Give thanks."





We are starting a search for a handrail that will come closer to the existing rails on the front steps to the sanctuary. The small handrail is a temporary replacement since the chair lift was removed.





Golden Anniversary of the FUMC Noodle Makers

For decades the women of the Franklin Ohio First United Methodist Church (FUMC) have been holding their Annual Bazaar (now called Marketplace) to raise funds that support missions and other needs. After a two-year hiatus due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the luncheon featuring homemade chicken and noodles, which has been a key component of this annual event, will return on Saturday November 5th this year. Also, once again limited quantities of the packaged frozen noodles will be available for purchase in order to restock personal larders.

According to the newspaper article entitled "Women using their noodles to earn money for the church" published in the Oct. 16, 1987 issue of the Middletown Journal, this process of making noodles by hand for selling and serving during the FUMC Bazaar luncheon started in 1972. Hence, a golden anniversary

themselves the "Rotary Women" had been preparing weekly lunches since circa 1967 for the members

of the Franklin Rotary organization who met on Fridays at the UMC church. As plans were formulated for hosting that first bazaar, it was decided to serve chicken with homemade noodles as the focus of a companion luncheon. Hence, these "Rotary" ladies started making lots of noodles and the legend began.

Originally, the UMW members prepared the noodles and hosted the fall bazaar until 2006 when this group was dissolved. Another church organization called Women Outreach Workers (WOW) took over the re-

sponsibilities for both the fall bazaar and also the Spring Salad luncheon for the next several years. When the WOW members decided they couldn't continue performing these events in 2012, the FUMC Women's circle took over the noodle making and hosting the fall bazaar.

Traditionally, the noodle making process started about a month before the bazaar using donated flour and eggs in their simple

time-honored recipe where each batch consists of the yolks from three eggs along with one whole egg mixed

with two cups of flour, a teaspoon of salt and three tablespoons of water to form the dough. Numerous batches are made every year. Next, each ball of dough is rolled out according to "the thinner the better" approach. After two hours of drying, the rolled dough is shaped into long strips,

nally, the noodles are frozen and stored until Marketplace (bazaar) time.

In a 2001 article, the Franklin Chronicle reported that FUMC women had made 60 batches while 567 batches were made during the five week 2022 season. Per tradition, the women and in more recent times a few dauntless men meet in the church basement at 9:00 a.m. on Monday mornings and make noodles for the next four or five hours

without stop or breaks.

The different steps in the noodling make process are illustrated by this series of photographs taken over the years.

CELEBRATING WITH GRATITUDE—AT HOME BY: MARY JANE PIERCE NORTON



"An attitude of gratitude" – that's what we seek to instill in ourselves and in our family members. Thanksgiving lends itself to helping us name the many ways

we are blessed.

Stopping to identify blessings doesn't mean that life has been easy in the past year. Everyone experiences difficulties and hardships. We can't ignore the fact that hardships are part of life.

This Thanksgiving, reflect together on families all around the world who have left their homes to move to other countries because of war, because of economic issues or because of instability in their home countries. Many may not have the opportunities to enjoy a meal with family members, to reflect together on the year or to have a safe place to live. Yet, they too may be looking at life with an "attitude of gratitude," despite finding themselves in new places, with circumstances they didn't anticipate and with people they do not know.

This year, consider using one or more of the following suggestions when you observe Thanksgiving in your home or with others. Use these suggestions to enable your family to focus not just on being thankful for the food of the day, but also on true gratefulness for the many blessings experienced throughout the year.

- Many countries have a day of thanksgiving to celebrate the harvest of crops and the food provided by the land that sustains us. Create a list of the foods you enjoy. Give thanks for the earth and the blessings of the world that God has created.
- Create a place tag for every person who will share the Thanksgiving meal in your home. On one side of the tag, write the name of the person. On the other side, place a word or phrase from a verse of scripture. Ask

Advent Studies for 2022

The past few years have been full of anxiety and uncertainty. Yet, the Spirit is still calling us to trust and experience God's goodness and peace. As we approach Advent, the Upper Room and the United Methodist Publishing

everyone to line up so the words from the verse are in the correct order. This determines who sits by whom during the meal. Say the scripture together after everyone has been seated.

- Identify family members and close friends of your family who will not be able to be with you at Thanksgiving. Create or purchase cards for each of these people. On Thanksgiving Day, invite all who are gathered in your home to sign and/or write a note on the cards to those who are missing. Don't forget to mail the cards on the Friday following Thanksgiving!
- Make a blessing box. Ask different family members to write on slips of paper things for which they are thankful and to place the slips of paper in the blessing box. Use the box as a centerpiece on Thanksgiving Day. Pass around the box, pull out the slips of paper and read the blessings.
- Reflect on the past year. Ask each person gathered at your Thanksgiving celebration to share one thing that happened to him or her during the past year for which he or she is thankful.
- Take a photograph of all who are gathered with you to celebrate Thanksgiving. Label it "Thanksgiving 2022" and list on the back the names of all who are there and one thing each person is thankful for this year.
- Pray for those who have lost family members during the last year. Light a candle of remembrance and call out the names of those in the family who are no longer physically present.
- Use the following as a litany of thanks prior to your Thanksgiving meal:

Reader 1: Today is Thanksgiving Day. We are grateful to be together at this time of the year.

Reader 2: Hear these words from the Bible: "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it; for he founded it upon the seas and established it upon the waters." (Psalm 24:1-2, NIV)

Reader 3: As we light the candles on this table, let them be a reminder to us of God's presence with us.

Reader 4: Let us pray:

All: O God for all the blessings we enjoy, we give you thanks. Help us look at the world around us in such a way that we see your hand in creation and in those we meet. Help us be a blessing today to those gathered around this table and in all our days to those we meet at home, at school, in church, and in our community. Amen.

FAMILY MISSIONS: BUILD A LIFE OF SERVICE

LEARN HOW TO BUILD A MISSIONAL LIFESTYLE AND EXPLORE PRACTICAL WAYS TO PUT FAITH INTO ACTION. BY LAURA BUCHANAN

Busy families might find it hard to dedicate time and energy to mission projects or serving others, but it doesn't have to feel that way. Reconsider what this type of work looks like and build a missional lifestyle that will nurture and strengthen lifelong faith.

"Serving and seeking ways to incorporate mercy and justice into our everyday life is a component of discipleship. To offer that to children at a young age helps them incorporate it into their lives in a way that doesn't make it feel separate," says the Rev. Melissa Collier Gepford, Intergenerational Discipleship Coordinator for the Great Plains Conference of The United Methodist Church.

BUILD A MISSIONAL LIFESTYLE

Embrace a mindful, faith-filled approach to your day-to-day routine. Rev. Gepford encourages, "Equipping ourselves and our kids with the tools to be loving and produce the fruit of the spirit – listening, caring for others, how we engage with folks who are different than us, our online presences...all of that is a mission field in and of itself. It's a posture rather than a checklist.

"John Wesley said, 'The world is my parish.' The world is our parish, too. ... It's a more holistic vision for what it means to follow Jesus. Jesus served people. Jesus sought justice. We can do the missional work of Jesus Christ right here in our communities. [Kids] are missionaries in their schools every day."

AUDIT YOUR TIME, TOWN AND PASSIONS

In addition to daily missional living, it can be helpful for families to focus on a mission area or project. Find space for this by auditing your time. Maybe you'll find a free Saturday afternoon or a less-busy season of the year, such as Lent, Advent or summertime. Gepford mentions, "It doesn't have to be adding something. Take inventory of your structure and build within that."

Once you find time, pray about the kind of project(s) or work you might do. Is your family passionate about an issue facing your community? Is there a global issue that you can be a part of solving? Reach out to your United Methodist district or conference office to learn more about ministries in your area. Once you choose a focus area, begin to research, discover, listen and respond.

MAKE IT AN ADVENTURE

If you have time available but you don't have specific mission work in mind, Gepford suggests "gamifying" the decision. This could be a monthly activity or something done randomly as schedules allow.

"There's something to be said for predictability, but there's also something about mixing it up," she says. "You could create a spinner, you could roll a dice – if it hits a five, go out and do something, if it hits a two, stay in and do something. You have a bank of ideas, but you don't know what the adventure is going to be. There's a building of expectation."

INVITE OTHERS TO PARTICIPATE

Involving family members and friends from different generations and backgrounds is also worth considering. "Part of being the Body of Christ means being able to do different things, being able to be with other people who are in different life stages than us," shares Gepford. Depending on the project, even babies can get involved. Gepford continues, "For infants to see helping, serving, missions... that's exposure at an early age, which is absolutely developmentally appropriate.

"And then the next piece I think about is, as we are serving, what does it look like to serve alongside those we are serving, to be neighbors with them rather than 'othering' them and creating that separate identity."

WONDER TOGETHER

Missional efforts, whether project-based or opportunities found in daily living, help us grow.

"Spark curiosity," says Rev. Gepford.
"Rather than just saying, 'Jesus did this so we do it, too.' Also ask, 'I wonder why Jesus did this? I wonder why it's still important for us to do this today? What did you see when we were serving together? What questions do you have?' The experience itself is formative. And helping [kids] make those [faith] connections through questions is key."

8 WAYS FAMILIES CAN ENGAGE IN MISSIONS

Rev. Gepford offers these ideas:

- Love your literal neighbors –
 Connect with your eight
 nearest neighbors. Get to
 know them, spend time out side with them, go to their
 soccer games and offer to
 help them when needs arise.
 Make them feel loved and
 welcome.
- 2. Perform random acts of kindness Pay for someone's groceries, pick up trash at a park, bake cookies and deliver them to first responders or call people who you haven't seen at church in a while.
- 3. Serve a nearby school –
 Clean up the playground, collect food for a backpack
 meals program, donate supplies or create artwork and thank you cards for teachers and administrators.
- Volunteer at your church –
 Be a part of the prayer team
 and pray as a family, wel come people to worship,
 help with the food pantry or
 visit church members who
 are unable to attend in per son.
- 5. Solve a problem Find a need in your community and figure out what factors are causing that problem. Brainstorm a solution and work together to put it into place.
- 6. Raise funds Host a lemonade stand, sell holiday treats, rake leaves, mow lawns or shovel snow. Donate the proceeds to a missionary, a local nonprofit or your church's mission fund. This will also offer a bonus lesson on generosity!
- 7. Learn about other cultures Research diverse cultures and identify what makes them unique and beautiful. Learn about how other kids live, learn and grow. If you find needs you can help fulfill, do so.
- Find a local shelter Whether it's a homeless shelter, animal shelter or food distribution program, there are likely to be several local nonprofit organizations that need volunteers.
