



7-Day Devotional Plan: The Feast of Trumpets

Overview

This 7-Day Devotional Plan on Yom Teruah guides believers through the biblical meaning and prophetic significance of the Feast of Trumpets. Each day explores a unique theme, from repentance, remembrance, and spiritual battle to coronation and resurrection, all centered on the call of the shofar. With Scripture, reflections, and prayers, this plan awakens hearts to prepare for Yahshua's return and to live faithfully in covenant with Yahweh.

Day 1: The Mystery of Yom Teruah	Day 2: The Shofar and Repentance
Scripture Reading: Leviticus 23:23–25 Numbers 29:1–6 Reflection: Yom Teruah is unique among Yahweh’s appointed times. Unlike Passover or Shavuot, it comes with no stated reason. This silence is intentional, inviting His people to walk by faith and trust His unfolding plan. The word <i>Teruah</i> itself points to shouting, alarm, and trumpet blasts; sounds that demand attention even when the meaning is not fully explained. Yahweh calls us to obedience, not only when the purpose is clear but also when it remains hidden. Prayer: Father Yahweh, teach me to trust You even when I do not understand. Help me walk by faith, obeying Your Word in confidence that Your wisdom is greater than mine. In Yahshua’s name, So Be It.	Scripture Reading: Joel 2:1, 12–13 Reflection: The shofar’s first message is repentance. Its piercing cry is an alarm to wake spiritual sleepers. Joel connects the trumpet blast to fasting, mourning, and returning to Yahweh with all the heart. The shofar warns of judgment but also opens the door to mercy for those who turn back. Each sounding is Yahweh’s gracious invitation to examine ourselves and return to Him. Prayer: Yahweh, let the sound of the shofar awaken me to repentance. Search my heart, reveal my sin, and draw me closer to You with humility and sincerity. In Yahshua’s name, So Be It.
Day 3: The Shofar and Remembrance	Day 4: The Shofar and Battle
Scripture Reading: Exodus 19:16–19 Reflection: At Mount Sinai, the trumpet grew louder as Yahweh descended in fire. The sound announced His covenant, reminding Yahshar-el that they were His chosen people. The shofar is a call to remembrance, to recall His faithfulness and to renew our commitment to His Word. Each blast reminds us that we are bound to Him in covenant and identity. Prayer: Yahweh, remind me daily of Your	Scripture Reading: Joshua 6:20 Reflection: Jericho’s walls fell not by human strength but by Yahweh’s power, heralded by the shofar. The blast of the trumpet was the sound of victory. In our lives, the shofar symbolizes Yahweh’s authority to break down strongholds, fears, and sins that enslave us. When the trumpet sounds, it is a reminder that the battle belongs to Him, not us. Prayer: Yahweh, I surrender my battles into Your

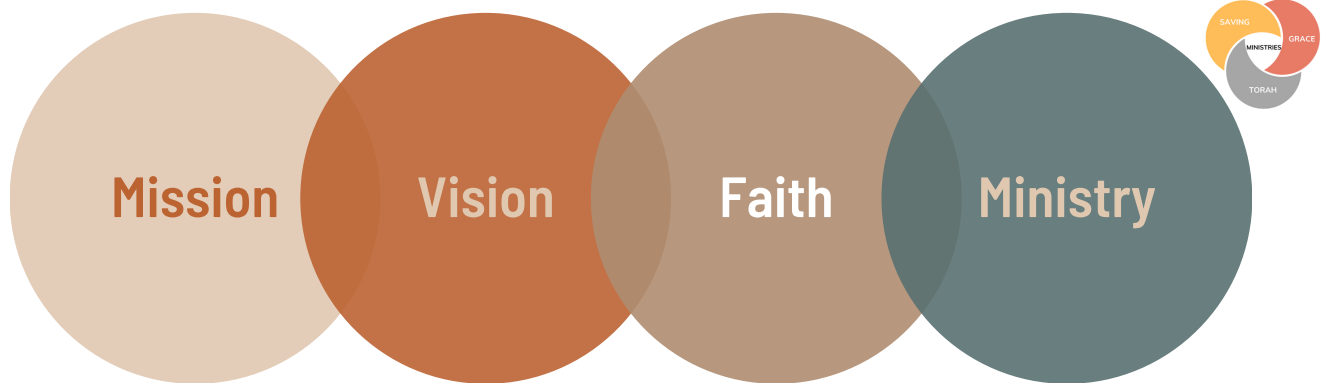
covenant faithfulness. Do not let me forget who I am in You or the promises that bind me to Your Kingdom. In Yahshua's name, So Be It.	hands. Tear down the walls in my life that keep me from walking in freedom and let me trust fully in Your power. In Yahshua's name, So Be It.
Day 5: The Shofar and Coronation	Day 6: The Shofar and Resurrection
Scripture Reading: 1 Kings 1:39-40 Reflection: When Solomon was crowned king, the shofar announced his enthronement. The trumpet was the sound of kingship and authority. In the same way, every blast of the shofar foreshadows Yahshua's coronation as King of kings. One day, His return will be heralded by heavenly trumpets, declaring that His reign has begun. Prayer: Yahshua, I proclaim You as King over my life. May every trumpet blast remind me of Your sovereignty and the day when all nations will bow before Your throne. In Yahshua's name, So Be It.	Scripture Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:52 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17 Reflection: The last trumpet will signal resurrection. It will awaken the dead, transform the living, and gather Yahweh's people into His presence forever. This is the hope of Yom Teruah that death will be swallowed up in victory, and eternal life will begin at the sound of the trumpet. Every blast rehearses that glorious day. Prayer: Yahweh, fill me with hope for the resurrection. Strengthen my faith to endure until the last trumpet sounds, when You will gather Your people into eternal joy. In Yahshua's name, So Be It.
Day 7: A Wake-Up Call	
Scripture Reading: Romans 13:11 Revelation 14:12 Reflection: Yom Teruah is a wake-up call. It reminds us that salvation is nearer now than ever before. The trumpet urges us to repent, to reconcile, and to live holy, set-apart lives. The true preparation for Yahshua's return is faithfulness: keeping Yahweh's commandments and holding fast to the faith of Yahshua. The trumpet calls us not only to listen but to act.	

Prayer:

Yahweh, awaken me from spiritual slumber. Help me to live faithfully, keeping Your commandments and holding fast to the testimony of Yahshua until the day He returns.
