

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is 80 years old. At General Conference in May, representatives reported on

the work of this connectional aid organization. In 1940, Bishop Herbert United Methodist Committee On Relief Welch (1862-1969) proposed to General Conference the formation of a new coalition to address global human suffering. The early focus was on World War II refugees and migrants, bringing hope and healing to communities devastated by the disasters of war.

Today, UMCOR is the humanitarian relief arm of the UMC, part of the General Board of Global Ministries. As part of our connectional system, the organization is primarily funded by the U.S. annual conferences and responds around the world when a local community is overwhelmed in its efforts to respond to disaster.

UMCOR has adopted the following goals:

- Disaster relief and recovery.
- Assisting migrants.
- Fostering environmental sustainability.
- Promoting sustainable agriculture.
- Global health.

You might remember some of the larger recent initiatives UMCOR championed. Mosquito nets for African communities were provided to fight the spread of malaria. The "Wings of the Morning" campaign raised funds for the purchase of an airplane to help meet medical needs in rural Africa. The beauty of our connectional United Methodist system is that we share resources to better the lives of neighbors near and far. We can do more together than we could ever do alone.





We observe UMCOR Sunday in March, and contributions on that day fund the administrative costs of the organization so that any monies given for a particular disaster can be shared at 100% with those who are suffering. Apart from specific disaster initiatives, UMCOR provides cleaning buckets, works for sustainable clean food and water, adequate shelter, basic healthcare, legal services, solar panels, and other means of blessing lives.

I am grateful for the work of UMCOR. Their reach extends far beyond what one congregation could accomplish on its own. Others around the world come to know God through the caring, real, and tangible humanitarian efforts given as a sign of God's unconditional love.

Music Sunday



Future of School Ministries

With the reorganization of Franklin Elementary Schools, many have been wondering

how this will affect our snack pack and tutoring programs. The good news is that both will continue. Let me share what I know at this point.

Principal Jim Rhoades will be at Gerke Elementary, which will house all first-grade students. Franklin First will continue partnering with Mr. Rhoades at Gerke for both tutoring and snack packs. As far as I know, we are the only church that provides literacy tutoring.

Schenk Elementary will house the Pre-K and Kindergarten stu-

dents and Hunter will house the second graders. The Kindness Snack Pack program, affiliated with Southwest Church in Springboro, will serve both schools.

Third through fifth grade students will move to the modular classrooms behind the Junior High (the old high school). I recently sent out a letter to other churches in the Franklin School System explaining the snack pack ministry and inviting other churches to become partners. At the time of this writing, two churches are in the initial stages of learning about the snack pack program. I am hopeful that by the start of school in August, we will have new ministry alliances that will pick up grades three, four, and five.

Mission coordinators Linda Smith and Karen Anderson share my excitement that these important ministries will continue. Thank you to all who donate their time and resources to bless Franklin students. Please join me in prayer that all necessary details will fall into place. Pastor Laura


2023-24 Snack Pack Success



Boy Scouts of America to Become Scouting America



This rebranding reflects the continuing efforts to welcome everyone to experience the benefits of Scouting

The Boy Scouts of America today announced that it will rebrand to Scouting America, reflecting the organization's ongoing commitment to welcome every youth and family in America to experience the benefits of Scouting. The change will go into effect on February 8, 2025, the organization's 115th anniversary.

This announcement also comes as the organization celebrates the fifth anniversary of welcoming girls into Cub Scouting and Scouts BSA programs. Scouting America currently serves more than 176,000 girls and young women across all programs, including over 6,000 who have earned the rank of Eagle Scout.

"Though our name will be new, our mission remains unchanged: we are committed to teaching young people to be Prepared. For Life," said Roger A. Krone, president and chief executive officer of Scouting America. "This will be a simple but very important evolution as we seek to ensure that everyone feels welcome in Scouting."

Scouting America builds on the organization's 114 years of helping America's youth. Its ongoing goal is to provide young people with a safe environment where they can learn meaningful life skills and have fun, educational experiences, fostering their growth and future outcomes as leaders, and be prepared for life. At the same time, values instilled by the Scout Oath and Law help prepare young people for lives of purpose and impact.

More than 130 million Americans have been through Scouting programs since its founding in 1910, and currently, more than 1 million youth, including both men and women, are served by 477,000 dedicated adult volunteers in local councils throughout the country. To date, more than 2.75 million youth have earned Scouting's highest rank of Eagle Scout.

In addition to supporting the nation's youth, Scouting America will continue to be an important asset to strengthen our communities, having provided more than 7 million hours of volunteer services for community improvement and other projects across the country annually.

"Scouting America provides a welcoming, safe environment where youth can become the best version of themselves by learning from and respecting each other," said Krone. "I encourage everyone to join us and experience the benefits of Scouting."

PRAYERS WHEN SEEKING PEACE OF MIND Edited by Rev. Ryan Dunn

Many of us grapple with anxiety on a near daily basis and often find ourselves longing for ways to calm our minds and interrupt the downward emotional spiral



that leads towards depression and dark thoughts. Finding ways to cultivate mental peace can be crucial for our overall well-being. For those exploring the intersection of spirituality and daily life, prayer can offer a meaningful practice to address and process these anxieties.

But prayer can be intimidating. Sometimes we lack the words to communicate what we're feeling. The value of Christian is that, for thousands of years, faithful people have been facing similar issues and asking questions similar to those we wrestle with today. We can lean on the words they shared long ago to help guide or focus and center our thoughts in the here and now.

Below is a collection of prayers shared throughout Christian history. Perhaps one might stir in you a sense of perspective or provide the words you feel, but can't quite voice.

It's important to acknowledge that while prayer can be a powerful tool for many, it is not a substitute for professional mental health care. If you or someone you know is struggling with severe anxiety or other mental health issues, seeking help from a professional is both appropriate and encouraged.
