Quick repair by Marine keeps critical radar functioning on Okinawa

CAMP FOSTER, Okinawa – The chief of naval operations has recognized a Marine staff sergeant for repairing a sophisticated radar system used to defend troops against aerial threats.

Brenden Kuhlmann of the 12th Marine Littoral Regiment received the Gold Disk award after fixing a key component of the regiment's AN/TPS-80 Ground/Air Task Oriented Radar, according to a Navy administrative message in September.

"It's a good feeling to allow a lot of Marines to actually do the repairs that they're capable of, then see them get recognized for it and come together to do all kinds of stuff," Kuhlmann told Stars and Stripes by phone Thursday. "The entire program that we're running here is really beneficial."

The radar made its operational debut during the July 2024 Resolute Dragon exercise on Yonaguni Island, about 67 miles east of Taiwan. The system can detect, identify and track airborne threats in 360 degrees, according to its manufacturer, Northrop Grumman.

The radar malfunctioned in an unexpected way, said Chief Warrant Officer 3 Jared Hohmeier, the regiment's electronics maintenance officer. "It wasn't in our technical manual," he said during the phone interview.

Repairs by the regiment's members have saved the Marine Corps an estimated \$2 million and prevented more than 2,000 days of operational downtime, according to a 3rd Marine Division news release Jan. 11.

Too funny to pass up...

Frenchman hospitalized after inserting WWI munition up his rear. *By Claire Barrett and J.D. Simkins, Military Times 2/2/2026*

The anonymous Englishman who managed to lodge a 2-inch-wide World War II anti-tank shell inside his rectum back in 2021 has been unseated.

The phrase “shell shocked” took on new meaning over the weekend when a 24-year-old Frenchman hobbled into Rangueil Hospital in Toulouse, France, complaining of unspecified pain.

Rushed into surgery, the doctors soon discovered that the source of the “unspecified pain” turned out to be an 8-inch long 37mm brass-and copper shell used by the Imperial German Army in the late stages of the Great War.

According to the French newspaper La Dépêche, the medical staff in Toulouse are “accustomed to treating victims injured during sexual games,” but are understandably unused to dislodging centuries-old munitions from rectums.

“He was in a state of extreme discomfort, having inserted a large object up his rectum,” said an investigating source, stating the obvious.

The artillery shell, unexploded at the time of the removal, resulted in the evacuation of the hospital, with an explosive ordnance disposal squad called to the hospital to ensure the munition was not in danger of detonating within the individual’s personal hurt locker.

France is currently edging the British in its centuries-old rivalry, as this is not the first time a Frenchman has married munition with derrière.

In 2022, an 88-year-old patient visited Hospital Sainte Musse in Toulon stunning doctors when they removed what turned out to be a WWI-era French munition measuring 8 inches long and more than 2 inches wide — from the man’s rectum. Surgeons were forced to cut open his abdomen in order to remove the hefty relic due to the shell’s considerably above-average size.

“An apple, a mango, or even a can of shaving foam, we are used to finding unusual objects inserted where they shouldn’t be,” one doctor reported. “But a shell? Never!”

While the echoes of the Great War are now more than a century old, the vestiges of the deadly conflict remain.

Along the Western Front, namely France and Belgium, the remnants of the First World War are still coming to the surface.

About 1.5 billion shells were fired during the war, and unexploded ammunition continues to plague Western Europe, particularly France.

An annual collection of the ordnances called “récolte de fer,” or “iron harvest” work to rid the land — and now rectums — of the explosives.

On Saturday, firefighters confirmed that they had defused the bomb and that there was no further risk to the patient or those in proximity to the hospital.

While the patient is expected to make a full physical recovery, the mental scars of his very own trench warfare is another story.

Still recuperating, the French national is set to be interviewed by police this week and prosecutors are considering legal action against the 24-year-old for handling “category A munitions,” according to an officer.

How To Apply For Benefits

The Maryland Department of Veterans and Military Families' Service and Benefits Program assists veterans, service members, and their families in understanding and applying for the benefits they have earned. Our VA-accredited Benefit Specialists provide knowledgeable, in-person support to eligible veterans, dependents, and survivors seeking benefits from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, the Department of Defense, the State of Maryland, and other veteran-serving programs, helping ensure the application process is conducted clearly, accurately, and with appropriate support.

Before You Apply

If you already receive benefits, but just need to change your direct deposit information: The VA requires completion of an SF1199-A which [can be found here](#). It is recommended that you first speak to the VSO before you submit your online request.

The VA Office of General Counsel maintains a list of VA-recognized organizations and VA-accredited individuals that are authorized to assist in the preparation, presentation, and prosecution of VA benefit claims at <https://www.va.gov/ogc/apps/accreditation/index.asp>.

How to Apply

Make an appointment with a DVMF specialist:

Find a DVMF Service Office near you (see below) and call that office directly to make an appointment. Service Program offices are open Monday-Friday, 8:00am-4:00pm, by appointment only.

During the appointment with the specialist, you can expect the following:

- Military separation discharge document review
- VA system review: Healthcare, Benefits, and Cemeteries
- DVMF programs review: Charlotte Hall Veterans Home and Cemeteries

Disability compensation/pension claim submission (if discharge paperwork supports the claim)

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DVMF Service Program Offices

The Maryland Department of Veterans and Military Families' Service Program Offices provide assistance from VA-accredited Benefits Services Specialists to veterans and their families with filing VA claims to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, Department of Defense, State of Maryland as well as other agencies that provide benefits to Veterans or family members. The assistance provided is at no cost—veterans should never have to pay to access the benefits they earned through their service. Our accredited specialists work with the veteran/family to the USDVA, DOD, State of Maryland or other agencies that administer benefits to veterans/dependents or survivors. We will assist in guiding individuals through the claims process and advocate on their behalf. Veterans are encouraged to be cautious of individuals or organizations that charge fees or are not VA-accredited, by the USDVA. Oftentimes fees can be applied not only to a current claim but to any claims for increase that may arise in the future.

History ~ Customs ~ Traditions



January 3, 1777, The Marine Corps participates in its first land combat at the Battle of Princeton. *(Paraphrased from Paul McBride)*

After their founding on November 10, 1775, the Marines primary duty was to serve as the Navy's infantry arm. It was in this capacity that they conducted their first amphibious assault at New Providence, Nassau in the Bahamas.

In the fall of 1776, Captain Nicholas was recruiting in Philadelphia. The war was not going well for the Americans. By December, Washington was retreating through New Jersey. When he reached the shores of the Delaware River on the Pennsylvania side, he put out a call for veteran soldiers. Nicholas and about 600 new Marines from Philadelphia responded.

Washington assigned the Marines to General Cadwalader's Brigade to cross at Burlington. However, the ice-choked river prevented the brigade from crossing and participating in Washington's victory at Trenton. Cadwalader's three companies of Marines marched to Crosswicks, NJ and joined Washington outside of Princeton. The Battle of Princeton was the first in a long line of battles where the Continental Marines were called to action far from their ships.

These signs require immediate attention. If you are experiencing any of these and need medical attention, call 911 now. For immediate help in dealing with a suicidal crisis, contact the Veterans Crisis Line: Dial 988 then Press 1.

- Thinking about hurting or killing yourself
- Looking for ways to kill yourself
- Talking about death, dying, or suicide
- Self-destructive behavior, such as drug abuse, risky use of weapons, etc.

It's okay to ask directly: "Are you thinking about taking your own life?"



Warning Signs

These signs may indicate that a Veteran needs help. If you or a Veteran you know is experiencing any of these, contact the Veterans Crisis Line now: Dial 988 then Press 1.

- Appearing sad or depressed most of the time
- Hopelessness
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling as if there is no reason to live
- Feeling excessive guilt, shame, or sense of failure
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug misuse
- Losing interest in hobbies, work, or school
- Neglecting personal welfare and appearance
- Withdrawing from family and friends
- Showing violent behavior, like punching a hole in the wall or getting into fights
- Giving away prized possessions
- Getting affairs in order, tying up loose ends, or writing a will
