He was throwing a fit, his face was red, and he had tears running down his cheeks. He would not be calmed down by any means known to parenthood. I was frustrated, embarrassed, and ready to leave the store and forget the whole trip. Ever been there?

Meltdowns! They are not limited to toddlers, are they? Have you ever found yourself in the red-faced, tantrum mode of being? Perhaps with a family member, maybe at work, or even with a total stranger? The situation is unbearable, out of the question, over the top unforgiveable.



I was sitting in a crowded holiday parking lot waiting for a car to pull out of a parking spot. Before I could pull into the vacated slot, another car whipped into the space. I saw red and responded out of a road-rage attitude. Not one of my better moments.

Ever had a meltdown with God? We are going to spend the Sundays in August during the dogdays of summer looking at Bible characters who had meltdowns. Each in their own way was resisting God in some fashion and they were challenged for their behavior.

- God asked Moses to return to Egypt and confront Pharoah, but Moses didn't want to go.
- Balaam was summoned by King Balak, but God told him not to go. He went anyway.
- The Prophet Elijah had successfully defeated the priests of Baal, yet he cowered when his life was threatened by Queen Jezebel.
- · King Nebuchadnezzar, ruler of Babylon and contemporary of the Prophet Daniel, took personal credit for the rise of Babylon. Nebuchadnezzar was stricken with insanity in accordance with a dream that he had had, and Daniel had interpreted.

It is common to find ourselves struggling when we are resisting God in some way because we are operating outside of God's will. God uses some extraordinary means to empower us to align with his plan. Working with God is always better than working against God.

Free Medical Clinic

Franklin First's Free Medical Clinic operates weekly on Tuesday evenings. Registration runs from 5:30-6:30, and patients are seen on a first come, first served basis. We are targeting the uninsured and underinsured; and have treated infections, diabetes, and those in need of medical equipment – among other things. The clinic is manned by Dr. Chamberlain and volunteer nurses and support staff. Please continue to spread the word that this resource is available. We like to see new patients connect with us.





Anthony Wayne Tutoring— To Begin September 7th

Principal Jim Rhoades has created the schedule for Franklin First's Tutoring Program with Anthony Wayne Elementary students. The fall session will run from September 7 through November 16 (no tutoring on November 2). The winter session will run from January 11 through March 17 (no tutoring on February 15). We are again recruiting tutors to work on reading skills with early elementary students identified by the school as in need of help. The reading teacher from Anthony Wayne provides the curriculum.

The program meets weekly on Thursdays from 3:15 until approximately 4:30 (or when your assigned student has been picked up). If you are not available for every week, we have subs who can fill in – or you can volunteer as a substitute. You can also sign up for just one of the semesters. Tutors are especially needed for the winter months. All tutors must have had a background check, and we will provide that if you need one.

The schedule during tutoring operates as follows:

3:10-3:30 Gym time with Pastor Laura
3:30-3:45 Snack time with Sally Fitzgerald
3:45-4:30 Tutoring time
4:30 Pickup time

Tutoring is a great way to bless a child, helping them to achieve their very best. Students and tutors often form a great bond of friendship. Talk to Linda Smith, Karen Anderson, or Pastor Laura to sign up or with questions.



Weekend Snack Pack Program

Many of our local families struggle with food insecurity and rely on school meals to help with their children's nutrition. The snack pack program provides shelfstable snacks to help families through those days without school meals. The

bags are packed on Wednesday afternoons beginning at 1:30 in the Mission Room on the third floor. The school picks them up on Thursday for student distribution on Friday. You are welcome to help pack the bags, and donations to the program are always appreciated.




Getting Ready for our Choirs to Return



The Gift of Endowment



A Daughter's Memories:

Facebook Reconnected Us with Rev. Cooper's Daughter

Did you read the last month's edition of the "225th Anniversary of Methodism in Franklin" in the July Steeple Bell?

Joan Cooper Ashman follows Franklin First on Facebook. As Joan was browsing through the last month's Steeple Bell edition a familiar name caught her eye in the "225th Anniversary of Methodism in Franklin" article. It was her father, Rev. H. Allen Cooper, who had served as the pastor of Franklin First from June 1953 to June 1957. It was under Rev. Cooper's leadership that the Education Building was constructed, a place that held many fond memories for Joan. She decided to contact the church and share some of her stories.

Joan expressed her delight and surprise at seeing her father's name in the article. She recalled how the new building was a magnet for kids of all faiths, who came to play ping pong and shuffleboard after school. She was in the 7th grade then, and she enjoyed joining them in the fun. She also remembered attending dances in the multi-purpose room. She said that she still loved playing ping pong and shuffleboard to this day.

Joan also reminisced about living in the old parsonage, a block away from the church. She described it as a beautiful house, and wondered how it looked like now. She had seen some pictures of it online, and thought it looked even more stunning.

She also shared a sad news: her father had passed away in February of 1958, just eight months after they left Franklin. She said that made her memories of Franklin even more special to her. She wondered if there were any people in the congregation who still remembered her or her parents. She wished she could visit Franklin First, but said that

it was unlikely at the moment. She currently lives in Delaware with her husband, but had spent most of her adult life in Maryland.

She ended her letter by thanking us for keeping her father's legacy alive, and for letting her relive some of her happy moments in Franklin. She also shared the photos included in this article. She said she would continue to follow the church on Facebook. Do you remember Joan or her father, Rev. Cooper? If so, reach out to us and share your memories.

225th Anniversary of Methodism in Franklin – Part 8 (1973-1998)

This is the eight article commemorating the 225th anniversary of forming the congregation that became the Franklin First United Methodist Church (FFUMC), the period from 1973 through 1998 is described today. Our congregation dates our founding to Monday August 14, 1798 when the Methodist Episcopal (M.E.) missionary Rev. John Kobler (1768-1843) held the first religious service in the frontier hamlet of Franklin. For than 50 years, irregular services were held by Methodist "circuit-rider" preachers. A full time minister was assigned to Franklin in 1853 and the current church building was constructed in 1860 and remains our Sanctuary until the present time.

During May 1973 the congregation celebrated its 175th anniversary with a week of events and special services as described in last month's Steeple Bell.

The elevator connecting the basement, second floor rooms, sanctuary, and the upper floor was installed during 1975. Also in that year a new parsonage was purchased on Morgan Court to replace the one built in 1881 with a more modern home. It still remains the residence for Franklin's UMC pastors and their families.

In the early 1970s, United Methodist Women (UMW) group started making from scratch large batches of noodles to sell at the church's annual Christmas bazaars. They also held a spring salad luncheon every year. Proceeds from both events went to support the church and its various missions. In 1989 a new Monday evening group for women called The Women's Circle was started to support various activities that included an Annual Mother-Child banquet each May. Since 1976, FUMC has presented the "Woman of the Year" at the Mother-Child banquet. The first honoree that year was Martha Newcomb.

In 1984 the Aspenleiter Bell Choir was established in honor of Clarence and Dorothy Aspenleiter, the former choir director from 1953 to mid-70s and his wife. This group was formed under the direction of Monica Rhude, who since circa 1986 became the Church's Di-

rector of Music and choir director. In 1988, Mrs. Wilhelmina McLane Vinnell retired following serving as the church organist after 42 years. Mrs. Nancy Osborne started as the organist in 1988 served faithfully until she retired in 2013. Also in 1988 The United Methodist Men's group was organized within our church and was active for a number of years until this group disbanded in the mid-2000s.

The 200th anniversary of Methodism in Franklin was celebrated with fifteen events starting from a "Bicentennial Rally Day" on September 7, 1997 through the "Bicentennial Service and Dinner" held in September 1998. Holiday events included a Messiah sing-along in December and a New Year's celebration based on John Wesley's original covenant service. One notable event was on March 8th when an "Old-Fashioned Dress-Up Day" featuring a Wesley Hymn Fest celebrating Methodism/s Saint Day that was followed by a "traditional" Methodist Carry-in dinner.

Franklin First Team Updates

Trustee Update



The following is a list of real expenses, and some possible expenses.

- 1. Roof over sanctuary . Job completed, except for a couple risers to support ductwork under snow load. \$5000.00 plus cost of risers. Not yet billed.
- 2. Replacing and fixing storm windows that fell out or were about to fall. Work has started, templates being made for replacement. Balance to be billed upon competition \$1400.00
- 3. Repair of the plaster walls above the alter. Currently giving the wall time to dry out, will check with a moisture meter before repair. No cost estimate available yet.
- 4.Parsonage received a check from insurance for \$14,373.00, with a possible bill back of \$3700.00 additional upon competition of the job. We paid \$5000.00 for the cleanup, leaving approximate \$9,373.00 cash on hand. Right now we will get a contract to repair all, of approx \$6000.00, less any flooring. Flooring for the entire area could run between 4-5000.00. That includes moving some furniture, tear out and haul away of remaining carpet, installing new tac strip where needed. In order to bill back insurance, and to receive any of the \$3700.00, we must submit all bills paid in full.
- 5. We have received a quote to refinish the front doors of the church. They would be finished in place, no removal. The quote is \$1900.00, a savings of approximately \$800.00 over a quote from last year. The higher quote required removal of the doors, boarding up the entry, and we had to deliver and pick up the doors. The person doing the work, suggested this be done sooner than later due somewhat to weathering

of the wood. We plan to take this quote through the approval process, starting with trustees, and ending with church council. Those front entry doors put our best foot forward to the public passing by. Women's Circle has committed some funds toward the front doors. I'm unsure of that figure.

- 6. The handrail replacement is in the works. Cost of that is being covered totally by Women's Circle. \$1800.00. The sink in the hallway by the pop/ Water cooler is being replaced. New cabinet, counter top, stainless steel sink, high ark faucet, again being covered by Women's Circle. Approximate cost \$550.00
- 7. lastly, we have never received a final bill from Dayton Door for the 3rd street door replacement. Approximate balance \$2600.00. It has been well over a year since completion, Jim has contacted them with no response. I doubt we will ever be billed, but an accounting review of their books, could generate a bill. I believe Tami still has the funds.

Of course, a building the age we are dealing with, can surprise us with about any unforeseen issue at any time that would require immediate attention. Mike Runyan

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU MAKE FAITH A VERB? BY: JOSEPHS YOU

something we have but something that we do?

In Luke 17, Jesus lays out some heavy teaching and he ends the lesson with, "Even if someone sins against you seven times in one day and return to you seven times and says, 'I am changing my ways,' you must forgive that

person."



Flabbergasted at this teaching, the disciples pleaded with Jesus, "Increase our faith!"

Has there been a time where you wished you simply

had *more* faith? Or a time when someone simply told you, "Have more faith?"

It's a very, well, *American* response. Seemingly, the solution to many of our problems is *more*. More money. More fame. More clout. More time. More faith.

But what does more faith even look like?

I really disliked it when people told me all I needed was more faith. How do I muster "more" faith? Do I just squeeze my eyes, hands, and everything else tighter and just... and press out more faith? Sure, I prayed more, but it never helped me feel like I had more faith.

Then those same people would quote the next part of Luke's story, "If you had the faith the size of a mustard seed..." sort of implying that I never even had *that* to begin with.

Don't you find it funny that as the disciples asked Jesus for more faith, Jesus basically denied their request?

ASKING FOR MORE FAITH

Why do you think Jesus denied their request?

I guess we have to ask what it means when we ask for more faith (or when we tell someone to have more faith).

I think a lot of times, my request for more faith was just to relieve existential and theological anxiety: "Geez God, just throw me a bone. Prove to me you're real so that it becomes *impossible* to doubt you. Just once. It'll only take one undeniable proof to have me never doubt you again!"

The rest of the time, my request comes out of a deep desire for some kind of supernatural ability. Or, really... if I'm completely honest, the ability to control God and get God to do what I want God to do.

Years ago, the United Methodist Church launched a media campaign called Rethink Church, essentially asking "What if church wasn't a noun but a verb?" Maybe we should launch a Rethink Faith campaign and ask, "what if faith isn't a noun but a verb?" Basically, what if faith isn't

I feel that when Jesus said, if you had faith the size of a mustard seed he implied that we already have all the faith that we need.

There's no one-size-fits-all when it comes to faith. There's no specific prayer to obtain more faith. There's no formula to make you a more faithful Christian. Because faith isn't quantifiable.

You already have Jesus, what more do you need?

ABRAHAM AND MORE FAITH

What made Abraham the example of faith? For me, it comes in two words from Genesis 12:4: *Abram left*. In the story, God told Abram to leave *everything* he had known behind and trust in God. And *Abram left*.

He didn't sit and pray about it; he didn't ask to double his portion of faith; he didn't seek out some Bible verse to ponder God's words — he trusted God and *left*.

So, for me what faithfulness looks like today is inspired by Abram/Abraham: to *do* faith.

To do the loving I'm called to do.

To do the forgiving that Jesus invited us to do.

To do the small things that may seem inconsequential, or even beneath me, with great love.

Because, that's what I'm essentially called to do.

Knowing all the Bible verses and saying all the prayers are good things. We really should continue to practice reading the Bible and praying. But that's not the be all end all of faith. The command to "love God" is accompanied by one to love neighbors. We pray and we act.

Faith isn't always meant to shock and awe others. Faith is simply being aware and acknowledge God's presence around us at all times and understanding that we're invited to partner with God in the work of ushering God's kingdom closer and closer.

So be faithful by stepping out. Trust that God's spirit is with you and "go and do":

Do the loving.

Do the helping.

Do the caring.

Do the forgiving.

Treat faith more like a verb than a noun.
