Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil, or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you..." 1 Peter 1:3-4.

"Our Sunday evening Bible Study group recently finished a series on experiencing doubt and finding faith. The curriculum was written by Rev. Adam Hamilton and was very worthwhile.

One of my professors in seminary regularly made the comment, "Doubt is not the opposite of faith, apathy is the opposite of faith." Every believing Christian experiences doubt at various times in their faith journey. Perhaps it comes after the death of a loved one, in the midst of a difficult illness, or during a loss such as the elimination of a job or the result of a natural disaster. These types of events cause us to ask difficult questions, many of which begin with, "Why...?" They also challenge what we have been taught or the assumptions that we carry with us.

If Christians experience doubts and questions go unanswered, what good is faith? That is a valid question in our broken world where there is so much suffering and evil often seems to prevail. The answer is Easter.

We have just come through Holy Week culminating in the Easter celebration. Good Friday ends on a dark note with the crucifixion of Jesus, but Good Friday is not the end of the story. God's full redeeming work was completed with the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The risen Jesus had victory over suffering and death. What's more...through faith in Jesus' death on the cross for the forgiveness of sins, we are also recipients of God's promises. Death does not have the final say - for Jesus or for us.

Hope is the difference that faith makes. Faith tells us that God is Perfect Love, that God is for us, and that God is with us. God is not some terrible avenger waiting to smite us down. Read Romans 8:28. This verse of scripture tells us that God is always working for the good of those who love him and are called according to his purpose. God's work is not always immediately evident, but we can trust that God's will for us is perfect.

With that level of trust, every day is a little Easter. God redeems our lives, gives us victory in the face of hardships, and loves us unconditionally. What are you facing today, friend? Breath deeply and breath in God's love and grace. Breath out anxiety and fear. For God is surely with you. **Pastor Laura**

"Light It Up Blue"

April 2 is Autism Awareness Day. Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD) refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech, and nonverbal communication. It is estimated that autism affects 1 in 44 children in the US today. There is not just one type of autism, but many subtypes. Each person has a distinct set of strengths and challenges.



Autism is a lifelong neurological condition that manifests during early childhood, irrespective of gender, race or socio-economic status. The Autism Spectrum refers to a range of characteristics. Autistic individuals are mainly characterized by unique social interactions, non-standard ways of learning, keen interests in specific subjects, an inclination for routines, challenges in typical communications, and particular ways of processing sensory information.

How do I help a person with autism?

- Realize that each autistic individual is unique in their makeup.
- Learn about autism. Listen for needs.
- Practice acceptance of the individual as they are, a beloved child of God.
- Offer positive reinforcement.
- Identify triggers, what is stressful or frightening for them. Try and discern the reason behind disruptive behaviors.
- Identify what is calming and enjoyable for them.
- Accommodate their sensory sensitivities.
- Create a safety zone for them a place where they can go to decompress.
- Provide structure and a schedule. Consistence is important.
- Make time for fun.
- Support not just the autistic person, but their loved ones as well.


Our church will continue to work with Franklin schools; but the when,

How to Instill Faith In Children

Helping kids learn about God may seem daunting. The good news is that a theology degree isn't required and it has less to do with words than with actions. Check out these tips from United Methodist children ministry leaders for how to make faith real in the lives of the kids we love.

Every day presents teachable moments

"Every moment of every day is a teachable moment and that doesn't stop with your faith," says Aimee Cox, director of children's ministry at <u>Christ United Methodist Church</u>.

Sitting around the table at mealtime, taking a walk, snuggling at bedtime are ideal holy moments, says Melinda Shunk, the Arkansas Conference's children's ministry coordinator. "Adults can take these routine opportunities to tell children that you thank God for them or for the time you're spending together.

"It's a blessing to that child to hear those words washed over them," Shunk points out.

Engage all five senses

Asking children what they see, what they smell, what they hear in the world helps them experience God's creation in a variety of ways, Cox says.

Employing this tip isn't just for nature walks or outside settings, Cox clari-

fies, suggesting the same questions can be asked following all activities, including church.

Allow kids to have their own experiences

Sometimes, parents fear how their child may react to a Bible story. Leaders suggest we share the story anyway without editing and introducing personal biases.

"Children take it in and they understand what they understand for their age," explains Cox. "Let them ask questions."

Read the stories together, followed by a discussion.

"You don't have to be an expert in understanding the Bible," Cox points out. "Ask questions, such as 'What do you hear? What words spoke to you?"

Take time to wonder

"I think the greatest gift our kids give to us is the curiosity they bring to the table," McRay shares. "The wondering about how God works in our world creates more biblically literate children and creates livelong lovers of Jesus."

Build a spiritual library as a way to nurture wonder and create a space for discovery, McRay says, offering that books by the likes of Matthew Paul Turner, Fred Rogers and music by Rain for Roots are good starting places. The Deep Blue Bible Storybook, which McRay wrote as senior editor of children's resources at The United Methodist Publishing House, was developed specifically to engage conversations.

Being present is a spiritual act

"Showing up, being there and listening to your child is the cornerstone of faith," McRay says. She explains that numerous studies indicate the understanding of God, ourselves and the world comes down to five foundational relationships in a child's life.

"Particularly the adults who love you when you are really small set you up for who God is," she tells us.

Authenticity rules!

Admitting you don't know the answer or that you messed up is OK too. "Being authentic is really key, because our kids see through the (façade)," McRay explains. "I want to model what it means to be a believer, but we have to remind ourselves that life is hard and we are going to struggle.

Be a faith storyteller

Children love a good story, particularly when someone they love is the main character.

"Tell stories about when you were a child, what you thought about God, how you first came to your faith," Shunk suggests. Grandparents, especially, make excellent faith storytellers because they have the time and experiences to share those stories.

"Just like the Bible teaches us about God's people from long ago, our faith stories from long ago are valuable to children," Shunk suggests. "Being a faith storyteller makes faith come alive and weaves into your family's faith story."

Pro tip: "Save the stories about their parents as children for tweens," Shunk says. "Those stories are going to be so valuable and so fun."

No One is Immune to Doubt, Not Even Jesus by Joseph Yoo

We Christians in the United States can be obsessed with finding and providing answers to any and all questions about faith and God and life.

Maybe it's a reflection of our education system that


uses standardized and aptitude testing to gauge how much one has learned. At times, school just taught me how to cram for an exam and regurgitate the right answer for the next text. I can't really tell you what I learned in seminary, just that I kept my GPA requirements for the scholarship.



Is doubt the antithesis of belief? Or is it a path towards belief?

I think — I *feel* — that we lost the art of living with the questions; living with tension of the unknown, uncertain, and unanswerable.

We're quick to provide an answer even if the answer may be wrong or harmful. Consider a grieving parent asking, "Why would God take my child?" And someone, with good intentions, responds with, "Don't worry. Your child's death was all part of God's plan" or "You know, God couldn't wait to be with your child in heaven, that's why God took him through this trage-



Join our Faith Seekers group on Sunday mornings at 9:15 am. All are invited! dy." These are answers that are dismissive of the question.

I grew up in this type of church context where questions weren't welcome. Because questions can be dangerous. Questions can lead you to doubt. And doubt was the enemy — the antithesis — of faith.

The importance of questioning

Looking back, I wish the Sunday school teachers and the youth pastors of my life were more willing to struggle and wrestle with scripture, doubt and faith along with me. I wish someone would've said, "You know, that's a

good question. Let's walk with it together." Instead, I

felt shamed for the (quite often, legitimate) questions I had.

"You always have these dangerous and unnecessary questions." Or, "You're not praying enough, that's why you have doubt." Or, "Just read the Bible more." Or. "Have more faith."

(Side note: I never understood that. Do I clench my fist and wish with all my might that my faith will just *poof* get bigger? Is there an incantation to recite? How does one have more faith when they feel they are lacking it? Mind over matter?)

Praying harder or praying more doesn't help the questions or the doubt go away. The questions only get louder. And so does the sense of shame and the

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thought of being unfaithful, ungrateful, and just general-the Bible. But also learn to live in the tension of notly a bad Christian.knowing the answer and being okay with maybe not

It wasn't until fairly late in my twenties when I learned that doubt isn't the enemy of faith. Nor is it the antithesis of faith. Doubt doesn't always lead one away from faith.

Did the disciples' numerous accounts of doubt lead them away from faith? Ultimately, no. Did Thomas's doubt of Jesus' resurrection led him away from faith? Did Jesus' doubt of God's plan lead him away from his calling?

We need to stop thinking (and teaching) that doubt is the enemy of faith. The true enemy of faith; the true antithesis of faith isn't doubt. It's fear.

Fear is the bigger thing that gets in the way of faith and of love. It's often fear that leads us to be obsessed with having answers to all of life's difficult questions. And because of the fear of the unknown; the uncertain; the unanswerable I feel that American Christians have lost the art of asking questions. We're more prone to regurgitate answers than ask questions.

Answering through questions

A rabbi friend once told me that rabbis gauge how much their students know not by the answers they give, but by the questions that they ask. He said that in the early days, a rabbi would ask a question and the student, instead of giving an answer like we are taught to do, would ask a question to that question. And the rabbi would respond with a question.

We see this reflected in Jesus' ministry. Someone would ask him, "What is the greatest commandment?" And Jesus would respond, "What do you say is the greatest commandment?"

That's why I always encourage people to ask questions

about everything--*especially* when it comes to faith and the Bible. But also learn to live in the tension of not knowing the answer and being okay with maybe not ever knowing the answer. Living in the mystery is part of faith.

If one had *all* the answers, why would one need faith? I frequently have questions and still wrestle with doubt about faith and life.

Don't be fooled. No one is immune to doubt. If *Jesus* wasn't immune to doubt, how could we possible be? I'd sure like meet the person who claims their faith is stronger than Jesus'.

Remember. Doubt is not the opposite of faith.

I do believe I have come to a point where I no longer doubt God's existence and presence nor do I doubt my calling (how that calling is expressed in my life, I still wrestle with on a too frequent of a basis). But I question and I doubt in love; in knowing that I am loved.

That my questions won't scare away God nor scare my loved ones away. That my doubting won't lead people to shame me for the perception of a 'lack of faith.' The trust I have in knowing that I am loved helps me to not be afraid, which helps me to feel grounded and safe to wrestle with the questions.

So ask questions. Wrestle with doubt. Know that God is with you. Know that you are loved.

And be okay with admitting that you don't have all the answers.
