### Weaver's Weekend:

The Catalog is about ready for publishing on the website. Marcia has been assembling the work after Janet did it for many years. Because the format is different there have been some glitches to work out, but it is coming along. Diane Wilson will be working on registration, so look for that soon.

Registration fees have gone up to \$55.00 for the weekend. If coming for one day only, the cost will be \$30 a day for each Friday or Saturday, and \$20 for just Sunday.

It was necessary to raise the registration fee due to the facility, food and everything else going up in cost.

The instructors have been chosen and will be bringing some wonderful, new creations of various difficulties for us to learn. There will be 13 instructors, 38 different basket classes, and 11 vendors.

Kathy asked if scissor sharpening will be offered this year, and Marcia said she would try to contact the person who offers that.

### **Business:**

Calendar - Member Projects at Guild Meeting/ Mary Lee

Mary Lee, Nancy R. and Susan Steel will be working on a pattern for our June guild project.

Remember to look in the newsletter for the contact person for each guild project. The information is specifically put in the newsletter, so the person responsible can correctly answer your questions.

June 17 – Guild project will be Square Basket (orange, turquoise, yellow, and black). The instructors will demonstrate the techniques and encourage individual creative solutions to the weaving project. If you want to add beads to your project, the beads need to be able to string onto a #4 round reed. A variety of colors will be offered.

**August 19** -We will be making Positive Tomorrow baskets. We have been doing this service project for 25 years. Positive Tomorrow is a school for homeless children with an outreach for family members. Once the baskets are made, guild members fill the baskets with kitchen stuff for new homeowners associated with the school. One kit will be provided for those who sign up. If you want more baskets to make Janet has agreed to supply baskets. **September 16** – State Fair demo – from 1:00-5:00. Tickets to the fair and parking will be provided. You will need volunteers to sign up sometime between June and September. 

# CLASS DEFINITIONS

### TRADITIONAL

**Traditional** – Traditional baskets are woven from reed or cane in an over 1 under 1 construction and are used to carry or hold something.

**Ribbed** – Ribbed baskets have spokes of round or oval material that extend from one side to the other and are tucked into a God's Eye, or other appropriate design, on either side of hte basket. They can be woven on hoops ro rings that are held in place by this design. They were used for gathering eggs, melons and potatoes.

**Twill Variations** – Twill weave is sometimes called herringbone weave. The spokes are flush against each other rather than spread apart as in traditional weaving. The basic weave is over and under a repeating number of spokes, forming a pattern or design. There are many variations that make designs such as a diamond, arrow or "X".

**Coiled** – A coiled basket is sewn together with such things as waxed linen, sinew, raffia or fabric. Typically, coiled baskets are made of fabric, pine needles or native grasses that are wound, tied or sewn in rows around the basket.

#### **NON-TRADITIONAL**

**Non-Traditional** – These baskets have unusual designs or are made of materials not usually associated with traditional basketry. Some examples of these materials are paper, ribbon, plastic strips, wire and yarn.

**Non-Wood** – Non-wood baskets can be woven from anything other than wood, such as gourds, pine needles, feathers, beads, agate, bones, antlers, waxed linen, string and wire.

**Gathered Materials** – These baskets are made of things gathered from nature such as grapevine, honeysuckle, kudzu, grasses, bark and willow. They can be different shapes and can be woven many ways.

**Holiday** – Can be woven with any material, in any configuration but has to have an obvious holiday theme. Any traditional American holiday is accepted.

## Volunteers Needed:
