCHOOL

Girls to School is a nonprofit dedicated to ending poverty in Mauritania, West Africa. Its mission is twofold: providing girls with an education and offering small loans to women so they can become entrepreneurs.

The organization was founded in 2009 by former Immanuel member Heather Arney when she returned from her Peace Corps service in Mauritania. Since then, Girls to School has enabled more than 1,000 girls to attend high-quality schools and to gather at a community center built by the



organization. In addition, 300 women have benefited from loans that range in size from a little money for supplies required to sell food at the local market, to larger loans for land and housing. These opportunities help participating girls avoid early-age marriages, and give girls and women the chance to beat the cycle of poverty.

Heather, who now is president of Girls to School, appreciates Immanuel's long-term support. "Each year, Immanuel's gift helps a Mauritanian girl attend school and funds other activities, including supporting the community center where girls can study, use computers, read books and play games with other girls in the program," she says. Financial support from Immanuel allows a Mauritanian girl to attend school, and allows many girls to use resources available at a community center that was built and is funded by Girls to School.



Women who receive loans from the Girls to School program meet periodically to discuss progress and share what they have learned. The loans, which are quite small by U.S. standards, can help the women lift themselves and their families out of poverty.

We'll pack takeaway lunches for homeless and hungry people, then enjoy lunch together. All takeaway lunch items already have been donated; just bring your willing hands. 8483 or office@immanuelkc.org, if you can attend. Note that only people who are vaccinated are allowed in the Gathering Table building.

• Be in Immanuel's Luther Hall after worship, Sunday, Sept. 12, to pack 1,000 sack lunches for hungry people. Your generosity is key — and your recent donations have been generous! As a result, we still need only 302 ready-to-eat proteins (such as tuna- or chicken-salad kits available at Dollar Tree stores) and 701 beef jerky sticks. Please add these remaining items to your shopping list. Place donations in the purple bins in the main sanctuary-level hallway.

Here are a few questions and answers about the lunch-packing event after worship Sunday, Sept. 12, at Immanuel:

Q: Can those of us who are Thrivent members apply for Thrivent Action Team funds to help purchase items for the sack lunches, for refreshments before and after the event, or to pay for other event expenses?

Q: I have a "God's Work. Our Hands." t-shirt. Should I wear it Sept. 12?

A: Yes, please do!

Q: I can't walk or stand for significant periods of time. Can I help pack lunches while seated?

A: Yes! People seated at one of the packing lines will add one or two items to a lunch sack, and then pass it on to the next seated person until the bag is full.

Q: Can my child participate?

A: Children who can walk and follow instructions traditionally have loved this activity, and we love their participation.

Q: Can I participate if I may not be able to stay for the entire event?

A: Absolutely. We appreciate your help for any amount of time.

Q: Will anything other than food go into each sack?

A: In addition to food, each sack will include a disposable spoon, disposable napkin and a prayer card contributed by the Immanuel Prayer Team.

Q: Where and when will the sack lunches be distributed to hungry people?

A: The completed sack lunches will go to the midtown Kansas City location of Metro Lutheran Ministry, which distributes 800 or more sack lunches to hungry people each month.
