
Who's Starring Now

Bruce Davison and Molly Ringwald costar in the much lauded Vineyard Theatre's Off-Broadway production of How I Learned to Drive currently playing at the Century Theatre off Union Square at 19 E. 15th Street. Mr. Davison's performance is charming and charismatic and Ms. Ringwald is a capable actress who handles the material deservedly. Mark Brokaw's strong direction gives

these out of time, out of mind moments a flare beyond their composition. Mary Lousie Parker brought her own special quirky erotic persona to the role giving it more life than the content provides and David Morse added a sultry erotic masculinity that Davison makes up with charm but the undertow of thwarted "Desire Under The Elms" is not in the material. However the true worth of the ticket lies in the delightful performance given by Deirdre Lovejoy as Ringwald's mother. Three little monologues that are a big bang for your buck.
