

Juneteenth - June 19

The Juneteenth National Independence Day Act was



signed into law by President Joe Biden on June 17, 2021. Perhaps you,

like me, do not know much about the history of this federal holiday. I thought I would share some research into its importance.

On June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger proclaimed freedom for slaves in Texas — a final step in emancipation for slaves. President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, declaring that all slaves in the Confederate States of American in rebellion and not in Union hands were freed. But during the Civil War, emancipation came at different times in different parts of the southern United States. When General Granger issued General Order Number 3 declaring freedom for slaves, the southern rebellion to emancipation collapsed. The Juneteenth holiday derives its name from combining "June" and "nineteenth."

In 1980, the Texas Legislature made
Juneteenth a state holiday, and over the next
two decades it was officially recognized as an
official observance in all states, except South
Dakota, until becoming a federal holiday. In

2016, activist Opal Lee, often referred to as the "grandmother of Juneteenth," began a walk from Ft. Worth, Texas to Washington D.C. to advocate for the federal holiday.

Celebration traditions often include public readings of the Emancipation Proclamation, and singing traditional songs such as "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" and "Lift Every Voice and Sing." The works of significant African-American writers such as Maya Angelou are often read. Historical reenactments, street fairs, cookouts, and family reunions are typically part of the festivities. Gatherings frequently include voter registration efforts.

As we intentionally move toward a more inclusive and equal rights society, may we honor all of God's children.

Franklin First has a history of involvement with this group which seeks to provide housing and services to families that are homeless or at risk of homelessness. Family Promise has now acquired Shaken Inn on Cincinnati Avenue in Lebanon as a permanent location for their services.

Matthew 25: Ministries — Pill Bottle Donations

Franklin First has been collecting pill bottles for Matthew 25: Ministries to include in their shipments of medical supplies in developing countries. As of March 2023, they have changed the guidelines for accepting these donations. Please follow these guidelines before bringing them to church.


Acceptable collection items include:

- Prescription and over-the-counter pill bottles
- Large and small pill bottles
- Pill Bottles with and without secure caps (childresistant)

Pill bottle donations should adhere to the following guidelines:

• Bottles included in shipments of medical supplies must have an all plastic lid.

- Bottles should be sorted by color and type.
- All labels should be removed, leaving no glue or residue.
- All bottles and lids should be washed in very hot water and dish soap, rinsed, and dried thoroughly.
- Caps should be placed back onto clean, dried bottles.
- Clean, recapped bottles should be placed into large resealable bags marked "Clean Bottles." These will be included in shipments of medical supplies.

The last Finance Meeting was April 12, 2023 and at that meeting Tami Chamberlain brought forth a


motion how the Church can fund the Parsonage basement cleanup without borrowing money from the line of credit. This motion was approved by by the Finance Committee.

caused by the sewer back up at the parsonage has been cleaned up, we should receive a check from insurance to apply towards repairs next week. We were approved by insurance for replacement of the storm glass that blew out in a recent wind event. Total cost quoted \$2095.00. Repair of the leak over the alter has been approved. The contract was signed with the roofer, just waiting on a start date.

Finally, we are researching handrail options for the church entry. No firm decision yet.

This is the sixth article commemorating the 225th anniversary of forming the congregation that became the Franklin First United Methodist Church (FFUMC), the period from 1923 through 1948 will be described. Our congregation dates our founding to Monday August 14, 1798 when the Methodist Episcopal (M.E.) missionary Rev. John Kobler (1768-1843) held the first religious service in the frontier hamlet of Franklin. For than 50 years, irregular services were held by Methodist "circuit-rider" preachers. A full time minister was assigned to Franklin in 1853 and the current church building was constructed in 1860 and remains our Sanctuary until the present time.

From comparing the 1920 to 1930 U.S. census data the population of Franklin village increased from just over 3000 by more than 75% to nearly 5400. Much of this growth was due to the operation of a number of mills and foundries in the town as well as the steel mill and other factories in nearby Middletown and the General Motors plants on south side of Dayton. Of course, the community was impacted by the Great Depression during the 1930s and also World War II. Franklin's Methodist church and congregation didn't undergo any major changes but continued to serve the local residents.

In 1939 the name of the national Methodist denomination was changed to The Methodist Church following the merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church with the Methodist Protestant Church (formed in 1830) and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (MECS) that had been created in 1844 during the national schism within the Church over the issues of slavery and its abolition prior to the U.S. Civil War. The doctrine of the MECS rationalized the existence of slavery as being tolerated within biblical writings even though the Wesleys and most other ME leaders and members outside of the slave-holding states vigorously opposed this practice. Franklin named changed to The Methodist Church.

During most of this period the Church had primarily two organists. Anna M. Stahl (1869–1947) began

~1915 and served until the mid-1940s while Wilhelmina McLane Vinnell (1908-2011) started in 1946 played our organ until 1984. Also, Harry C. Eldridge (1873-1946), an extremely accomplished musician and composition as well as founder of the Eldridge Music Company in Franklin, was the choir director from circa 1915 until early 1940s.

The earliest known photograph of the Franklin Methodist choir is dated to between 1931 and 1936 when Dr. George H. Smith was the pastor in Franklin. A second photograph of the choir from around 1945 also shows the pipes for the magnificent organ that had been built in 1893 and it was used regularly during the worship services and other events.

NATURE CONNECTS US TO GOD BY: LAURA BUCHANAN



Time spent outdoors can strengthen our faith and reveal a deeper meaning in our daily life. God equipped us with five senses to help us discover and better appreciate the natural world – it's up to us to step outside, engage and explore.

Few could say they've experienced this more than Jack Layfield. In 2019, at age 67, Layfield served as a chaplain on the Appalachian Trail, hiking 2,192 miles through 14 states in 6 months. Layfield's unique perspective opens the way for all of us to understand how nature can be a balm for our soul and an invitation to reflect.

"In everyday living in our world, all five of our senses are

After his Appalachian Trail through-hike was complete, Layfield wrote more than 160 devotions and gathered them in a book, "On the Trail with Chappy Jack: Devotions for the Path You're On."

"I never had that aspiration [to write a book]. I felt like the Lord was speaking to my heart to do that," Layfield says. Each entry offers a story from Layfield's hiking adventures, as well as a Scripture reading, reflection and prayer.

Layfield, a retired mental health therapist, served through the Appalachian Trail Chaplaincy, an initiative of the Holston Conference of The United Methodist Church. Each year, a new chaplain hits the trail to build relationships and share the love of God with everyone they meet. All proceeds from Layfield's book benefit the ongoing ministry, which was established in 2013.

bombarded. We just have so much coming to us 24/7," says Layfield. Being intentional about spending time in nature, and paying attention

while we are there, can help us find peace.

Look

"At a young age I knew that God had created [nature], from the very little things that we see to the great, majestic things," shares Layfield. "That was one of the things that was so good about the [Appalachian Trail]. There were the tiniest of wildflowers, the tiniest of little creatures. But then also there were the mountains with beautiful vistas when you reached the top."

Put it into practice: Go outside or gaze out of your window. What's the smallest thing you see? The biggest? Take a moment to marvel at God's creativity and your own place in creation.

Read Scripture: Psalm 96:11-12

Hear

When people ask Layfield why he hiked the trail, he answers, "I love being out in nature, I love enjoying God's creation. But the other reason is, after a while, I was able to experience the quietness of the trail, where I'm not bombarded by sounds. I felt like I could hear God speaking to me."

Put it into practice: Layfield begins each day by sitting on his back porch, listening to the birds and soaking in the quiet stillness of the morning. Try this for yourself one day this week. Bring along your cup of coffee and a Bible.

Read Scripture: John 10:27-30

Taste

"On the trail, I had ramen noodles almost every night," mentions Layfield. "And people say to me, 'How did you eat that day after day?' I can't really say it tasted bad. I always looked forward to it. I think being outdoors, in nature, it enhances the taste somehow. That's not a scientific thing, but for me, I think it has."

Put it into practice: Pack a simple snack or meal and find a picnic spot. Eat slowly, with intention, and savor each bite. Give thanks for your surroundings, the food and anyone who might be with you.

Read Scripture: Psalm 23

Smell

"The things that we smell, we really don't notice them unless it's something really outstanding, like an apple pie baking in the oven." Layfield says. "On the trail, after hikers had been hiking for 2, 3 or 4 months, there was a phenomenon that when we passed a day hiker that would be coming the other way, and when they were at least 20 feet away, we could smell that hiker. It was a pleasant, usually soapy smell."

Put it into practice: Sit outside for several minutes and close your eyes. Take a few deep breaths. What do you smell? Try to identify more than one scent. Remember that from this earth, God created you.

Read Scripture: 2 Corinthians 2:14-17

Touch

"I have a little garden and I like digging in the dirt... I don't know why people that garden do. Maybe there's something about it that brings us all back into touch with what we once were," suggests Layfield. "Maybe it all goes back to the Garden of Eden. I guess all of this maybe does."

Put it into practice: Plant a seed. Hold the dirt. Get mud-

dy. Care for your new plant over time and touch the leaves once they sprout. Think about the growth cycle and how you might emulate it in your spiritual life.

Read Scripture: Genesis 1:9-12

Take the Creator's peace to others

Layfield remembers many acts of kindness along the trail. A woman offered him a ride in spite of his smelly, dirty appearance. Someone left thermoses of hot coffee and donuts for people to find as they hiked through the snow. A stranger took Layfield and a fellow hiker out to dinner.

He says, "There were people like that all along the way. It's just amazing."

Put it into practice: As creations of God, we are called to care for the earth and for each other. After you've found peace in nature, it's time to share it. How will you do this? Host a picnic in your neighborhood or teach a young person the benefits of unplugging from technology, perhaps. Consider the endless possibilities and choose one that will bring the light of Christ to those around you.
