The mystery of God's ways is sometimes hidden from the wise and intelligent. Jesus associates with those often excluded from the religious community. Like Paul, we struggle with our own selfish desires and seek God's mercy and forgiveness. We gather to be refreshed by Christ's invitation: "Come to me, all you that are weary." Gathered around word, water, and meal, we find rest for our souls.

The hymns we sing as a part of our prelude in recognition of this Independence Day weekend in the United States represent the traditions of the United States, both before and after its independence from England. Additionally, our sending hymn has connections to the heritage of the United States.

Lift Every Voice and Sing, composed first as a poem and then set to music in 1900 for a celebration of the birthday of Abraham Lincoln by brothers James Weldon Johnson and J. Rosamond Johnson, is often referred to as the "Black National Anthem" and was a symbol of the civil rights movement in the 1960s.

Many and Great, O God was composed by Joseph R. Renville, a member of the Dakota nation in Minnesota. He helped found the Lac Qui Parle mission in 1935; the tune name for this hymn is Lac Qui Parle in recognition, and the hymn was first published in the Dakota Hymnal of 1916.

O Beautiful for Spacious Skies was composed by Katherine Lee Bates, incorporating sights of her trip across the United States from Massachusetts to Colorado Springs.

Before You, Lord, We Bow, our sending hymn, was composed by Francis Scott Key, author of *The Star-Spangled Banner*, as a hymn of thanksgiving for the Fourth of July in 1832; it reminds us that regardless of whatever nation on Earth we live in, we are first and foremost thankful to be people of God and live in a creation of God.

Amen.



We are now back to normal office hours, 8:30am-1:30pm. For your safety and the safety of our staff, we are requesting when you come to Redeemer that you wear a mask and practice social distancing.

Outdoor public worship services will be held in the back lawn and parking lot on Sunday, July 12, and Sunday, August 9! The south lot will be blocked off to allow for social distancing. Parking will be available on the street and in the west lot; the handicapped parking stalls will still be available on either side of the south lot, and the staff parking spaces in the south lot will also be available for those with mobility concerns. Bring your own chair or blanket. The building will be closed. In the event of rain, the service will be cancelled and the livestream via YouTube will be available for you at home. A decision on a weather-related cancellation will be made by 7AM Sunday and be communicated over KTRF and Redeemer's Facebook page.

Indoor public worship services at Redeemer are suspended through at least September 6 (Labor Day weekend), at the recommendation of the Worship and Music Committee and the approval of the Church Council. Indoor worship services are being livestreamed on YouTube; the link is at Redeemer's website, redeemertrf.org. Links to bulletins are also on the website or in the description of the live event on YouTube. We encourage you to actively worship and do the liturgy, the "work of the people", as you watch the livestream.

Most other events at Redeemer have been cancelled.

Redeemer Masks: A small group of volunteers are sewing masks for Redeemer members only. Older Redeemer members will have priority; one mask per member. Call the church office if you need a mask. Your name will be placed on a list, and you will be notified as to how and when you can pick up your mask.

If you can help make masks or donate materials, please notify the office.

The purchase and display of altar flowers has been generally suspended during the time that we are not meeting as a congregation. If you bought flowers for these weeks, your flowers will be moved to another week with the note that they were bought for the week that we missed.
