THE SUFFERING SERVANT

Have you ever read the 53rd chapter of the prophet Isaiah? Isaiah is known as the "Messianic Prophet" because so much of his writings foretell the coming of the Messiah. The 53rd chapter is a prophecy of the "substitutionary atonement" that is accomplished through Jesus' death on the cross

Think of a time as a kid when you were punished for disobedience. My dad was the disciplinarian in my family, and he had this process. If my brothers and/or I were doing something wrong, Dad would start counting. "One" was a warning that we better straighten up. "Two" indicated that we were pushing our defiance to the limit. If Dad got to "three," we knew that we had crossed the line, and we were going to be paying consequences for our rebellion. He was consistent in doling out those corrections, but they were always administered with love.

When we read Isaiah 53 however, we are reminded again that Jesus bore consequences that he did not earn. As the Suffering Servant, he paid the price for our sins. "Substitutionary atonement" means that Jesus was our substitute. Sin separates us from God. God is holy and will not abide with sin, but Jesus bridges that gap that would prevent us from having a relationship with God.

"For God so loved the world that He gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." John 3:16.

I remember a few times from childhood that I was included in punishment that I felt I hadn't deserved. It was my brothers' fault, but Dad didn't see it that way. I felt the unfairness of it all.

In today's world, we don't like to think about people being punished for crimes they didn't commit. With today's technology, new forensic evidence will sometimes overturn convictions and we are upset about the unjust punishment a person has endured.

As we review Isaiah 53, we see so many references to what happened in Jesus' final hours. No one opposed Jesus' unjust punishment – instead, they shouted for his crucifixion. Jesus was silent when given an opportunity to defend himself, willingly sacrificing himself for God's plan of salvation. He was beaten and died a criminal's death.

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin." Hebrews 4:15. Easter is on the horizon but let us not rush to the resurrection without sitting in the shadow of the cross and contemplating the courage, resolve, and love that took Jesus to Calvary.

General Conference

In the governance of the United Methodist Church, General Conference is the highest ruling body. Members of General Conference are selected by vote at area Annual Conferences for both Laity and Clergy. For matters to be considered at General Conference (which is scheduled to meet every four years), they must be submitted as legislation and there is a process to go through and a deadline for these items to be put on the agenda.



Our West Ohio Conference Bishop Gregory Palmer will be in attendance, along with the rest of the Council of Bishops. The bishops have no vote in General Conference matters, but they do provide spiritual leadership and monitor conference proceedings.

The next General Conference is set in Charlotte, NC and runs from April 23 through May 3 of this year. This will be an important conference, as many matters that could not be addressed because of the COVID cancellations of previous General Conferences will come before these conference delegates.

Probably the top of this list is the denomination's stance toward sexual orientation. Currently our Book of Discipline wording indicates that homosexual practice is not scriptural and prohibits the ordination of candidates for ministry that are practicing homosexuals. There are many pieces of legislation addressing sexual orientation.

Another topic is the structuring of the United Methodist Church, and a dominant proposal suggests a more regional approach to governance that enables geographic leadership to consider the context of their society in the statutes their region adopts.

The mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church has not changed. We are to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. My prayer for Franklin First and the denomination as a whole is that we stay united in the pursuit of this mission and ministry and not get sidetracked by the challenging issues before us.

Franklin First volunteers continue to tutor ten Anthony Wayne second graders during this winter/spring season. We work with the students on literacy training using curriculum pro-

vided by teacher Mrs. Simas. As the kids work on their language arts skills, they are also building relationships with their tutors.

As I was talking to Mr. Rhoades about the importance of the tutoring program, he observed that these early elementary students are at a disadvantage due to COVID restrictions. Kids that might normally have had the opportunity for advance learning opportunities in preschool were denied those benefits when preschools could not operate. Thus, the children entered school without the basic preparation that preschool learning can provide. As we work with them, we are reinforcing skills that are necessary for the upper grades.

We will be wrapping up tutoring for this school year with a party on March 21. I am so thankful for our faithful volunteers that enable this mission project! You are giving the kids a hand up with your time and encouragement. God bless you!




Outreach and Mission Ministries Flourish in 2023

A Look at Easter Traditions Around the World

United Methodists around the world celebrate Christ's Resurrection in many ways. Individuals in a variety of countries to share their traditions and here are some of their stories.

Zimbabwe: It is 3 a.m. on Easter Sunday 1980, and my mother, Mavis Mudambanuki, awakens me by knocking on the door of my room. Leaving my brothers asleep, I get dressed and meet her at the gate outside our home in Chipfatsura village, in Manicaland, Zimbabwe. In the dark, we trudge to Chegore village, seven miles away.

As we approach, my mother breaks into a familiar Easter song: "Christ is risen! Christ is risen! Hallelujah!" She knocks at the door of a home as she sings, and three women and a man join us with rattles and tambourines to augment the music. We go on to the next house, and as we move through the village, the procession grows.

Our party is making a joyful ruckus as we fill the road in Chegore village and head back to Chipfatsura United Methodist Church for a sunrise Easter service. Similar processions and vigils occur in other villages around the country.

The Philippines: In the "Rice Bowl of the Philippines" — Nueva Ecija, about 60 miles north of Manila — Christians celebrate Easter before sunrise. Traditionally, around 4:30 a.m., local churches form clusters to celebrate Easter jointly. The people gather at the river, by the hill, by the rice field, in front of mountains or in the garden. Most walk to an appointed Easter celebration location.

"It gives a lot of significance and meaning when Easter is celebrated outside the church building," said the Rev. Remedios dela Cruz. "It gives a lot of meaning to our faith and fellowship."

Dela Cruz cherishes the memories of Easters celebrated by the river in Sicsican,

Matanda Tavera. Easter-egg hunting, breakfast fellowship and group bonding, which included a plunge together into the river, followed worship. A fellowship of indigenous United Methodists called Dumagats in Malinaw, Gabaldon, traditionally celebrate Easter by the river as well.

"We go down into the river. Dawn is the time when nothing is heard except the rush of the river," said Pastor Daryll Joe Medina. The Dumagats gather to observe an hour of silence, embracing the promise of new life as they witness the light of the sun.

Deaconess Rachel dela Cruz from the Canaan, Rizal, area believes that sunrise depicts the heralding of a new beginning because it brings new hope.

Germany: In Neuenhain, near Frankfurt, an empty wire mesh cross is placed in the sanctuary before the beginning of the Easter service. The wire mesh symbolizes coldness and aloofness, and the wire represents the pain Jesus Christ endured on the cross. Church members bring flowers.

In the early part of the service, the Easter celebrants place their flowers on the empty wire mesh cross and gradually fill it with flowers. Suddenly, the "cold" cross becomes alive with flowers full of life and conveying a message of hope. This great image sends a reverberating message that Jesus' death is not the end. He gives us new life with God the Creator. Each flower demonstrates that through Christ's death, people's lives are not limited by death.

In the German tradition, the Easter cross reminds people of two truths in their culture.

First, people are as diverse as flowers. They have different family backgrounds, and Christ would encourage us to ap-

preciate diversity.



Second, people should imagine the cross of Jesus. The flowers on the Easter cross point with all their brightness to Jesus. No one flower makes the cross unique; a plethora of flowers together makes Jesus visible. Similarly, because we are the body of Christ, our individual work pales unless we work collaboratively with other Christians to make a huge

choruses all reflecting Easter. Dramas or skits from the youth groups portray the passion of Christ. A guest preacher or local pastor preaches during the Easter revivals.

Celebrations begin on Palm Sunday. Congregations march in a celebratory procession about five times in a Jericho fashion around the church, singing and dancing. Women ululate and men whistle as everyone carries small palm branches. This commemorates Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem.

Congregations without church buildings mark this event in a different way. They march carrying palm branches around the villages toward their worship place, either under a tree or in a classroom.

Holy Communion is a central part of the Easter celebration. Usually, the service will last three to four hours.

Afterward, a meal is provided to all. The Easter celebration unites people from various communities as they break bread together. People depart for their homes around 1 p.m., marking the end of celebrations.

Hungary: In the Obuda United Methodist tradition, we have an evening worship on Good Friday and share the Lord's Supper.

At sunrise on Easter, 20 to 30 congregants walk up to an ancient stone cross on a hill rock depicting Calvary's stations. We worship, read liturgy, stand in a circle, read Bible verses and pray together.

In most cases, when we celebrate Easter, it will be raining

or foggy. The Easter event is an energizing one for (people of all ages). Together, we enjoy a prepared breakfast at the church. Easter services follow in the afternoon.

Malawi: Easter celebrations are not identical in all local churches. Each congregation celebrates in a unique way.
