Legendary Warrior...

exemplifies what it means to be a Marine

NOTE – The following is a reprint of an article by Dan Lamothe that recently appeared on the Marine Corps Times website.

Chesapeake, VA – When **Staff Sergeant Cliff Wooldridge** arrived here in 2011 to serve as an instructor with **Marine Corps Security Force Regiment**, he was less than a year removed from beating a Taliban fighter to death in Afghanistan with his own machine gun.

The transition to a training environment was not easy. Wooldridge had served as an *anti-tank missileman* in **3rd Battalion**, **7th Marines**, out of Twentynine Palms, CA, as they pushed through a deployment in **Helmand province** in 2010. It included heavy combat in **Musa Qala** and **Sangin** districts, where insurgents were deeply entrenched.

Despite the difficult readjustment after arriving in Virginia, Wooldridge, then a Sergeant, persevered, his colleagues say. He became an instructor with Marine Corps Security Force Training Company's Close Quarter Battle School last year, volunteered with charities and showed such dedication to work that he was meritoriously promoted to staff sergeant.

He also received the **Navy Cross** in May 2012 for his heroism in Afghanistan in 2010. The award is second only to the Medal of Honor in recognition of combat valor.

For his leadership, heroism and quiet professionalism, Wooldridge, 25, is the **2013 Marine Corps Times Marine of the Year**. He doesn't think he deserves the award, he said, but he was touched that Marines in his chain of command nominated him for it

"There are definitely a lot of people who deserve this award over me, but the mere fact that I was even put up for this was incredible," Wooldridge said. "I'm very humbled."

Wooldridge recently joined one of the Corps' Fleet Antiterrorism Security Teams as a platoon sergeant. He will serve as the senior enlisted leader in 5th Platoon, Bravo Company, out of Naval Weapons Station Yorktown, VA. The 50-man unit serves as a crisis-response force, performing U.S. embassy reinforcement, evacuation and other antiterrorism and security missions abroad as necessary.

Marines who work with Wooldridge say he has gone above and beyond to relate his experiences to junior Marines. He leads with a calm, cool demeanor that is rare in leaders with more experience, said his regiment's commanding officer, **Colonel Darrin Denny**.



National Museum of the Marine Corps Plans Massive Expansion

New Wing Will Span Post-Vietnam Era Through Wars in Iraq & Afghanistan

Triangle, VA – The **National Museum of the Marine Corps**is launching a seven-year \$100million project to document the
service's history from the end
of fighting in Vietnam to this
generation's conflicts in
Afghanistan and Iraq.

To do so, its facility on the outskirts of **Marine Corps Base Quantico** will nearly double in size, growing from 112,000 square feet to 200,000 square feet by 2020. The expansion will come in stages and feature the addition of an *IMAX-style movie theater*, *refurbished aircraft* and *combat vehicles* along with a host of *new exhibits*.

Construction of the new wing is scheduled to begin in 2015, museum staff say. By 2017, they expect to open the theater and a military art gallery. The following year, two permanent galleries are scheduled to open covering Marine history from the 1980s to the present. A gallery showcasing key events between conflicts is set to open in 2020 along with rotating exhibit space.

Exhibits will cover Marine missions in *Panama* and *Grenada*, the deadly barracks bombing in *Beirut*, *Lebanon*; operations *Desert Storm* and *Desert Shield*; and the wars in *Iraq* and *Afghanistan*. The new wing also will house a host of authentic artifacts used during this period, including a refurbished F/A-18 fighter jet, an AH-1W Super Cobra helicopter, an M60A1 tank, an MRAP-all terrain vehicle, drones and more.

Visitors will be able to watch combat artists draw and paint in the studio, feel the concussion of grenade blasts in immersion galleries and view a 30-minute feature-quality film about Marine Corps history and culture.

The museum opened in 2006 with 200 years of Marine Corps history depicting America's 911 force from the American Revolution to Vietnam. The decision to do so at partial completion was deliberate, said spokeswoman **Gwenn Adams**, and made in part so the nation's oldest Marine veterans would have a chance to see their history on display while they still have the opportunity.

"The guys who had fought in World War I certainly weren't coming to a museum at that point," Adams said. "But the World War II guys continued to come," holding numerous reunions surrounded by mementos of their shared history.

Money is another issue. The museum is the product of a public-private partnership; the **Marine Corps Heritage Foundation** raised \$60 million to build and open the facility, while the Marine Corps contributed \$42 million in public funds to populate the exhibits and galleries.

This next phase requires an additional \$34 million from the Marine Corps at a time when spending is being reined in across the federal government and sequestration – massive across-the-board cuts triggered in March after Congress failed to reach an agreement on how

to address the federal deficit – threatens even mission-essential programs. That has slowed planning, said **Lin Ezell**, the museum's director.

"Because this is a big number over a multiyear period, we were able to work with [Marine Corps] headquarters to spread out the funding over several years, so there wasn't one big spike," she said. "It is a hard time to sell a new start. But all of the general officers have been incredibly enthusiastic, and they see the benefit of a museum that takes the story up to the present day."

While curators relied on life-size cast figures and authentic uniforms to tell **Revolutionary War** history and oral accounts and grainy video to tell that of **World War II**, they will have the advantage of modern media – digital photos and videos made by Marines on the battlefield – to tell the present-day story. **Chuck Girbovan**, the museum's exhibit services chief, said the plan is to curate some of the best user-generated content, and possibly even one or two of the famous 'bored Marine videos' that have given the world a backstage look at Marine goofiness and camaraderie during downrange downtime.

Girbovan said the museum may also feature elements of the cutting-edge urban-warfare training that has been developed in recent years, such as the infantry immersion trainers that attempt to replicate conditions in Afghanistan down to costumed role players, market sounds and barnyard smells.

The museum does not solicit donations. It receives most of its artifacts from veterans or military family members who want to

part with their military items but preserve the history they represent.

While curators receive an abundance of World War II-era weapons, uniforms and trophies, they've found many veterans of the most recent conflicts are not ready to part with their mementos. For Marines and veterans who might be willing to help them tell the next phase of the story, Girbovan cautioned that curators are looking for items that have a 'back story,' that advance the historical narrative.

One prize artifact for the new wing is the fragmented helmet of **Corporal Jason Dunham**, who received the Medal of Honor posthumously in 2007. Dunham was killed in Iraq in 2004 when he covered a live grenade with his helmet and laid on top of it to protect fellow Marines. The Kevlar muted some of the blast, but left Dunham with fatal wounds.

"That we have that is huge because there's so many stories you can tell from that," Adams said. "How strong is the Kevlar? How far will a Marine go to save his fellow Marines? All these stories you can tell from that one artifact."

Aircraft Restorations Also Planned

The National Museum of the Marine Corps is restoring a handful of aircraft used throughout the service's history, from the early days of Marine aviation in the 1920s to the war on terrorism.

Currently under restoration is a **1929 Boeing FB-5** and an **F/A-18A Hornet**, according to several contract solicitations posted online.

The FB-5, also used by the Navy, was the United States' first aircraft for carrier operations. Once restored, it will be added to the *Inter-War Years Gallery*, which focuses on Marine Corps history between World Wars I and II.

The museum's new **Hornet** will be displayed in a future gallery dedicated to post-Vietnam era Marine operations, said the museum's aviation curator **Ben Kristy**. Since 2000, it's been kept in Quantico, VA, at *The Basic School*, where new Marine lieutenants are sent to learn how to become officers.

Other restoration efforts include a World War II-era **Douglas SBD-3 Dauntless** dive bomber, the same type of aircraft used throughout the Pacific campaign... during epic battles like that on **Iwo Jima** to soften enemy positions and provide close-air support.

An AH-1W Super Cobra, badly damaged in Iraq, may also soon be restored and efforts are underway to repaint the RQ-2 Pioneer *unmanned aircraft* now on display in the museum's atrium to more accurately reflect color schemes used during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

One winner is to be featured in the July 22 issue of **PEOPLE**, which will be available nationwide Friday. The magazine will feature **Brian Taylor Urruela** of Tampa, Florida, a Purple Heart recipient who helped start **VETSports**, a non-profit organization that provides adaptive sports opportunities for returning wounded and combat veterans.

The complete list of honorees is as diverse as it is extensive. Ranging in ages from 26 to 92, these heroes have served from World War II through Afghanistan. For example, Brad Snyder of Bethesda, MD, won two gold medals, a silver medal and set a number of American records for the USA Paralympics swim team at the 2012 London Games. David Patterson of Rio Rancho, NM, the only Hero awarded the Medal of Honor, is a Native American who took part in every Marine assault in WWII as one of the Navajo Code Talkers.

A Marine, **Rob Jones**, was selected by the fans to represent the

Baltimore Orioles. Jones is a study in bravery and determination. After losing both legs to an IED in Taliban territory in Afghanistan in 2010, the combat engineer might have given up, but instead he fought back. Jones, who lives in Charlottesville. Virginia, used his recovery time learning to use his new prosthetic legs and reengaging with his passion for rowing. After intense training and several qualifying events, Rob and his rowing partner won the

bronze medal at the **2012 Paralympics** in London. Now, Jones plans to cycle across America for charity in fall 2013 to raise \$1 million for charities aiding disabled veterans. Jones, a Purple Heart recipient, is also a motivational speaker, telling his story of triumph over adversity.

The 'Tribute for Heroes' campaign did not end with the recognition of the 30 winners. Charitable efforts will be extended to 'Welcome Back Veterans' that addresses the needs of veterans after they return from service.

Major League Baseball has committed more than \$23 million for grants to hospitals and clinics... medical facilities that provide post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury treatment to veterans and their families in a public/private partnership with 'Centers of Excellence' at university hospitals throughout the country.

The focus was on the 30 honorees; but, the long-term effects will reach far and wide and extend beyond the scope of the All-Star Game. What better way to pay tribute to our heroes?



Marines Sticking to MARPAT Uniforms

General James Amos, Commandant of the Marine Corps, reassured Marines in Hawaii last week that he was committed to keeping the distinctive MARPAT camouflage pattern for Marines, even as lawmakers consider adopting a single camouflage pattern for all of the services.

Amos has so far been quiet regarding the proposed changes, even as **Navy Secretary Ray Mabus** has come out in support of a common camouflage – or at least a reduction from the tenplus patterns now being utilized across the services.

But on July 15, he had some folksy fighting words regarding a change for troops aboard Marine Corps Base Hawaii.

"We are on it like a hobo on a ham sandwich," Amos said, according to a Marine Corps news release. "I love the hell out of this uniform and I don't have any intention of changing it."

What's not clear from Amos's comments this month is his perspective on a change that would lead to the other services adopting a camouflage similar or identical to the Marines' proprietary camouflage pattern.

In 2011 Marine Corps Sergeant Major Micheal Barrett suggested it wouldn't be a bad thing for the other services to follow the Marines' lead in their camouflage research.

"I encourage all services to research our MARPAT during their tests to field a new combat uniform," he said. "We have the best camouflage pattern in the world, and I believe that it helps save the lives of our Marines and sailors. Our uniforms are distinctive, but what distinguishes [Marines] is our ethos, combat mindset and martial spirit." But earlier this year, Barrett pushed back against changes that would lead to a common camouflage.

"There are tactical and psychological advantages unique to our [combat uniform] in terms of morale and culture," Barrett told Marine Corps Times in a written statement for a June 17 cover story. "Like our dress blues, the [combat uniform] is a visible indicator of our identity as United States Marines, globally! It's part of our Corps' identity. Where we walk or sail, people are safer – unless you screw with us!"

Famously, the Marines developed MARPAT on an efficient \$319,000 budget. That's compared to \$3.1 million the Air Force spent in 2007 to design a 'tiger stripe' pattern that was later determined to be flawed and unfit for combat deployments, and \$3.2 million in 2005 to develop an 'Army Combat Uniform,' or ACU, which is also being retired due to poor performance.

So far, the **House and Senate Armed Services Committees** have approved language that would require the military services to transition to a common combat uniform by 2018.

Mattis Joins Ivy League

The '*Warrior Monk*' is climbing into an ivory tower. **Retired** [Marine Corps] **General James Mattis**, who recently stepped down as Commander of U.S. Central Command, is slated to



join **Dartmouth College** in Hanover, NH, this fall as a *distinguished visitor*, college officials announced Tuesday. Mattis will serve as a senior foreign affairs fellow at the school's **John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding**.

"I am delighted that General Mattis is joining us this fall," said Daniel Benjamin, director of the center. "I worked closely

with Jim Mattis while I was in government and I know him to be one of the deepest military thinkers and strongest leaders of his generation."

Benjamin previously served as the State Department's top counterterrorism official. He and Mattis worked together during the general's tenure at **CENTCOM**, the command that oversees military activities in the Middle East and Western and Central Asia, including Afghanistan, Egypt, Iraq, Iran and Syria.

Mattis will be in residence at Dartmouth from September18th to October 7th. During his time there, he will guest lecture in a number of courses and give a public address. He will also meet with student groups up to post-doctoral level.

"These distinguished visitors will interact with undergraduate and graduate students and faculty," Benjamin said. "General Mattis's visit is a model of what we want at Dickey."

Mattis, whose call sign was 'Chaos,' retired from a 41-year career in the Marine Corps in May. He is revered by Marines for his leadership of the **1st Marine Division** during the ground invasion of Iraq in 2003, and is widely known for his frank talk and colorful quotes.

The general was instrumental in developing U.S. counterinsurgency doctrine, outlined in *Army Field Manual 3-24, Counterinsurgency*, that played a key role in Iraq and Afghanistan. The doctrine requires troops to be '*nation builders as well as warriors*' and emphasizes recognition of cultural sensitivities, placing a premium on building trust with indigenous populations. Mattis penned the manual [in partnership] with retired *Army General David Petraeus*.

Academia should be a good fit for the general who, as an avid reader, was said to have at one time owned more than 7,000 books. Mattis encouraged all Marines to read and study in order to be effective fighters.

In addition to his time at Dartmouth, Mattis also signed on as a visiting fellow at **Stanford University's Hoover Institution**, a conservative 'think-tank' in California.

with the regiment's Fleet Antiterrorism Security Teams," he [Colonel Denny] said. "He always remains humble and carries himself with humility, grace and pride."

Hand-to-Hand Combat...

Wooldridge, of Port Angeles, WA, joined the Marine Corps in 2007. He was working as a diesel mechanic on logging equipment, but decided he wanted to try something else. He shipped out for boot camp within weeks, becoming an infantryman.

In 2010, as the U.S. was surging forces into southern Afghanistan, his battalion deployed to northern Helmand. As a Corporal, he served as a vehicle commander for a *combined anti-armor team*, but the mission dictated that he and his Marines frequently dismount to find the Taliban.

On June 18, Wooldridge's mounted patrol came under enemy fire in **Musa Qala**. His squad dismounted their vehicles and maneuvered on the enemy fighters, who were preparing an ambush. Wooldridge, armed with a 5.56mm M249 Squad Automatic Weapon, and the rest of his squad killed or wounded about eight insurgents, causing the rest to scatter.

As the Marines began to withdraw from the area, Wooldridge posted security. Overhearing voices, he rushed around the corner of a building and confronted two more fighters, according to his Navy Cross citation. He killed them both and crouched behind a wall to reload his empty weapon. Then an enemy machine gun barrel appeared around the wall.

"Without hesitation, he dropped his empty weapon and seized the machine gun barrel," the Navy Cross citation states. "He overwhelmed the enemy fighter in hand-to-hand combat, killing him with several blows to the head with the enemy's own machine gun."

Wooldridge, who is 6-foot-2 and about 210 pounds, said he still grapples with memories from the deployment. He wears a bracelet on his wrist to memorialize **Corporal Claudio Patino**, a friend and scout sniper with the battalion who was killed. Still, Wooldridge embraces his experiences.

"We had a rough deployment, but it's war," he said. "I think about that stuff all the time, but it helped mold me into the Marine I am now. The mistakes we made out there, I'm going to make damn sure those mistakes are never made again by the guys I train."

Legacy and Traditions...

When Wooldridge arrived in Virginia, not everyone was thrilled. Fellow Marines, aware of his difficult deployment and fame within the Corps, were concerned he would be difficult to work with or get preferential treatment, said **Gunnery Sergeant Todd Leahey**, the Staff Non-Commissioned Officer (SNCO) in charge of the **Close Quarter Battle School**.

"But ... you find out he's just a guy who has a lot of pride in being a Marine and wants to continue the legacy and traditions," he said.

Wooldridge served as an instructor for the regiment's basic security guard force, but his shift to teaching close-quarter skills allowed him to relate to students even more directly.

"They do the thing like, 'That's him! That's him! That's the guy!" Staff Sergeant Jesse Reed, a team leader at the school, said of the students. "But ... he's willing to talk to them. He's very approachable about it."

Wooldridge volunteered for several charities in the past year, but took special interest in organizations like **Honored American Veterans Afield**, which seeks to reintegrate combat veterans into society through hunting, fishing and other out-door activities. Spending time with wounded warriors, he said, is a reality check.

"I love helping out with the 'Wounded Warriors' because plenty of my buddies are in the same spot," he said. "I've seen how it could wreck somebody's life."

A young wounded warrior told him that drill instructors at boot camp tell 'bedtime stories' about him to inspire others.

"Hearing that is just humbling," Wooldridge said, "because these younger guys are going out there and fighting the fight."

President Truman announced Japan's unconditional surrender.

14 August 1990

Advance elements of the 1st MEF and 7th MEB arrived in Saudi Arabia, joining other U.N. forces to defend against possible Iraqi aggression.

17 August 1942

2nd Marine Raider Bn., under **Lt. Colonel Evans F. Carlson**, landed on Makin Island and destroyed a seaplane base, two radio stations, a supply warehouse, and killed about 100 Japanese troops.

19 August 1919

Marines Hymn registered with the U.S. Copyright Office.

21 August 1968

PFC James Anderson, **Jr**. becomes first African-American Marine to receive the Medal of Honor for heroism in Vietnam (posthumous award).

24 August 1814

Captain Samuel Miller's 114-man detachment from Marine Barracks, Washington, fought in the Battle of Bladensburg in defense of our nation's capital.

25 August 1948

2nd Lieutenant **John E. Rudder** became the first black to be commissioned as a regular United States Marine Corps officer.

29 August 1916

The Marine Corps Reserve was founded.
