2020 FEDERAL POVERTY GUIDELINES: To be eligible for many programs, families must earn below a predetermined annual income. The income limit varies by program. The limit is usually described as a certain percentage of the Federal Poverty Guidelines based on gross annual income. To determine the federal poverty guideline for families with more than eight members, find the limit for eight persons at 100% (\$44,120) and add \$4,480 for each additional person.
