- Cliff Gibbons called the meeting to order at 1900 and spoke about the membership drive, the Gazette, old business, new business, past events, and upcoming events.
- It's an important time of the year for the membership drive. There has been talk that George Martin Strip Steak is willing to offer some type discounts to the Platinum members.
- We are looking for feedback from the community if there is still interest in continuing the Gazette. We might look to have fewer editions or possibly go digital.
- Old business -The marathon was still an inconvenience but seem to run a little smoother. One community member stated that the resident pass allowed them to leave there property but then could not return. We would like feedback from the community if there were any other inconveniences caused by the marathon. There also seemed to be debris and signs left behind that was not cleaned up.
- There was no update on the proposed sewer project at this point. A community member read an article in the newspaper about possibly enforcing advanced septic systems.
- The Oakdale Yacht Club recently sought out the GRCA looking for support in expanding their docks. The GRCA has not taken a position either way and is looking for more feedback from the community. Currently there are some members for it and some members against it. It was proposed to have a separate meeting to discuss the topic. One of the community members suggested a visit from the NYSDEC. He also discussed other improvements such as new athletic fields, auditorium upgrades, lobby and security upgrades, updated locker rooms, and cafeteria upgrades.

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

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Winter means snow . . . and snow blowers

For snow up to 24 inches ...

Consumer Reports recommends going for a heavy-duty twostage model. All models have a spinning auger that breaks up the snow, and an impeller that hurls it out of the chute. Better models also have beefier engines, easier steering, and better tires. Lighter-duty two-stage models have the same auger and impeller as larger models and are easier to store. But they don't clear as fast.

Pros: These models clear the widest swath and handle steeper inclines. They can muscle through the snow as well as the frozen piles at the foot of the driveway.

Cons: They're heavy and expensive, and they can take up as much storage space as a lawn tractor. They don't usually clean right down to the pavement, a plus only for gravel driveways, and they need maintenance.

For snow up to 18 inches .


Lighter-duty two-stage models have the same auger, impeller, and driven wheels as larger models, but they don't clear snow as quickly because of their narrower clearing widths **Pros:** They cost a bit less and require less storage space than their larger siblings

Cons: The less expensive ones come with fewer additional features, such as freewheel steering and single-hand controls. For snow up to 9 inches

When you have less than a foot of snow, a single-stage model, which has a high-speed auger to loosen and hoist the snow through the chute, will suffice. These machines have a rubbertipped auger that helps propel them forward and is safe for deck finishes

Pros: They're fairly light and easy to handle, and they clean down to bare pavement. They also take up only about as much storage space as a lawn mower

Cons: These smaller models have the most trouble with dense, wet snow, particularly plow piles, and they can't be used on grave el surfaces.



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
