Lent – A Time of Reflection

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2. It is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays – ending on Holy Saturday. This period is set aside as a time of preparation for celebrating Easter. We typically approach it as an opportunity for personal reflection on our individual faith commitment, but this year Franklin First will be using this as an occasion to reflect on the practices of our congregation.



Christians know that Jesus left his followers with the Great Commis-

sion: go and make disciples of all...yet in each generation, the means of making disciples looks a bit different. Today, people do not typically visit a church "cold turkey" without establishing some level of a connection with someone in the congregation and without researching the church to ascertain whether this Body of Christ might be a welcoming fit for them.

- 1. Reflect on the purpose of the church why we exist.
- 2. Look at the process of making disciples what we do that invites others to know the Lord.

3. Consider FFUMC's ministry structure – how we work together to accomplish our vision and mission.

We will be considering five pieces of the process:

1. Risk-taking mission and service – in our day and age, what are effective ways that we can invite others to know us and through us, to know God?

2. Radical hospitality – what can we do that will enable a newcomer to feel comfortable when visiting?

3. Passionate worship – how does our worship service help others encounter God and encourage developing a relationship with the Lord?

4. Faith-forming relationships – what can we do to pave the way for deepening our discipleship in connection with other believers?

5. Compassionate care – what can we employ as our safety net so that everyone stays engaged in the church and feels valued and care for?

As Christians, we want our family, friends, and community to be in relationship with God, and we also want Franklin First to be a beacon of God's light for generations to come. It is important to be intentional about our ministry choices to carry the Gospel message into the future.

Permanent Endowment Fund

At our Free Medical Clinic recently, one of our clients who had asked to have prayer with me said that she had been following our church on social media. She was trying to judge if she would be welcomed here and



had been enjoying our worship services as a source of food for her soul. She thanked me for the church's decision to reach out into the community and said that she felt she already knew us in many ways.

Her story is important as an example of reaching others in the name of Jesus Christ. Times have changed and we have found that we must get creative in the ways that we invite others to engage in a life of faith. Yet we all want our children and grandchildren, our neighbors and friends, the many beyond our circle of influence to come to know the Lord.

A friend of mine was telling me recently that he had visited a financial planner. Prior to the appointment, he was sure that he was doing all he could with his resources. The financial planner opened his eyes to new possibilities.

Did you know that there are creative ways to give to the church and extend the church's influence to future generations? At Franklin First, we have established a Permanent Endowment Fund as a way to help stretch giving dollars. This type of fund is different from General or Memorial Fund giving.

Think of it as "leaving a legacy." Contributions to the Permanent Endowment Fund can be made at any time, and many folks choose to give to this fund as a part of their "Planned" or "Estate" giving. One does not have to be affluent to give to the Permanent Endowment Fund. The gift can be set up through a will or as a regular part of monthly giving. It is a part of personal stewardship.


We were able to pay the half down requirement when the contract was signed and will have the remainder due at the end of the repair. You are always faithful in your generosity with church repairs, and we invite you

Lent & Holy Week

Observing Lent and Holy Week

Ash Wednesday is March 2. We will have an Imposition of Ashes service at 6:30 pm. Choir practices will follow the service.

Palm Sunday is April 10, and we will be celebrating in worship with a procession of palms and a remembering of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem.

Maundy Thursday is April 14. Our 6:30 worship service will include Holy Communion.

Good Friday is April 15, and this somber 6:30 service will include a stripping of the altar and the sounds of sorrow.

We will celebrate the high holy day of **Easter** on April 17 at our 10:45 worship service with much music and a message of hope.

We invite you to join us in this special commemoration of Jesus' journey to the cross and resurrection from the dead. As Christians, these remembrances are central to our faith.

UMCOR Sunday

Imagine you are sleeping peacefully in your bed one night and suddenly you hear what sounds like the roar of a freight train. You run for shelter but moments later your house, indeed your entire community, has been leveled by a major tornado. You were lucky to have survived, but what do you do now?

UMCOR stands for United Methodist Committee on Relief and will be the focal point of a Special Sunday on March 27. When watching disaster unfold around the globe, many of us feel the call to help but are at a loss as to what we can actually do. UMCOR Sunday is the day for congregations around the globe to HELP.

UMCOR offers aid in Jesus' name to those who suffer:

- "Don't withhold good from someone who deserves it. when it is in your power to do so." PROVERBS 3:27, CEB
- For victims of natural disaster, UMCOR is often one of the first relief teams on the scene.
- When children in Zimbabwe lost parents to AIDS, UMCOR responded.
- UMCOR delivers food, water, shelter, and long-term recovery assistance to help many of the 68.5 million people displaced by war, persecution, and natural disaster.

UMCOR acts as the hands and feet of Christ's Church, moving toward the most vulnerable in their time of need. Helping people in their darkest days doesn't have to be something "they" do, it can be something "we" do. Contributions from UMCOR Sunday fund administrative costs so that when we donate to specific disaster efforts through UMCOR – 100% of those funds reach the victims. We can also be part of the support efforts by praying for the volunteers, the lives they touch, and for hearts to be moved in Jesus' name.



So What is Lent?

Lent is heavy. Lent is serious. It is a time of reflection and self-analysis and intentional consideration of what we believe and stand for as Christians. But, as dark as this sounds, if we do Lent right, we will emerge in 40 days with a renewed understanding of the magnitude of Jesus' sacrifice for us and a renewed trust in God's sovereignty in the light of the greatest spectacle and celebration that the universe has ever known: Easter. SO, WHAT IS LENT?

Lent is a season of the Christian Year where Christians focus on simple living, prayer, and fasting in order to grow closer to God.

WHEN IS LENT?

It's the forty days before Easter. Lent excludes Sundays because every Sunday is like a little Easter. Basically, it's about one-tenth of a year (like a tithe of time). Mardi Gras is the day before Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday.

MARDI GRAS? WHAT DOES THAT HAVE TO DO WITH JESUS??

Mardi Gras means "Fat Tuesday." It refers to the day before Lent starts. Since Lent always starts on a Wednesday, the day before is always a Tuesday. And it's called "Fat" or "Great" because it's associated with great food and parties.

In earlier times, people used Lent as a time of fasting and repentance. Through the years Mardi Gras has evolved (in some places) into a pretty wild party with little to do with preparing for the Lenten season of repentance and simplicity. Oh well. But Christians still know it's origin, and hang onto the true Spirit of the season.

SO THE REAL BEGINNING OF LENT IS ASH WEDNESDAY?

Yes. Ash Wednesday, the day after Mardi Gras, usually begins with a service where we recognize our mortality, repent of our sins, and return to our loving God. We recognize life as a precious gift from God, and re-turn our lives towards Jesus Christ. We may make resolutions and commit to change our lives over the next forty days so that we might be more like Christ. In an Ash Wednesday service, usually a minister or priest marks the sign of the cross on a person's forehead with ashes.

SO WHAT IS LENT?

At Jesus' baptism the sky split open, the Spirit of God, which looked like a dove, descended and landed on Jesus, and a



voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, My Beloved, with whom I am pleased." Afterward, as told in Matthew 4:1-11, Jesus was sent into the wilderness by the Spirit. Where he fasted and prayed for 40 days. During his time there he was tempted by Satan and found clarity and strength to resist temptation. Afterwards, he was ready to begin his ministry.

WHY "DO" LENT? HOW DO I START?

Are you searching for something more? Our lives are filled with distractions that take us away from living a life with Christ. Lent is a great time to "repent" -- to return to God and re-focus our lives to be more in line with Jesus. It's a 40 day trial run in changing your lifestyle and letting God change your heart. You might try one of these practices for Lent:

FASTING: Some people have been known to go without food for days. But that's not the only way to fast. You can fast by cutting out some of the things in your life that distract you from God. Some Christians use the whole 40 days to fast from candy, tv, soft drinks, cigarettes or meat as a way to purify their bodies and lives. You might skip one meal a day and use that time to pray instead. Or you can give up some activity like worry or reality tv to spend time outside enjoying God's creation. What do you need to let go of or "fast" from in order to focus on God? What clutters your calendar and life? How can you simplify your life in terms of what you eat, wear or do?

SERVICE: Some Christians take something on for Christ. You can collect food for the needy, volunteer once a week to tutor children, or work for reform and justice in your community. You can commit to help a different stranger, co-worker or friend everyday of Lent. Serving others is one way we serve God.

PRAYER: Christians also use Lent as a time of intentional prayer. You can pray while you walk, create music or art as a prayer to God, or savor a time of quiet listening. All can be ways of becoming more in tune with God.

Christians from many different traditions celebrate Lent. How will you use the time to grow closer to God?

Mission Opportunity

Are you looking for a mission opportunity — consider this "Volunteers In Mission:" trip lead by Pete and Judy of Prospect Street UMC. Mike and Linda Smith have served on several mission trips with them with them and participated on their team.

This year our team will go to the Waverly, Tn. area to serve with the rebuilding of the area after flooding that



occurred in August 2021. Heavy rains and storms severely impacted Middle Tn. Leaving 22 people dead and at least 100 homes forced off their foundations. It has been called the deadliest flood in Middle Tennessee history. At this time 160 homes are in cue for repair and 55 for rebuild. Volunteers are at the heart of all recovery efforts, and you are greatly appreciated by the community in Waverly!

The Dates: We will leave our Church on Sunday, June 5th and return on Saturday, June 11th.

The Work: We will not know the exact details of our projects until shortly before we depart. With many teams serving ahead of our arrival, we will follow the other teams and continue with the rebuilding. It will be much of the same work that we've done in Alabama, Iowa, Maryland, Mississippi, Nashville, New Orleans, South Carolina and West Virginia: Drywall, painting, gutting, plumbing, etc.

Housing: Our host Church has yet to be determined. Team members will be responsible for their own linens and cot / air mattress. Meals will be prepared by our team members. Be prepared that there may be another team for the week with us and we will share the facilities with them.

The Costs: \$350.00 for each team member. This will include transportation, meals and lodging.

<u>Payment Schedule</u>: Deposit of \$100.00 and your application is due by April 24, 2022. The balance of \$250.00 will be due by the team meeting, which will probably be the early part of May. Checks should be made out to "Prospect Street UMC".

<u>Applications</u>: Will be posted on the Mission Board or I can email them to you if needed. Minimum age is 14 and the maximum age is unlimited.

Size of Team: The size of the team will be limited to the first 16 to turn in their applications with their deposit.

Being a part of a mission team can be a life-changing experience. You will gain the satisfaction of working hard to help others in the name of Jesus Christ. As I've said before, what is one week in a lifetime to serve our lord and his people.

1 Peter 4:10: God has given each of you some special abilities, be sure to use them to help each other.

Are you willing to pick up the cross and be available, to go anywhere, to do anything and to serve God and his people?

New studies, devotionals for Lent



March 2 is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the season of Lent. During Lent, Christians prepare to celebrate the miracle of Easter through prayer, fasting and other spiritual disciplines.

Studies and devotional resources are available from Abingdon Press, the Upper Room and the Society of St. Andrew to help church leaders and congregants experience Lent as a season of reflection and attentiveness. Many are available to order in bulk or come with leader kits. Most are appropriate for individual use and for Sunday school/small group or congregation-wide studies.

Witness at the Cross: A Beginner's Guide to Good Friday (Abingdon Press)

Experience Holy Friday from the perspective of those who watched Jesus die. In Witness at the Cross, Dr. Amy-Jill Levine shows how the people at the cross each have distinct roles to play in the Gospels. The story of Jesus's death is not something we just read: we think about it, and we experience it; we hear the taunts of the soldiers, the priests, and the passersby even as we hear the famous "seven last words" from the cross. Available resources include the <u>book</u> itself, a <u>leader guide</u> and/ or <u>kit</u> and a <u>DVD</u>.




The Lord's Prayer: The Meaning and Power of the Prayer Jesus Taught (Abingdon Press)


<u>Unrevealed Until Its Season (Upper</u> <u>Room Books)</u>






