Ms. Marie Peaches, Polk Elementary teacher wins National K-12 Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) award. The PAEMST is the nation's highest honor for K-12 educators in the STEM field. Recipients of this award receive \$10,000, a presidential certificate and a trip to Washington, D.C. for professional development events.

"I enjoy watching children learn about life and the fact that life is science," Peaches said. "[Children don't] realize that everyday life, like the air you breathe or when you look up into the sky, that's all science. Watching them realize that everything you do, what you eat and how chemicals react, there's just nothing like it. Seeing their excitement makes me more excited about continuing to teach it."



Alexandria High School ace Spring 2025 tennis season. The Titans advanced to the Northern Region Tournament, where they beat Thomas Edison High School in the first round, before losing to top-ranked Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology in the regional quarterfinals. Alexandria City High School was the only city school to have both boys and girls teams play this spring.



Redistricting efforts for elementary and middle schools in Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS). As it stands now, ACPS elementary school campuses are diverse in terms of both race and economic status, reflecting the demographic makeup of the city itself. At the core of this work must be equity, especially for underprivileged children in Alexandria," Kellen Patterson, a parent at Patrick Henry, said at the May 12 meeting. "School zones should not reinforce patterns of disadvantage. They should promote diversity, inclusion and fair access to high quality education for every child, regardless of where they live or what they look like."



Baltimore Ravens draft ACHS Titan Robert Longerbeam. Robert, who played for T.C. Williams High School – now Alexandria City High School – and graduated in 2020 before earning a football scholarship to Rutgers, was drafted in the sixth round with the 212th pick by the Baltimore Ravens at the 2025 NFL Draft.

"I am so excited for him," Coach Longerbeam, his father, who led the Titans to a 24-20 mark and three playoff appearances in his four seasons at the helm, said. "[T.C.] was really good about allowing him to graduate in January of his senior year to go to Rutgers and pursue his dream. ... It's great that he's with such a storied franchise as the Ravens."

"I'm truly blessed to even be in this position," the new Raven, who will play cornerback for Baltimore and its head coach John Harbaugh, said. "This was a childhood dream that came true and gave me an opportunity, and now I want to take advantage of it. This is a great opportunity with a great organization. I pray everything works out." I wii do my best to make my city proud.



ACPS plans to censor student newspaper Theogony. Theogony, the Alexandria City High School student newspaper, along with other ACHS student publications, is facing censorship of its coverage by Alexandria City Public Schools administrators and the School Board, according to student journalists at Theogony.

The School Board plans to amend its policy on student publications to enforce stricter rules on coverage of controversial issues, such as transportation, the High School Project and transgender policies.

Theogony has existed since the 1950s and has been independently run for at least 16 years. In addition to covering controversial decisions at ACPS, Theogony journalists cover topics relating to high school students: phone use in schools, class schedules, book bans, sports, music and entertainment.
