Now, far be it from me to add to Holy Scripture, but I like to think that if Isaiah had ever experienced a blistering July afternoon on a shaded porch, he might have appended that invitation with, "...and maybe steep a few tea bags and drop some sugar into it."

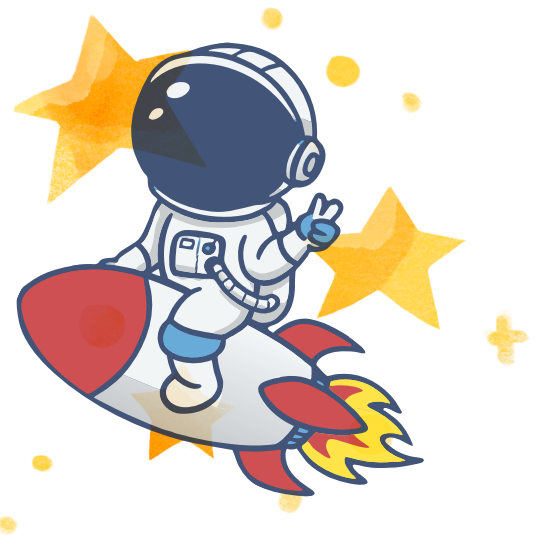

- Prayer Warriors & Behind-the-Scenes Help: If your high-energy days are behind you, we need a team covering this week in prayer and helping with prep.

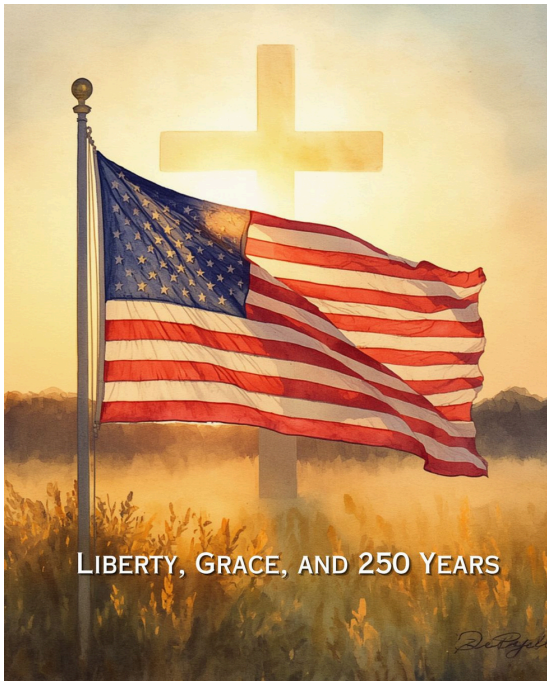

BISHOP'S MISSION APPEAL

Ohio Episcopal Area | West Ohio Conference



Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, the One who saves us and sends us.

One hundred forty years ago, Methodist Episcopal churches in Ohio sent Mary F. Scranton and Dr. William B. Scranton to Korea to share the grace and love of God in Jesus Christ. Their faithful witness planted a seed of mission that has grown into a great harvest of churches, schools, hospitals, Christian leaders, and global mission. Today, the Korean Methodist Church continues to bear the fruit of that sacred gospel partnership.

A central part of this history is East Gate Methodist Church, founded through the ministry of Dr. William B. Scranton. For Korean Methodists, this church has long been cherished as one of the sacred birthplaces of Korean Methodism and as a living testimony to the Ohio–Korea mission connection.

In recent years, the original site of East Gate Methodist Church was returned to the City of Seoul as part of a public project to preserve and restore the historic Seoul City Wall near the East Gate. While this project honors an important part of Korea's cultural heritage, it also resulted in the loss of a sacred Methodist site connected to the Scranton legacy and the earliest history of Korean Methodism.

Rather than allowing this legacy to disappear, the Seoul Annual Conference of the Korean Methodist Church has taken up the holy work of rebuilding nearby. Land has been purchased, and the Scranton Memorial Mission Center and Church are now being developed. The cost of the project is valued at approximately \$16 million. This center will honor the memory, sacrifice, and missionary vision of William and Mary Scranton while inspiring future generations for mission in Korea and around the world.

Therefore, we invite all clergy, laity, congregations, and ministry settings across the Ohio Episcopal Area to participate in the Bishop's Missional Appeal for the Scranton Memorial Mission Center and Church. This offering will begin in 2026 and continue through the 2027 Annual Conferences. It is not a single offering received only at Annual Conference, but a shared season of prayer, learning, remembrance, and mission giving across the whole Ohio Episcopal Area.

The Seoul Annual Conference is engaged in a major capital campaign for this sacred work. We in Ohio are not launching a capital campaign. Rather, we are receiving a holy mission offering as an act of partnership, thanksgiving, and living covenant with Korean Methodists. Congregations are encouraged to teach, pray, remember, and receive mission offerings in ways appropriate to their own settings. These gifts will be gathered as one shared expression of love, gratitude, covenant, and mission by the time of the 2027 Annual Conferences.

Our prayerful goal is to offer \$1 million toward this mission. This is a significant and hopeful goal, but it is possible when our churches join together in love. More than a financial gift, the Bishop's Missional Appeal offering will be a witness that the mission seed planted 140 years ago continues to bear fruit and become seed again for future generations.

A seed of mission became a harvest of grace. Now, by God's mercy, this harvest becomes seed again.

THE BEAUTIFUL TRUTH OF "UBUNTU": WHY WE NEED EACH OTHER

There is a beautiful, centuries-old philosophy from Southern Africa wrapped up in a single word: Ubuntu. Roughly translated, Ubuntu means "I am because we are." It is the profound realization that our humanity is caught up, inextricably bound, in the humanity of others. In an Ubuntu culture, a person's well-being is completely connected to the well-being of their neighbor. If one person is suffering, the whole community is diminished. If one person succeeds, the whole community is lifted. This isn't just a beautiful cultural concept—it is a deeply biblical one.



Long before the word Ubuntu traveled across the globe, the Apostle Paul described the exact same reality to the early Church. In 1 Corinthians 12:26, speaking about how we are all parts of one single body, he wrote: "If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it."

We live in a world that constantly tells us to focus on the individual. We are taught to look out for "Number One," to protect our own time, our own space, and our own comfort. But Jesus invites us into a radically different way of living. When asked what the greatest commandment was, Jesus didn't just give one answer. He gave two that are permanently fused together: Love God, and love your neighbor as yourself. You cannot truly have one without the other.

Living out this interconnected faith doesn't require a plane ticket; it just requires open eyes. Here are three simple ways we can practice Ubuntu together this month:

- *Listen to understand:* Take five extra minutes to truly listen to someone else's story, especially if they are from a different generation or background than you.
- *Share the load:* If you know a family struggling with illness or stress, don't wait for them to ask for help. Drop off a meal, offer to mow their lawn, or send a note of encouragement.
- *Celebrate generously:* When someone hits a milestone or experiences a joy, celebrate it as if it were your own.

Our joy is multiplied and our burdens are divided when we remember that we belong to one another. I am, because we are.
