October Town Meeting Highlights

Guest Speakers/Dignitaries in Attendance: Suffolk County Legislator Tom Cilmi, Suffolk County Sector Police Officer Ralph Hudson

ELECTIONS:

The slate of current Officers was presented, and was unanimously voted in: Cliff Gibbons – President, Ashley Salzo – Vice President, Nancy Stein – Treasurer, Michelle Bassen – Recording Secretary. Joseph Bertuglia was voted in as Corresponding Secretary

NEW BUSINESS:

Goal is revive membership and participation in the Community Association.

Committees (Membership, Welcoming, Beautification, By-laws, PR/In the Know, Marketing/Social Events) – All Board Members must be part of a committee to remain on the board; non-board members are welcome and encouraged to join committees.

"Downtown" Flower Baskets and Watering Program – We are looking for Business or Family sponsors to bring the Flower Basket Program similar to East Islip to Great River

Neighborhood Watch Program is off and running – contact Ashley Salzo if you would like to get your block involved. Participation requires that more than ½ of the homes on the block want to participate.

Suffolk County Sector Police Officer Ralph Hudson addressed the attendees. He will get Ashley information to disperse to the community regarding boating courses that will be held by the Marine Bureau. He advised they are concentrating on speeding along Main Street and Union Blvd. He warned residents about driveway scams (which is winding down with the winter approaching), not to leave holiday tips under garbage cans and importance of locking their homes and cars, and not to leave the door from the garage to the house unlocked as it is very easy to open the garage doors.

One resident asked if the Association has information regarding the Westbrook complex and whether they have any tax breaks, and the mix of affordable and rental units. The association will see if they can get information on the project.

With respect to the crew (rowing) teams launching from Great River, there was initially a problem with the busses sitting along Great River Road, but that was taken care of. One resident said that there were about 17 cars waiting for their kids. The Recording Secretary should draft a letter to Legislator Cilmi expressing the communities concerns about traffic.

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

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

Great River Community Q & A

Here are a few of the questions residents have asked the GRCA:

Why are there neighborhood watch signs only on certain blocks?

A:Some blocks are not part of Neighborhood Watch. In order to be a part of the program, the block must have a block captain and one more than half of the neighbors must be in support of the program. If you live on a block that does not have this program and would be interested in it, you can send your questions and inquiries to greatriverwatch@gmail.com.

My neighbor has had a contractors sign for advertisement on the front lawn for months. Is there a code for that?

A: The town code does allow small signage. See Schedule of Signs Regulations (68-398). The community asks that contractor signage be removed as soon as possible as some of these signs can be distracting.

Why do people put garbage out and let it sit for 4 days?

A: We have stressed as a community that leaving your trash out for long periods of time will not only cause rodents but is an eyesore and reduces our property value. As per code, garbage can be put out after 5:00 PM the day before collection.

My sidewalk is full of leaves, when will the town come clean them up?

A: Any property with a sidewalk in front of or behind it (River Rd) is responsible for the clean up. The Town of Islip will not clean these leaves/mow the lawn. The town IS responsible for cleaning up in front of the sump Area and have been notified.

The trees that were planted along River Rd need trimming? Should I do that?

A: Although we appreciate it, the town has been notified and will handle this.

Who maintains the signs at the entrances?

A: A resident (Ron Gibbons) has offered to have drawings made and send out to bid for annual maintenance & plantings. The cost will determine if the GRCA can afford this. The Town of Islip is not responsible for this.

Is there a noise ordinance for leaf blowers, lawnmowers, etc.?

A: Noise from operation of machinery/construction should take place between the hours of 7:00AM 8:00PM on weekdays and 10:00AM – 5:00PM on Sundays. State or Federal holidays follow a Sunday schedule.

How is my GRCA membership fee used?

A: Our association works on a lot of different components of our community with our member's fees. One of our most enjoyed and visited component is our social events. We ensure that most of our gatherings are free of charge to help bring together our community. We also offer discounted fees for any paid event. In addition to the more visible way these fees are spent we also maintain our informative website, pay for a mass email program, printing and distributing of our newsletter, beautification of the community, welcoming new neighbors with a small gift and making donations to local events and organizations.

Winter tips

Winter storms and cold temperatures can be hazardous. Stay safe and healthy by planning ahead. Prepare your home and cars. Prepare for power outages and outdoor activity. Check on older adults. Although winter comes as no surprise, many of us are not ready for its arrival. If you are prepared for the hazards of winter, you will be more likely to stay safe and healthy when temperatures start to fall.

WINTER DRIVING:

- Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.
- Never run a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- Make certain your tires are properly inflated.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full.
- Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).
- Always look and steer where you want to go.
- Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle

PROTECTING PETS:

- Pets that live outdoors should be fed a bit more in the winter because they need the extra calories to stay warm. They also should have fresh water put out a couple of times a day, or consider a special bowl that prevents the water from freezing.
- If your pet goes outdoors, be aware of the temperature. Pets can get frostbite very easily on the ears, tail and paws.
- When walking your dog, check the paws to make sure that ice is not building up between the toes and that salt from the roads is not irritating the skin.
- f your dog is a swimmer, keep it on a leash around open water or unstable ice. Hypothermia can set in quickly and the dog may be unable to get out of the water.
- If decorating for the holidays, keep ornaments out of the reach of your pets. Remember that poinsettias, holly, mistletoe and other plants can be toxic if ingested

DRIVING IN THS SNOW

- Accelerate and decelerate slowly. Applying the gas slowly to accelerate is the best method for regaining traction and avoiding skids.
- Drive slowly. Everything takes longer on snow-covered roads. Accelerating, stopping, turning nothing happens as quickly as on dry pavement. Give yourself time to maneuver by driving slowly.
- The normal dry pavement following distance of three to four seconds should be increased to eight to ten seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.
- Know your brakes. If you have anti-lock brakes (ABS) and need to slow down quickly, press hard on the pedal-it's normal for the pedal to vibrate a bit when the ABS is activated. In cars without ABS, use "threshold" breaking, keeping your heel on the floorboard and using th ball of your foot to apply firm, steady pressure on the brake pedal.
- Don't stop if you can avoid it. There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling.
- Don't power up hills. Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads just starts your wheels spinning. Try to get a little inertia going before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top. As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed down hill as slowly as possible.
- Don't stop going up a hill. There's nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.
- Stay home. If you really don't have to go out, don't. Even if you can drive well in the snow, not everyone else can.

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NEW STOP SIGN:

The Town of Islip has recommended a 3 way stop sign be installed at the corner of River Rd and Leeside Drive.

Heckscher park to get Cottages

Cottages are being designed for Heckscher State Park in East Islip that will overlook the Great South Bay, with construction expected to begin in 2018.

The cabins and cottages, estimated to cost \$6 million, are made possible by Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo's promise to leverage \$900 million in private and public funding for state parks from 2011 to 2020

Great River Sewer Proposal

Suffolk County's Comprehensive Water Resources Management Plan identified four areas on the south shore where sewers would contribute to the overall health of our surface waters, tidal areas and sole source aquifers, including the Connetquot River Watershed

Slower Cooker Butternut Squash soup

32 ounces butternut squash (can use different types of squash to equal 32 oz., but use at least 16 oz of butternut squash in the mix)

2-3 shallots, chopped

2 cups of vegetable stock

3/4 cup lite coconut milk (canned)

Nutmeg

Salt

Instructions:

In slow cooker place:

Peeled and seeded squash

2 cups vegetable stock

Chopped shallots

Cook on high for 4 hours or low for 8 hours.

When the squash is fully cooked (soft, easily pierced with a fork) turn off the slow cooker and:

Add ¾ cup of lite coconut milk to the soup

Blend with an immersion blender or place soup in stand up blender and blend until smooth

Season with nutmeg and salt to taste.

Garnish with pumpkin seeds or feta cheese (optional

4 cups apple cider

1 (750-ml) bottlre red wine

1/4 cup honey

2 cinnamon sticks

1 orange, zested and juiced

4 whole cloves

3 star anise

4 oranges, peeled for garnish

KEEP CALM DRINK MULLED WINE

Instructions:

Combine the cider, wine, honey, cinnamon sticks, zest, juice, cloves and star anise in a large saucepan, bring to a boil and simmer over low heat for 10 minutes. Pour into mugs, add an orange peel to each and serve.
