
Always have a "Plan B" costume!

From leaky diapers to spit up to <u>toilet training accidents</u>, this age is always reason to pack a backup costume and plan for the unexpected. If potty-training is still a new thing and there's a narrow window between "I have to go" and an accident, you might want to rethink a complicated costume. There is also no harm in putting him or her in an easy-on, easy-off diaper. <u>Get more tips for tiny monsters here!</u>

- Never allow small children to carve pumpkins. Children can draw a face with markers. Then parents can do the cutting. For the best control while carving, the American Society for Surgery of the Hand (AAHS) recommends adults use a small pumpkin saw (sold with other Halloween goods) in small strokes, directing the blade away from themself and others. The AAHS advises against using larger blades, which can become lodged in the pumpkin and cause injuries when pulled out. If injured by a blade, here are some guidelines to help you determine whether or not stitches are needed.
- Consider using a flashlight or glow stick instead of a candle to light your pumpkin. If you do use a candle, a votive candle is safest.
- Do not place candlelit pumpkins on a porch or any path where visitors may pass close by. They should never be left unattended.
- Remove tripping hazards to keep your home safe for visiting trick-ortreater's. Keep the porch and front yard clear of anything a child could trip over such as garden hoses, toys, bikes, and lawn decorations.
- Check outdoor lights and replace burned-out bulbs.
- Sweep wet leaves from sidewalks and steps.
- Restrain <u>pets</u> so they do not inadvertently jump on or bite a trick-ortreater.

Although most animals are friendly, some can be dangerous; take precautions to prevent animal bites. More than any other age group, children between the ages of 5 and 9 are the victims of animal bites—about 5% of all children this age are bitten by an animal every year. Children ages 9 to 14 are next in line as the most frequent victims of animal bites.

As a parent, you have ultimate responsibility for your child's safety around any animal—including your own pets, neighborhood pets, and wild animals. Here are some suggestions to talk over with child.



- Always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds. If your older children are going alone, plan and review the route that is acceptable to you. Agree on a specific time when they should return home and obtain flashlights with batteries for everyone. If Halloween doesn't start until after dark where you live and you h12
- ave younger children, check your local newspaper or recreation center for Halloween activities offered earlier in the day.
- Only go to homes with a porch light on.
- **Never enter a home or car for a treat.** Notify law enforcement authorities immediately about of any suspicious or unlawful activity.
- **Review with children how to call 9-1-1** (or their local emergency number) if they ever have an emergency or become lost or is prone to <u>wander</u>. See <u>Help Prevent Your Child from Going Missing for tips</u>.
- Know how to reduce your child's risk of a <u>pedestrian injury</u>—the most common injury to children on Halloween.
 - Stay in a group and communicate where they will be going.
 - Remember reflective tape for costumes and trick-or-treat bags.
 - Carry a <u>cell phone</u> for quick communication.
 - Remain on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk.
 - If no sidewalk is available, walk at the far edge of the roadway facing traffic.
 - Never cut across yards or use alleys.
 - Only cross the street as a group in established crosswalks (as recognized by local custom). Never cross between parked cars or out of driveways.
 - Don't assume the right of way. Motorists may have trouble seeing trick-or-treater's. Just because one car stops, doesn't mean others will!
