


## **World Communion Sunday**

The first Sunday in October is always designated as World Communion Sunday. Christians around the world take Ho-

ly Communion at their places of worship, a celebration of the sacrament that reminds us that we are all sinners saved by God's grace, and that forgiveness of our sins is a gift God gives to all without favoritism. God invites everyone to accept Jesus as Lord and Savior, believing that his death on the cross paid the penalty for our sin and brings to us the hope of salvation.

When we profess faith and are baptized, we become part of Christ's universal church – the



Communion of Saints. There are many different ways to take the Sacrament of Holy Communion, but when we come to the table of forgiveness we are all remembering that God's love is greater than our sin. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believes in him shall have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." John 3:16-17

World Communion Sunday reminds us that we are part of a big family. One of my clergy colleagues is from Korea. He celebrates communion in Ohio as his biological family is taking communion on the other side of the world. We all worship the same God and do our small part to witness to our faith in the Body of Christ.

As we share communion on World Communion Sunday, you are invited to envision all believers in the world joining hands in one common band of fellowship. You are part of that worldwide community of faith.

The pantry has ready access to food staples but struggles to maintain non-food items for their clients. This is one optional choice for your extended giving. We will keep a container in the entryway to collect supplies.

- October-November-December: Paper products like toilet paper & paper towels, etc.
- January-February-March: Personal Care items like deodorant, shampoo, toothpaste, etc.
- April-May-June: Baby care items like diapers, wipes, formula, etc.
- July-August-September: Cleaning products like floor cleaners, dusting spray, window wash solution, etc.

## Back to School Supplies— Thanks!




## The Gift of Hope



### **Trustee Report:**

◆ The hedge along the alley has been cleaned out and trimmed.

- ◆ Third street door frame and the transit have been painted and finish trim added to complete the install. Still no word on the balance of the install yet to be billed.
- We are looking into a possible service contract for all heating/cooling units hopefully to prevent unexpected expenses.
- Front doors of the church were sanded and scraped, and two coats of marine poly applied to protect them until they can be professionally refinished.
- The old chairlift was removed from the front steps Sept 12, 2022, Jim Martin will get a standard handrail put up temporarily. When I return in October, I will research duplicating the original style handrail. I'm hoping a historical re-store, the Wooden Nickel, in Cincinnati May offer some insight. They handle architectural artifacts, trims, and moldings.

**Membership Report:** From July through September 11, worship attendance averaged 63. The highest attendance has


been 79 during this timeframe, on September 11.

**Finance Committee Notes** for Church Council Monday, September 19, 2022

1) To facilitate Snack Pack purchases, Financed Committee approved a motion to issue two credit cards issued to the CO-Mission

- 2) Treasurer, Tami Chamberlain, will review Vision 2, another giving platform like WeShare. This new service might have more options and could be cheaper.
- Finance Committee approved a motion for Theresa, administration assistant to update the Church's copier lease to increase the number of color copies allowed monthly.
- Finance Committee discussed filing for grant to install various handicapped aids such as wheel chair lifts etc. There is not enough time to file for 2022, however, looking for potential items if the grant is offered again in 2023.
- Finance Committee discussed removing John Lass as a Line of Credit signer, as he has moved to Orange Beach Alabama. Also, since two signers are required to be present if funds are withdrawn from the Line of Credit, we are planning on adding two additional Line of Credit signers who will not be traveling during the month of February each year.
- 6) The 2023 Church Financial budget starts this month and we will be handing out some financial reports to aid in reviewing expenses incurred January thru August 2023. Please contact Tami Chamberlain or myself if you need some additional information. We would like to complete this 2023 Budget in November.

#### CHRISTIAN JUDGEMENT & THE BLESSING OF GRACE BY JOSEPH YOO

Certainly, I cannot be the only Christian who looks at some words of Jesus and sighs, "My faith journey would be so much easier if Jesus never said this!" Right?

I suspect, though, if I started making a list of Things I Wish Jesus Never Said, it would consist of most of the Gospels.



We might pass judgement on others to hide something in ourselves.

Simply put: following Jesus is simple, but it's not easy.

One of the things I wish Jesus didn't flat out say was "Don't judge" (Matthew 7:1). Because, I do judge people.

I spent the most formative parts of my childhood living in the South where the phrase "bless your/his/her/their heart

(s") was engrained in me. The phrase is a "nice" way to

pass on your judgment:
"Bless her heart, but she's not the sharpest tool in the shed."

"Bless his heart, but not even a mother could love that face."

"Bless their hearts. At least they tried."

The desire to judge my fellow human beings always lurks should help one another when we can. Just because within my heart and conscience. And sometimes, it can feel good to pass judgment (albeit silently). That tendency is a defect in the factory settings of humanity and not just me, right?

#### Why do we judge?

Perhaps it stems for our very own insecurity and the things we fear we may lack so it helps us to establish ourselves over others — to secure "a spot" in this world.

Jesus tells us (in Luke 18:10-14) that a Pharisee and a tax collector went to pray at the temple and the Pharisee stood up and prayed: "God, I thank you that I'm not like everyone else—crooks, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week. I give a tenth of The more I intentionally look for the image of Christ in everything I receive."

It's easy to say, "well he's a pompous, self-righteous jerk... bless his heart."

However...

If we're honest with ourselves — while maybe we don't pray like that — there are times we've had such sentiments lurking in our hearts.

I don't think Jesus slams the door completely on judgment by saying that we shouldn't have high standards for ourselves and those others. After all, he leaves an

opening for us to help our neighbor with the splinter in their eye after we remove the log in ours.

#### Withholding judgment

Jesus tells us to not judge because judging may make us feel morally superior and cause us to elevate ourselves higher and higher via our moral Tower of Babel, unseating God and placing ourselves on God's chair. Jesus also tells us not to judge because of what we do to people after we deem they don't measure up: We cast them aside. We belittle them. We dehumanize them. We burden them with things to do/accomplish/achieve to meet our standards so that they can be "accepted."

It'd be one thing if that's what God did. But God doesn't do that.

Since Hurricane people of Puerto Rico have been



Now, five years later, the next big storm has come.

Hurricane Fiona, while less powerful than Maria, dumped as much as 31 inches of rain on towns and villages across Puerto Rico. Widespread flooding swept away bridges, damaged homes, stripped pavement off roads, and left millions without drinking water. The electric grid, which took almost a year to fully repair after

Maria, is still down for more than half of the island.

Already, the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico - under the leadership of newly elected Bishop Lizzette Gabriel Montalvo – has begun to assess the damage and assist those in need. But follow-



ing a hurricane that caused an estimated \$10 billion of damage to Puerto Rico alone, they need our help.
