



# MEDICAL WASTE BOX PACKING



## Cardboard Biohazard Boxes

### STEP 1



#### Set Up The Box

Open the self locking box & ensure the bottom flaps are inter-locked.

*Only approved medical waste boxes will be accepted by our staff. Federal regulations prevent us from collecting medical waste in any other type of container.*

### STEP 2



#### Line the Box

Insert the Red Bag Liner into the box and wrap it over the top of the box.

*The large liner bag should be used to hold all smaller items that are deposited into the box. Do not place items between the liner and the box container.*

### STEP 3



#### Tie The Bag Closed

Once the container is full, tie the bag closed and tuck it into the box.

*The liner should be tied off to prevent leaks and foul odors.*

### STEP 4



#### Fold Box Top Closed

Push handle sides outward. Fold the large center flaps inward. Fold handle flaps over and inward, inserting tabs into the slots. Push handle cut-outs through to complete the handles.

## COMPLIANCE

### BOXES

- Generators are responsible for packing their own waste.
- Each red bag liner must be tied by using a hand knot or tie device. Each bag must be securely closed/sealed.
- Closed red bag liners/contents must not be visible once the box is closed.
- Improperly packed containers will need to be repacked prior to removal.
- Only Regulated Medical Waste may be placed into the corrugated boxes.

### SHARPS

- All "sharps" material must be placed into a puncture resistant container designed for "sharps" waste. This includes: needles, syringes, broken glass, scalpels, culture slides, culture dishes, broken capillary tubes, broken rigid plastic & exposed dental wires.
- All sharps containers must be properly closed before being placed into the red bag liners & corrugated boxes.
- No loose sharps are permitted outside of sharps containers.
