August 19 Guild Project Positive Tomorrows Basket

Our August project is our community service project. It is a basket very much like the Napkin Basket only a little bigger. We have been doing this project every year for the last 25 years. The guild will pay for you to make up to 3 baskets. You will make one basket at the guild meeting. If you make any other baskets you do it at home. You fill the baskets with items for the kitchen. Things like measuring spoons and cup, tea towels and dishcloths, spatula and spoons. You can also put things like tape, notepad, scissors, pen, small candle etc. Please do not put anything like Comet that can make a mess and no food items. You bring your basket back to the October guild meeting. If for some reason you can't

make the October meeting, you can bring your basket to the retreat. All the baskets will be wrapped in plastic wrap, then tied with a ribbon and a tag that says it was handmade by the guild.

If you live out of town, you can still participate. Make a basket of your choice, fill it and bring it to the retreat. We like to take 50 or more baskets.

Positive Tomorrow's is the only school for homeless kids in Oklahoma. It's not just a school. They see the kids go to the dentist and get glasses if they need it. Also, clothes, tooth paste, deodorant, etc. Their parents are in classes too. They learn how to write a resume, do an interview, balance a checking account, etc. When the family is stable and ready for an apartment they get to pick out a basket.

PRESIDENT'S NOTES

It's been a busy summer in so many ways. About 7 people worked the Chuckwagon Festival. Four people worked the National Day of the Cowboy. At least 4 went to the Missouri Retreat. People have been entering their best baskets in the State Fair. We had a grand time at the Summer Weavin. So you see, Baskets are busy business.

I want to remind you that you have to come to the guild meeting to receive a kit. If you have ordered a kit you are obligated to pay for it. Once the kit is cut the reed is only good for that basket. That is why we require payment if you order a kit. The guild can't afford to have a lot or leftover reed from projects.

Be sure to sign up to take your best baskets to the State Fair. You have a chance to win Best of Show which pays \$25 or First place which pays \$10.

Many of you have asked about me. I entered the hospital on July 3rd and left rehab on July 24th. I had my third major surgery in 9 months when it was found out that the first Femur surgery did not heal and the rod that was placed inside the bone broke. It took a 4 hour surgery to replace the rod and fix the bone. I have a lot more metal in my body now. I learning to walk again and getting stronger.

CLASS DEFINITIONS

TRADITIONAL

Traditional – Traditional baskets are woven from reed or cane in an over 1 under 1 construction and are used to carry or hold something.

Ribbed – Ribbed baskets have spokes of round or oval material that extend from one side to the other and are tucked into a God's Eye, or other appropriate design, on either side of hte basket. They can be woven on hoops ro rings that are held in place by this design. They were used for gathering eggs, melons and potatoes.

Twill Variations – Twill weave is sometimes called herringbone weave. The spokes are flush against each other rather than spread apart as in traditional weaving. The basic weave is over and under a repeating number of spokes, forming a pattern or design. There are many variations that make designs such as a diamond, arrow or "X".

Coiled – A coiled basket is sewn together with such things as waxed linen, sinew, raffia or fabric. Typically, coiled baskets are made of fabric, pine needles or native grasses that are wound, tied or sewn in rows around the basket.

NON-TRADITIONAL

Non-Traditional – These baskets have unusual designs or are made of materials not usually associated with traditional basketry. Some examples of these materials are paper, ribbon, plastic strips, wire and yarn.

Non-Wood – Non-wood baskets can be woven from anything other than wood, such as gourds, pine needles, feathers, beads, agate, bones, antlers, waxed linen, string and wire.

Gathered Materials – These baskets are made of things gathered from nature such as grapevine, honeysuckle, kudzu, grasses, bark and willow. They can be different shapes and can be woven many ways.

Holiday – Can be woven with any material, in any configuration but has to have an obvious holiday theme. Any traditional American holiday is accepted.
