





#### 2 November 1950

Marines engage Chinese in North Korea near the Chosin Reservoir.

#### 3 November 2003

Presidential Unit Citation awarded to 1st Marine Expeditionary Force for its service in Operation Iraqi Freedom. It becomes the first unit to earn the award since the end of the Vietnam War..

#### 4 November 1979

Mob overruns U.S. Embassy in Teheran, Iran; 13 Marines among 65 American hostages; 52 of whom were held captive for 444 days.

#### **10 November 1775**

Continental Congress authorizes creation of two battalions of Marines.

#### 10 November 1948

First eight enlisted women are sworn in as regular Marines. First black women Marines enlist the following summer.

#### 10 November 1954

Marine Corps War Memorial site dedicated near Arlington National Cemetery.

#### **18 November 1915**

Major Smedley D. Butler leads Marine attack on Fort Riviere, Haiti and is awarded 2nd Medal of Honor.

#### **20 November 1947**

{date approximate) Toys For Tots program founded.

#### 23 November 1950

7th Marines take Yudam-ni. Thanksgiving was celebrated in Korea with temperatures hovering about 20 degrees below zero.

#### **27 November 1950**

Eight Chinese Communist divisions launch a massive attack in Korea, with the express purpose of destroying the 1st Marine Division. This action leads to the successful Marine Corps attack out of the Chosin Reservoir and its relocation to the coastal port of Hungnam.

#### **10 NOVEMBER 2020**

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDANT OF THE MARINE CORPS

If there were a watchword for 2020, the shortlist would certainly include 'change,' 'uncertainty,' and 'adaptation.' This new dynamic and uncertain environment has impacted how we recruit and train Marines, deploy aboard ship, and even how we honor our Corps' hallowed traditions. But adapting to change and uncertainty is nothing new for Marines. It is what we have done for 245 years and what is expected of us as the Nation's force-in readiness. Where others see challenges, Marines see opportunities. We don't take a knee. We will always be ready to answer the nation's call, no matter the crisis.

In a world of seemingly relentless change and uncertainty, some things remain constant—our core values: Honor, Courage, and Commitment. These values are at the very heart of our ability to be, "most ready when the Nation is least ready." It's honor that gives us an uncompromising sense of personal integrity and accountability; courage that allows us to face any circumstance with an ironclad resolve to do what's right; and commitment that binds us together as a family and drives us toward excellence. And while our core values might never change, the way we give life to them requires constant vigilance. This year's national conversations about race remind us that we must all do better to embody our service's values.

Commemorating the 245th birthday of our Corps offers us a chance to reflect on our history. We who serve today stand upon the shoulders of giants. While this year's many challenges are significant and unique, they are not unprecedented, and it is important to remember that our Nation and Corps have endured difficult times in our past. This year, for example, marks the 75th anniversary of brutal battles in the Pacific; when soldiers of the sea defined the term "uncommon valor" on the black sands of Iwo Jima; the 70th anniversary of bitter fighting at Inchon and Chosen Reservoir; 55 years since Marines landed at Da Nang; and a decade since our struggle with the Taliban in the Helmand River Valley. We remember the service and sacrifice of all Marines, and honor the legacy passed down through generations. Our continuing obligation is to honor their legacy by making meaningful contributions to what they started.

From the past, we draw strength, pride, and a responsibility to carry on the warfighting heritage our predecessors built. We must also recognize our tradition of continuous adaptation—one that should inspire our current force modernization and innovation efforts. As has been the case in the past, today's threats require us to fight as a cohesive team, and our ability to succeed will depend on the Honor, Courage, and Commitment of each individual Marine. From recruiting individuals of great intelligence, strength, spirit, and diversity, to evolving how we train, educate, and mentor Marines throughout their careers, we remain dedicated to developing the world's finest warfighters, guided by our core values.

In a year of significant change and uncertainty, I am reminded of the words of American novelist, John Dos Passos, "In times of change and danger when there is a quicksand of fear under men's reasoning, a sense of continuity with generations gone before can stretch like a lifeline across the scary present..." Never forget, what you do today becomes the foundation for the generations of Marines that will follow. There is no challenge we cannot overcome, together, by holding fast to our core values. ## Chaplain's Corner Bill Collins

#### TBI/PTSD: A Battle That Must Be Won.

The incidence of suicide among our veterans remains at an unacceptably high level......20+every day despite the best efforts of clinicians and millions of dollars invested in treatments that are only marginally successful. The Department of Defense (DOD), the Veterans Administration (VA) and Congress have been lamenting and responding to traumatic brain injuries (TBI) and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) with "Suicide Prevention" studies, strategies, conferences and proclamations for more than a decade. All of these well intentioned organizations assert that "Preventing Veterans Suicide is our #1 priority". Yet, in spite of this "top priority status" and their best efforts the rate of suicide continues to slowly and steadily increase.

According to statistics published by U.S.News, TBI and/or PTSD affect approximately 1,850,000 Veterans..... 810,000 Vietnam Veterans, 660,000 Gulf War Veterans and another 380,000 Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF) and Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) Veterans.... the numbers continue to rise. Treatments that have been used to treat TBI & PTSD-- the acknowledged "signature wounds" of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars-- fall into three treatment protocols. The 1<sup>st</sup> Protocol is medication in the form of anti-depressants and other drugs. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Protocol is Cognitive Psychotherapy or Talk Therapy which uses techniques like cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT), Mindfulness and other approaches intended to adjust the way in which the brain deals with problems. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Protocol includes Support Organizations. Over 55,000 of these have mushroomed since 9/11. Some offer important assistance including activities which provide pleasant experiences, camaraderie and companionship to those veterans who carry invisible scars as well as to those who have suffered physical wounds.

Debate as to the effectiveness and, in some cases, the negative side effects of some of these treatments is ongoing. While the debate continuous so do the suicides. What cannot be debated are the results of this approach. Continuing to apply the same solutions to the [misdiagnosed] problem, not surprisingly, yields the same result......the suicide epidemic goes on unabated.

It is important to note that none of these three treatment protocols make any mention of treating injury to the brain or (TBI). TBI is acknowledged as a "signature wound" of the war on terror. Since 2000, 414,000 of our troops have been diagnosed with TBI. In the case of a TBI the first step must be proper diagnosis and intervention to heal the wounded brain. A recent Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) study states that 21% of those diagnosed with TBI will also suffer from PTSD. Thus, according to this study, there are over 86,000 cases of misdiagnosed or undiagnosed cases of PTSD caused by brain injuries. This in addition to over 300,000 cases of PTSD already acknowledged. In short, the numbers don't accurately represent the breadth and depth of lives diminished by brain wounds. This number is likely very conservative and it continues to grow.

The Status Quo is killing our friends and loved ones. The time has come to try a new approach. Remember that Einstein said that doing the same thing over and over and hoping for a different result is the definition of insanity. That said, we need the "4th Protocol." We as a nation should guarantee insured access to all available, well vetted, alternative treatments that include treating the wounded brain.

That would involve treatments such as: Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy (HBOT), Cranial Electrical Stimulation (CES), EEG Neurofeedback, and Low Level Light Therapy (LLLT). Other complementary & integrative health programs like meditation, acupuncture, chiropractic and Yoga should be employed, so long as they are safe and show effectiveness. These treatments can be given in combination with, or in place of the conventional treatments currently being used. For example, researchers in multiple countries and here in the U.S. have completed seventeen (17) successful HBOT clinical trials, all showing safety and "significant improvement" in all treated patients. In addition HBOT has helped to heal over 7,500 brain wounded warriors and civilians. HBOT treatments are safe, effective and far less costly—financially and morally—than not treating brain-wounded patients.

Currently a group of Marines from Wounded Warrior Battalion East, Camp Lejeune, N.C. is receiving HBOT treatments at a civilian clinic in Durum N.C. Without exception results have been positive. Similar results for dozens of Special

Operators – Seals, Force Recon, Combat Air Controllers, Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD), Rangers and Green Berets - have been recorded, typically with donations paying for their treatments. Seven states: Oklahoma, Texas, Indiana, Kentucky, Arizona, Florida & North Carolina have passed legislation that promises to provide financial support to veterans seeking alternative treatments for their mental and neurological disorders. At the Federal level S.785- Commander John Scott Hannon Veterans Mental Health Care Improvement Act of 2019-2020 directs the VA to "Study and invest in innovative treatment options by expanding veterans access to alternative programs and investing in VA research on veterans suicide risk and identifying and treating mental illness." In addition the TREAT ACT, H.R. 8147 directs the Secretary of the VA to expand an existing pilot program, and establish a new one for complimentary and integrative treatments. The ball is rolling in the right direction, but more help is needed, more boots at the door of legislators, more pressure and relentless demands for action. We must make certain that every available tool is being used to bring an end to the tragic suicide epidemic that is taking the lives of so many of our veterans.

With 66,000 members the Marine Corps League is well positioned to demand that legislators and decision makers at all levels follow up on legislation that is in place and to further demand that all fifty states enact legislation similar to laws passed in the seven (7) states listed above. Our veterans deserve nothing less than the best treatment available. We must keep our promise to "Leave no one behind" and to make certain that our motto "SEMPER FIDELIS" carries with it the full weight of the traditions of our Corps, traditions that have been earned by all of those Marines who have gone before us.


