WOVEN TOGETHER: SHINING A LIGHT IN A SEASON OF DIVISION

As the vibrant colors of autumn begin to paint our world and the days grow shorter, there's a certain beauty in the way nature prepares for a new season. Yet, when we look beyond our windows and into the wider world, it often feels as though the social landscape is anything but peaceful. We live in a time when division, disagreement, and discord seem to dominate headlines. It can feel overwhelming, can't it?

But for us, the Body of Christ, this challenging climate presents not a reason for despair, but a profound opportunity to shine as a beacon of God's reconciling love. Jesus prayed specifically for our unity, not just for the sake of internal harmony, but so that the world might believe (John 17:20-21). This isn't just a nice idea; it's central to our witness!

In a world prone to tearing itself apart, we are called to be an example of coming together. Think of a beautifully woven tapestry. We are all different threads—different colors, textures, and strengths—but it is precisely in our being woven together, through Christ, that we create something whole, strong, and beautiful. Each thread retains its unique character, but its true purpose and beauty are realized in connection with others.

The Apostle Paul spoke extensively about this in his letter to the Ephesians, urging us to "make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." He reminds us that there is "one Body and one Spirit... one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all" (Ephesians 4). This is our foundation! Our unity isn't based on political agreement, shared hobbies, or even identical opinions on every matter. It is rooted in our shared identity in Christ. So, what does this look like in practice, especially when the world around us is so divided?

- 1. **Listen with Grace**: Before we speak, let's commit to true listening—to God, to each other, and even to those with whom we disagree. Listening seeks understanding, not just rebuttal.
- 2. **Speak with Love:** When we do speak, let our words be seasoned with grace and truth, building up rather than tearing down (Ephesians 4:29).
- 3. **Prioritize Christ**: In every interaction, ask yourself: "Does this bring glory to Christ? Does this foster unity in the Spirit?" When Christ is at the center, our differences often fade in significance.
- 4. **Pray for Peace**: Let us continually pray for peace in our hearts, our church, our communities, and our world. Prayer is the ultimate act of bringing God's perspective into our brokenness.

This fall, as we gather for worship, for fellowship, and for service, let's intentionally choose unity. Let our church be a powerful illustration of what God can do when His people, despite their differences, choose to live out their shared identity in Him.



Breast Cancer Awareness

October is Breast Cancer Awareness month, and Franklin First will be observing Breast Cancer Awareness Sunday on October 12 during worship. We will be remembering those who have passed who had breast cancer (that does not need to have been their cause of death) and honoring those who are survivors. The Women's Circle will hold a bake sale that day as a fundraiser for breast cancer research with proceeds going to the Susan G. Komen Foundation. Their work includes (1) funding technologies that accelerate breakthrough treatments, (2) ensuring that breast cancer patients have access to high-quality, affordable care, and (3) providing a safe, supportive and hopeful community for all.

Our Chancel Choir resumed their ministry on Grandparent's Sunday, and the Women's Ensemble joined the Chancel Choir for Back to Church Sunday. Kaylee has been part of Franklin First since birth. Over the years, she has experienced seasons of closeness with God and times of struggle. One defining moment came after the birth of her daughter Emelia, when she faced postpartum depression and anxiety. She leaned heavily on her doctors, friends, and family—who surrounded her with prayer and strength until she could reconnect with her faith. Kaylee describes this season as pivotal, helping her grow deeper in her walk with Christ.

Now, her faith is more intentional, especially as she guides her daughter in learning about Jesus. "For Emmy, we enjoy reading scripture and worshiping through music," Kaylee shares.

Over the years, Kaylee has sung in the choir, but more recently she has stepped into new roles within the church. She serves on the Children's Education Program and as a member of the Church Council. She finds great joy in helping kids engage with scripture and watching them begin to understand God's Word.

HOPES FOR FUTURE

Looking ahead, Kaylee hopes Franklin First continues to grow and adapt, especially to meet the needs of younger generations. "Modernization doesn't have to be all or nothing," she says. "But without change, I worry our church may struggle to connect with the next generation. My hope is that we can create a place where younger people feel welcomed, loved, and excited to be part of the family of Christ."


good candidate for a particular ministry. Thank you for offering your gifts and graces to our church's efforts.

From Bystander to Upstander: Answering the Call to Kindness and Courage

October is National Bullying Prevention Month, a time to stand together against behaviors that can cause lasting pain and harm. In a world that can

feel increasingly divided, our church is called to be a haven of unity, compassion, and love for everyone. We often think of bullying in a school context, but our society's communication has devolved into bullying as a means of coercion.

Bullying, whether it's in person or online, goes against the very core of our Christian values. It is a painful abuse of power that tears down others and isolates those who need our support the most. Our faith teaches us to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:31) and to "do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). This means treating every person with the dignity and respect they deserve as a child of God.

During this month, we are encouraged to be more than just bystanders. We can be "upstanders" by speaking out against injustice, offering support to those who are being targeted.

We can start by:


- Asking for the Holy Spirit to guide our words and actions.

It affects how a person reads, spells, and writes, but it's important to remember that many people with dyslexia are highly creative, strategic thinkers, and problem solvers.

Eight Ways to Nurture Faith in Young Children by: Laura Buchanan

It's never too early to begin sharing faith practices with our children. "Helping kids to know God's love and to know that God loves them is a really foundational concept that little ones, even from diapers, can be taught," says the Rev. Kathy Pittenger, Children's Initiatives Coordinator for the Michigan Conference of The United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Joanna Cummings, pastor with children and families at <u>East End United Methodist Church</u> in Nashville, Tennessee, agrees, "I believe that children are spiritual beings and I believe that they have a lot to show us about who God is."

Weave faith formation into the everyday

Nurturing faith in babies, toddlers and preschoolers is not only meaningful, it can also be a lot of fun. It is possible for your busy family to incorporate this important work into day-to-day life, you just have to find the spiritual practices that work best for your unique family.

Cummings and Pittenger share these practical ideas:

1. Evaluate your daily rhythms

Identify transitions and pauses where you can add prayer, discussion and Scripture to your routines. For example:

- Write or print prayers and hang them above the changing table as a reminder to pray in those moments together.
- Keep a stack of conversation starters in the car. Ask questions that have no "correct" answers, such as, "I wonder what it would have been like to see Jesus walk on the water?"
- Use meals, naptime and bedtime as opportunities for reading Bible stories and sharing prayers.

2. Pray in different ways

Explore a <u>variety of prayer practices</u> to find options



that your child most enjoys. As they grow, try new ones to meet their changing needs.

- The Lord's Prayer and the Doxology: Repetition is helpful for children. Saying the same prayer over and over is fine; in fact, it can bring familiarity and comfort.
- Body prayer: Use movement to express a prayer.
- Take a walk: Head outside to marvel at God's creativity and give thanks for it.
- Artistic prayer: Ask your child to draw what they'd like to say to God.

3. Read, play and learn

Reading a story Bible, such as the <u>Celebrate Wonder</u>
<u>Bible Storybook</u>, brings Scripture to life through illustrations and approachable vocabulary. Also consider <u>board</u>
<u>books</u>, <u>snuggle time books</u> and books focusing
on <u>prayers for families</u>. Since children learn through
play, finger puppets or interactive tools can help make
story time fun and memorable. Check out free <u>Digital</u>
<u>Faith Formation Playlists</u>, created by Pittenger and her
team, which include readings, questions, prayers, music, activities and more.

4. Model your faith

Our kids learn from us by watching us. As you lead the way in prayer, Bible study, engaging in worship, talking about God, serving others, being part of a faith community and exploring spiritual practices, children will want

your routine and they will begin to incorporate them into theirs as well. Kids might even remind you to complete a forgotten activity or suggest a new one.

5. Welcome hard questions

It's okay to not have answers to big questions, to say, "I don't know - let's try to find the answer together," and then turn to a pastor, resources or friends to help you unpack challenging topics. After all, parents are on a spiritual journey of growth, too, and it's great for kids to see you learning alongside them. For preschoolers, answer questions with one in return: "What do you think?" This will encourage them to lean on their spirituality and prior learning to draw conclusions, discover other topics they wonder about and generate further conversation.

6. Offer a blessing

Saying a blessing over your child at a key point in the day, such as before preschool or at bedtime, can help them connect deeply with you and with God. Hold or make eye contact with your child to create a special moment. Cummings shares this with her baby: "I bless you as you grow, I bless you as you go, I bless you as you play, I bless you today." Pittenger shares this with her school-age children: "God bless my children and help them to grow bigger and stronger and wiser and more in This story was published on March 2, 2022. love with God and all people every day."

7. Help others

Engaging in community service can be an excellent way to bond as a family, and it provides an opportunity to talk about loving our neighbors, being a Jesus follower and living out our faith. Projects such as sorting items at a food bank are often appropriate for volunteers of all ages. Participating in an advocacy effort related to a social justice issue that your family is passionate about is a powerful way for kids to see that their voice matters and that they can make a difference on behalf of others.

8. Find connection

Being active in a faith community helps children see

to join you. They'll come to expect these components of their role in the body of Christ. Including young children in worship services broadens their understanding of church and what it means to praise God. It's also important that kids know they can trust and learn from adults other than their parents, whether they be Sunday School teachers, grandparents or family friends. As an added bonus, the community provides parents with a support system as you seek ideas and resources from pastors, church staff and other families who are in a similar life situation.

Encouragements for parents

"[Parents] may not be the expert on all things theological, but they are the expert on their kids. We don't have to have all the right words or all the right answers," says Pittenger.

Cummings shares, "Parents, give yourself grace. You are loving and nurturing the faith of your child in the middle of a season that's really difficult and challenging, especially for young families. Anything that is intentional about sharing the love of God, about sharing the story of God, or even just sharing your faith with your child in conversation is really impactful."
