# June 11 Guild Project **Twill Spray Bottle** Be sure to note the date change.

Our project for the June meeting is a continuous mist spray bottle with a twill design. Start with a wooden slotted base and end with a braided border like none you have seen. This project is not a difficult one so it is a good introduction for new weavers who want to try something new. There will be a large selection of #1 round reed in solid colors and natural. The twill can be done

with flat or flat oval in 1/4" or 11/64th. The choice is yours so kits will not be made. It only takes one or two long pieces to weave the center part of the bottle.

# Summer Weave-In June 25th, 2022 9am—4 pm Annie Oakly Room, National Cowboy and Western Herritage Museum



#### **Cherokee Swirl**

Taught by Mary Lee 7" x 7" x 7" Intermediate level Cost: \$20

The basket for the June 25th class is an intermediate level basket called Cherokee Swirl. It is woven in a twill pattern with 7mm FF and 1/4" FO reed and is about 7"X 7" X 7." There will be a handle option for those interested.



Rivercane baskets have been made in the southeast for thousands of years. They are a hallmark craft of the Cherokee people. Several Cherokee basket makers have remarked that their mothers-who, for the most part taught them to weave-did not use names for the many patterns they wove into their baskets. Quoting Rowena Bradley of Western North Carolina, "My mother never had no names or no meaning to her designs. She just made them." Instead, basket makers communicated in terms of the weave itself, for example "over-two-under-two" or "over-five-under-five." Some say pattern names were given in the early 20th century by culture workers and teachers who encouraged basketmaking in the many Indian boarding schools set up to assimilate native peoples to Anglo ways. This pattern has been revised by Mary Lee

and was originally published by Carol Tunicliffe in the 1990s. If you are interested in weaving this basket, please notify Mary Lee at Leefam77@cox.net or call and leave a message at 405-329-6253.

#### Flower File Taught by Janet Newman Two sizes offered 13" x 9" x 8" or 10" x 9" x 8" Beginner Class Cost: \$25



Flower File is a beginner basket that anyone can make. The pattern will be very detailed. You will have the choice to make a basket big enough to hold file folders. Or you can make a smaller basket that would look nice on a counter in the kitchen or in the Bathroom holding towels and washcloths.

The basket has a filled bottom with chicken feet that make the inside interesting. The basket is woven mostly with 5/8" F spokes and 3/8" F weavers in the traditional over/under weave. Brown is woven first to represent dirt in a garden. The green is used for grass. The basket has a yellow strip half way up to represent the center of the flowers. The front of the basket tapers to a "V" making for a very stylish basket. The flowers are added last and are very easy to make. You will have a choice of which basket you want to make. ## **Twining a Base Row & Filler Spokes**






I have never felt too comfortable with twining a base row. I know it is better to have it because it gives a solid line to bend the spokes up for the sides of the basket. It just holds everything in place.

If you study the pictures to the left you will see how holes can be left when you combine a solid bottom with filler spokes and twining. The fillers can fold up inside the

twining. Sometimes the twining can slip over the sides and be loose. With this new way of twining a base row, you can eliminate these problems.

The new base row is done by weaving the base row with fillers, then twining around the base leaving the fillers out of the twining. Once the base row is twined the fillers are folded over the twining. Thus holding the twining in. I got this from a recent pattern but I honestly can not remember whose pattern it was. So sorry to that person. Let me know if you recognize this as your technique. It may only be new to me. I like it though and thought I would share it.



Twine the base without catching the filler spokes. Fold the fillers over and tuck them in. Then the base is finished.

Inside of base

The filler spokes can be made into chicken feet as seen to the right below or they can be folded over and tucked into the third spoke from the end as shown below to the left. These two techniques can be done so the fillers fold to the inside or the outside. Chicken feet can also be tucked into the weaving on the side of the basket.
