Everyone loves basketball, well here's some Woodbridge basketball for you. "Belleville made good nine out of nineteen free throws from the fifteen foot line. Woodbridge could only make five out of twelve" (The Woodbridge leader, March 9th 1928.) Bad day for Woodbridge basketball, huh. It's okay, we probably got them back the next time. Time for the last sport of the day. Bowling! The Woodbridge Leader reports, "The newly organized Jolly Rogers bowling team took a clean sweep from the Sensky Five of Perth Amboy, in a three-game match at Perth Amboy last Saturday night" on March 9th 1928. Great job, Jolly Rogers. But I think I am a little too late. Sorry!

Now that we are done with some Woodbridge sports, you might be thinking what else. You might say this, everyone's townships have played sports in the past. That is true, but our township has something even more. We have a famous athlete who came from our township. His name was Lou Creekmur. Lou Creekmur was a famous football player. He is from a town in Woodbridge called Hopelawn. He was a 1944 graduate from Woodbridge High School. Lou Creekmur went way farther than expected. In 1950, Creekmur choose to play for the Detroit Lions. He played offensive guard and tackle. "Creekmur won All-Pro honors seven times and
