At the September meeting the baskets will be wrapped in clear cellophane paper and tied with a ribbon. A card will be attached that says the basket was handmade and donated by the Oklahoma Basket Weavers Guild.

Materials:

5/8" FF-spokes ½" FF-weavers- inside and outside rim 3/16" -bottom retaining row and lasher Seagrass - rim filler

Base 7" X 7" square, 3" High

Using 5/8" FF, cut 14 spokes of natural reed at 18" each

Wet spokes and mark wrong, (rough) side of all 18° reed spokes

Layout 7 of the 18" spokes horizontally.

Weave in the center vertical spoke beginning under the first Horizonfall spoke

Square up the base to 7" X 7"

Leave about 3/8" space between spokes,

Weave with 3/16" around the square bottom one time, flattening the corners at an angle.

Upset spokes gently.

Sides:

Weave 6 start /stop rows of flat $1/2^n$ reed. The 6^{th} row of $\frac{1}{2}$ will be the under the rim row.

Pack your weavers down, square the corners, and cut and tuck spokes.

Rim with ½" flat reed inside and outside of rim, with sea grass between the rims, and lash with 3/16" flat oval reed.

Basket pattern for the Beginner's Class.
Bring a SMILE, TOOLS and HELPING HANDS.

Be prepared for a fun time.

Explanation of May Project Which is a Nantucket RIM

This article is reprinted from the November 2013 newsletter.

At the May guild meeting, Mike Tickle will show us how to rim a Nantucket basket. Everyone is encouraged to have a 5" Nantucket basket ready to rim. Nantucket baskets are made on a mold. Most of us do not have access to the molds. Mike has a number of 5" molds. You can use one for a month with a \$10 deposit. When you bring the mold back to the next guild meeting you will get your \$10 back which can then be used to buy the handle and rim which is made of cherry. Mike will answer any questions you have about how to make a Nantucket.

As you can see, I got mine made and I have never made a Nantucket. Basically you cut 6" spokes from 1/4" cane. Trim the last inch to inch and a half down to about half of the width. They will not fit into the slot in the base so will have to be sanded a little on the underside. Do not wet the spokes. I used 41 spokes in my basket. Use the screw and plastic washer to attach the base to the mold. Insert the spokes and evenly space them. Take a very long piece of narrow cane and do a continuous



weave until you reach the top of the mold. Do not do anything else with the basket except take it off the mold. Mike will tell us how to finish the basket in May.

The molds will be available at the January and March guild meetings so everyone will have a chance to get a basket made before the May guild meeting. If you take a mold home be sure to bring it back to the next meeting. Bring your basket in May and Mike will have everything to finish the rim and attach the handle. This will be a great experience and lots of fun. Plus you get one of those lovely Nantucket baskets for \$10.

Small Twill Heart Basket

Materials: 5 by 4 & 1/2" heart with 20 holes #3 round reed 11/64" dyed reed

Cut 10 spokes 12" long from #3 round reed

Insert ends of spokes in two adjacent holes from back





Weave an over two under one consecutive weave for 8 rows taper and end over where you started.



Wet all spokes

Taking a spoke go behind two and out



Continue around basket





Crimp at tip of heart







Next you go in front of two and in









Cut spokes at an angle past the next spoke. Shape your basket and enjoy!
