is a coalition of premier research teams focused on supporting real-time monitoring and information exchange between the research community, election officials, government agencies, civil society organizations, and social media platforms. The Partnership, made up of the *Atlantic Council's Digital Forensic Research Lab (DFRLab)*, the *Stanford Internet Observatory*, *Graphika*, and the *University of Washington Center for an Informed Public*, was created to detect and mitigate the impact of election and voting related misinformation.

The Election Integrity Partnership, comprising organizations that specialize in understanding those information dynamics, aimed to create a model for whole-of-society collaboration and facilitate cooperation among partners dedicated to a free and fair election. With the narrow aim of defending the 2020 election against voting-related mis- and disinformation, it bridged the gap between government and civil society, helped to strengthen platform standards for combating election-related misinformation, and shared its findings with its stakeholders, media, and the American public. This report details our process and findings, and provides recommendations for future actions.

The EIP's primary goals were to:

- (1) identify mis- and disinformation before it went viral and during viral outbreaks,
- (2) share clear and accurate counter-messaging, and
- (3) document the specific misinformation actors, transmission pathways, narrative evolutions, and information infrastructures that enabled these narratives to propagate.

To identify the scope of our work, we built a framework to compare the policies of 15 social media platforms2 across four categories:

- Procedural interference: misinformation related to actual election procedures
- Participation interference: content that includes intimidation to personal safety or deterrence to participation in the election process
- Fraud: content that encourages people to misrepresent themselves to affect the electoral process or illegally cast or destroy ballots
- Delegitimization of election results: content aiming to delegitimize election results on the basis of false or misleading claims

The EIP used an innovative internal research structure that leveraged the capabilities of the partner organizations through a tiered analysis model based on "tickets" collected internally and from our external stakeholders. Of the tickets we processed, 72% were related to delegitimization of the election.

What is an Internet Observatory?

This database detects internet disruptions, online censorship, and cyber-attacks on critical infrastructure in the defense of human rights. The database is updated in real-time and provide country-level reports.

In the 2018-19 school year, total revenues are about \$6.5 billion. Another \$2.5 billion comes from sponsored research, \$1.3 billion comes from revenue generated by Stanford's health care services and \$1.3 billion comes from the endowment. (about 78 percent) is held in restricted funds, meaning that the donors that gave money to the endowment put that money towards a specific purpose, and the University is legally obligated to use that money only for that purpose. Valued at \$26.8 billion as of Aug. 31, 2018, Stanford has one of the largest endowments in the United States, exceeded only by those of Harvard (\$39.2 billion) and Yale (\$29.4 billion). The endowment itself is a bundle of over 7,000 individual donor-established funds merged into a larger pool. In addition to sharing key research findings and recommendations on government initiatives and policy priorities, the SIO team regularly consults with policymakers and stakeholder communities working to address online trust and safety issues.
