Partners in Ministry,

Immanuel is a holy space. About a hundred years ago, when the congregation moved to Westport Road, this place was consecrated as sacred, a place where people could gather to encounter God. As the needs of the community grew and changed, so did the ways in which the people of Immanuel used the building. They planned and built additions, renovated rooms for new uses, and continually transformed the building to fit the needs of the people who came here to experience the presence of God in community with each other. Today, this holy space is in our keeping, and it continues to hold our prayers, praise and fellowship.



It has been correctly observed that the church is more than a building but, while we are not bound by our walls, we still have a home here. Our physical space at 1700 Westport Road continues to serve us and the wider community by allowing us to gather for worship and extend welcoming invitations to others. It is a blessing that anchors us in this community and empowers the ministry we share. If we hope to entrust it to those who come after us, just as we received it from those who came before, we need to care for it.

It's with this vision for the work God will continue to do in the future that Immanuel's leaders have been preparing to raise funds to make much-needed repairs to our build-ing. It's an effort that we have named **Financing A Faithful Future.**

That effort will pay for new and/or repaired air conditioners that make it possible to worship in the sanctuary through scorching heat, and will allow us to host groups throughout the summer — groups such as YouthWorks, which uses Immanuel as home base while serving thousands of people around the metropolitan area each summer.

New or repaired air conditioners also will allow us to be better caretakers of creation by using more environmentally friendly materials and by sealing chemical leaks that could damage the air we breathe.

A new boiler and water heater will ensure that the children of Purple Dragon Preschool remain warm and safe through the winter, will allow us to continue to host the Metro Lutheran Ministry Christmas Store each December and will keep us warm as we worship on chilly mornings.

Repairs to the roof and stained glass windows will protect the sanctuary from worsening water damage and will repair structural damage that already has occurred in the bell tower. This work will allow us to continue to worship in the sanctuary, and will ensure that generations to come will have a place to be baptized, celebrate communion, participate in the liturgy, join in song and praise, and more.

There will, of course, be a substantial cost to such extensive work, some of which has been put off for years, and those costs are in addition to the already-budgeted costs of meeting the ministry needs of the congregation. So during the next three years, we will raise those funds through special events, by applying for grants, and through an appeal for special giving from you as well as from friends of Immanuel and from organizations that use our building regularly.

At 5 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 25, we will kick off the years-long **Financing a Faithful Future** effort with a celebration of what Immanuel does now, and we will name with hope what we will be able to do in the future. You'll learn more in the story that follows this message.

I hope you'll join us Sept. 25 and throughout these next three years as we work together to care for our shared home.

FINANCING A FAITHFUL FUTURE FUNDRAISING EFFORT KICKS OFF SEPT. 25

Dear Immanuel Friends,

As the people of God at 1700 Westport Road, we have a longstanding commitment to faithful worship and to serving the community. Many aspects of how we live out that commitment depend on our facility.

To prepare for a faith-filled future, our facility now requires repairs. Note that it's not just that it could use some repairs — it *requires* repairs ... necessary repairs that will ensure that our building can continue to be a ministry site and community meeting place into the future.

As we read in 1 Corinthians 3:10, "By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as a wise builder, and someone else is building on it. But each one should build with care."

We need a total of about \$200,000 to pay for the required repairs. Thanks to already generous gifts — a bequest from the George and Evelyn Roberts Estate, contributions in memory of Ann Erickson, whose family has earmarked them for boiler replacement, and additional donations from many of you — we already have received a little more than \$60,000. That leaves about \$140,000 to go. The **Financing a Faithful Future** effort will give each of us an opportunity to pledge our support for the repair effort and the future of our ministry.

As Pastor Micah mentions in his message, we will kick off the effort with a party at 5 p.m., Sunday, Sept. 25. It will be a true celebration of Immanuel's spirit — past, present and future. John Anderson and his family band will perform, we'll enjoy hamburgers, hot dogs and ice-cream treats, and we'll hear from leaders of organizations that use our building about how important Immanuel's facility is to the community and their work within it. It will be a party you won't want to miss.

Within a few weeks, each Immanuel household will receive a letter and a pledge card. Through the end of this year, we ask that you prayerfully consider a special financial pledge toward the **Financing A Faithful Future** effort. We'd like to receive pledges by Dec. 31 of this year, and those pledges will be payable over a period of three years: Jan 1, 2023, through Dec. 31, 2025. Immanuel will pay for ongoing repair work and purchases with money from the Endowment Trust Fund, which then will be replenished as your pledge dollars arrive.

JOIN WORSHIP IN PERSON OR ONLINE





NEWS FROM YOUR CONGREGATION COUNCIL

Immanuel's congregation council met Tuesday, Aug. 23. Topics of discussion included:

- An update from the finance committee about the church's finances at midyear. Giving is slightly ahead of projections and expenses are slightly behind, though that assessment does not include costs associated with the boiler replacement and other repairs. The budget is expected to require ongoing transfers from the Endowment Trust Fund.
- Bishop Susan Candea will preach at Immanuel on Nov. 13, and also will lead adult forum that day.
- Rachel Decator has been hired as the new parish coordinator, replacing Linda Fewell.
- A kickoff event is planned for Sept. 25 for the campaign to cover capital expenses, including the new boiler, roof repairs and stained glass window repairs.

How are the funds raised in the HOA CROP Hunger Walk used?

The monies raised by the HOA CROP Hunger Walk will be used to fund global projects that include 1) food security and nutrition, 2) water, sanitation and hygiene, 3) refugee protection and resettlement, and 4) disaster preparedness and response. Of the funds raised in Kansas City, 25 percent will support agencies like MLM, Shepherd's Center and a Raytown summer lunch program for kids. Find more information about CWS/CROP <u>here</u>.



KENYAN CHLDREN'S FUND CONTINUES LIFE-SAVING ASSISTANCE



The Kenyan Children's Fund, Immanuel's global mission project, helps meet the needs of children in Masii, Kenya, who have been orphaned by HIV/AIDS and are living in deep poverty.

Each month, the fund pays for much-needed food supplements and some household products for 45 children and their guardians. It also pays for educational expenses, clothing, medical care, home repairs and more.

Your donation of \$390 per year to Kenyan Children's Fund, payable to Immanuel, provides basic support for one child for an entire year. But contributions of any amount are a blessing.

CONTACT THE CHURCH OFFICE TO ORDER CHANCEL FLOWERS

To celebrate special occasions or honor special people, Immanuel members can order flowers to grace the chancel during worship. To order flowers, simply contact the church office to let the parish coordinator know:

> How much would you like to spend. The standard chancel bouquet is \$60. You can place the payment in the Sunday offering plate in an envelope that indicates it is payment for flowers, or you can mail it to the church office.



- If there are particular flowers or a particular color scheme you'd like to see in the floral arrangement.
- The date on which the flowers should be in the chancel.
- Information about the flowers and your special occasion or honored individual that you would like to see in the bulletin. For example, "The chancel flowers are given by Jane and Joe Smith to the glory of God and in celebration of their 50th wedding anniversary."

The parish coordinator will order the flowers, and will alert the Altar Guild so the bouquet can be on display on the correct Sunday.
