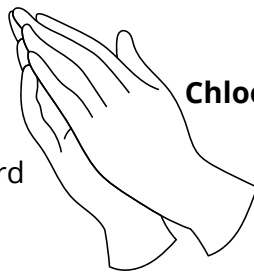

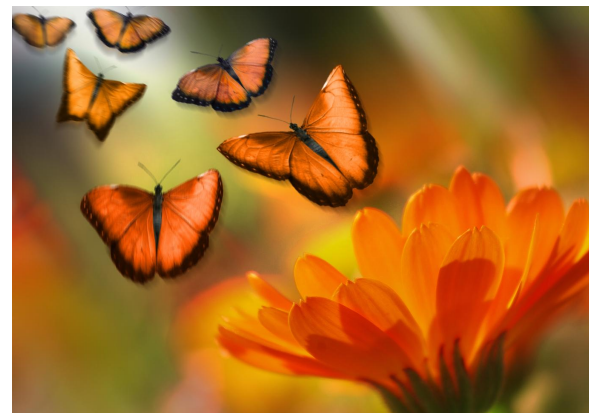
Our Chrysalis Moment

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights of the August 18, 2020, Council Meeting

- Financial status was reviewed and while expenses and giving are both below budget, the net result is that finances are in order. The Stewardship Committee plays an important part in our financial health. The Chair seat is currently opened and will be addressed in the near future.
 - Pastor Micah Sievenpiper reported that the Advisory Committee on Re-Engagement and Re-Opening has sent a survey to the congregation seeking help to define ILC's future directions. So far 39 responses have been received. Those who have not responded are encouraged to do so, and will find a link to the survey in Friday's new weekly news email.
 - The ILC Christmas Store Task Force, sighting several pandemic related reasons, reluctantly made a recommendation not to host this year's Christmas Store. Among the reasons sighted are: the safety of volunteers, customers, the Purple Dragon, and ILC members; potential liability should we be found not to have provided adequate space meeting CDC guidelines; and MLM proposed format changes requiring use of our facilities for 6-8 weeks. The Council ratified the recommendation, and MLM will be notified of our decision. We will seek other ways to participate this year, and sincerely hope that ILC will again be able to host in 2021.
 - Following up on previously mentioned plans the Council has scheduled an August 29th Zoom Retreat to continue our discussion on what it means to be church leaders during the pandemic and beyond.

The Heart of America (HOA) CROP Hunger Walk is going virtual this year, but that isn't stopping Karen Bame!

Karen has walked in every HOA CROP Hunger Walk since she moved to Kansas City in 1990, and COVID-19 is not going to stop her from participating in her 31st consecutive walk to raise money to feed hungry people!

So, on Saturday, October 10, 2020, at 10 AM, Karen will put on her sneakers and walk until she has gotten at least 10,000 steps on her Fitbit! Because this year will be Karen's 31st consecutive year of walking in the HOA CROP Hunger Walk, Immanuel's Social Ministry Committee has set a goal of raising **\$3100!**



What is the HOA CROP Hunger Walk?

*"CROP Hunger Walks are community-based walk events held in cities and towns across the United States raising funds to support the global mission of **Church World Service**, a faith-based organization transforming communities around the globe through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster. Twenty five percent of the funds raised are returned to the host community to support local hunger fighting efforts."*

The monies raised by the HOA CROP Hunger Walk will be used to fund global projects that include 1) food security and nutrition, 2) water, sanitation and hygiene, 3) refugee protection and resettlement, and 4) disaster preparedness and response. The 25% of funds raised in Kansas City will support agencies like MLM, Shepherd's Center and a Raytown summer lunch program for kids.

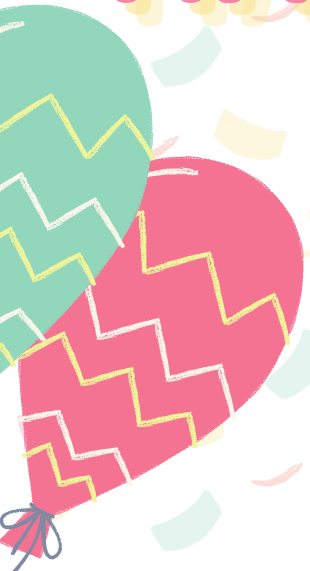


