

President Janet Newman called the meeting to order at 12:15 pm, June 11, 2022 at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum.

Welcome and introductions were made.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes for the June meeting.

Old Business:

Weaver's Weekend Report:

- Marcia reported that plans for Weavers' Weekend are going well.

- A volunteer will be needed to contact restaurants in the area to see if they will donate gift cards for the silent auction.
- There will be a need for volunt5eers to help set up on Thursday and to sell raffle tickets at the retreat.

- As of Friday evening, 22 people had already registered.

Weaving With Day Lilies

The top two picture show examples of baskets I have woven this

year with day lilies. I normally let my day lilies die in the Fall and clean them up in the Spring. This year I decided it was time I learned to weave with them. My first baskets on the right were lopsided and loosely woven. I went online to Matt Tommy's website called Woven Sculpture from Nature.

The picture to the right shows Matt's workshop where he has gathered green leaves and a few piles of ones that dried naturally. According to Matt, the best leaves are the ones that dry naturally. The leaves have to dry before you can weave them.

When ready to weave with the leaves, you just wet them and put them in a wet towel and let them

mellow overnight. The basic technique for weaving with

these leaves is to twine them with two leaves. When a piece gets short, just slip a new piece in with the end sticking out. It can be trimmed short after the basket is finished. One trick that takes a little getting use to is to twist the leaves as you twine. So the technique is: take the weaver on top behind the next spoke and twist it. Hold it with a finger and do the next weaver. It's twining with a twist.

The picture to the left shows an example of Mat Tommy's weaving the bottom of a basket. To the tight is a basket being woven from Iris leaves.






The website: https://www.matttommey.com/blog/archives/06-2022' has a video about weaving with natural

materials. This video does not show the twist that I used. The material in the video is very small. Mine was bulker. They is why I twisted it. The video is in the June 2022 Archives of Matt Tommy's website. Matt is a professional artist. He offers online classes where he shows you more information if you are interested. You can learn a lot from his website even without purchasing his classes.

A note about the basket on the top right. It is my most resent basket. I put the spray bottle in the picture to help show how small this basket is. It is woven with day lilies. The green is the leaf stems from Wild Violets. I let them dry and them mellowed them overnight in a wet towel. It surprinting how strong the leaves are after they are dried and then soaked overnight. They really need the overnight time in a towel. If you just soak them in a sink of water a couple of hours, they will still be crispy and will break. The top of my baskets are braided. This is a little tricky and I suggest marking the starting point on each row of the rim.
