Falling Leaves Basket

Falling Leaves is a basket created by Suzanne Moore of NC Basket Works. She has given us permission to make the basket and the guild is paying for the kits for guild members who are present at the guild meeting.

If you would like to buy a kit, what is left over will be offered on a first come basis. The basket measures 8" L x 6" D x 8



1/2" Tall. The basket has 5/8" flat spokes, filler spokes and 1/4" flat weavers. There are 2 accent colors and leaves to attach to the basket to make it a truly fall addition to your home.

Old Business:



Meeting adjourned at 12:35








Rachael Durham from Positive Tomorrows (PT) came to the




