During this "Do Unto Others" campaign, we will unpack the instructions given by Jesus and apply them in pragmatic ways in our homes, families, neighborhoods, workplaces, and wherever we find ourselves engaged in a challenging exchange of ideas. We will have yard signs promoting kindness to display in our yards, "Love Your Neighbor" kits that challenge us to 52 weeks of action steps, a "Discovery Plan" that showcases a new way of reading Bible stories to enhance understanding, and a "Love Your Neighbor Map" that suggests tangible ways of connecting with those who are yet to become friends.

I am excited about this series. Our country is in dire need of Christians who will choose a different approach focused on building relationships rather than name-calling and divisive actions.


you have an area of ministry that you'd like to explore, talk to Pastor Laura before that date. It takes all members of the Body of Christ to fulfill the mission of the church.




Grandparent's Sunday

Then Debra Lindholm contacted us with an offer to serve the Community Dinner on the fourth Tuesday of each month. Although her food truck is called the "Coffee Collab," she serves pizza and other delicious meals. Franklin First is able to provide Debra will a small amount of funding, a blessing from the Great Miami River District grant we receive. St. Paul's Lutheran Church will

still be serving Community Dinners on the second and third Tuesdays monthly.

Girl Scout Bronze Award

On Sunday August 25, Gracie Lucas and two of her Scouting friends Katie and Elizabeth presented their "blessing bags" work to the congregation to achieve their Bronze Award, the first tier of awards in the highest level of Girl Scouts. The girls explained that the bags contain personal care items to enrich the lives of recipients. They brought their first installment of 20 bags, and plan to supply up to 200 bags by the end of December. The bags will be available to guests who visit our community meals, medical clinic, Angel Shop, other outreach services, and those who just stop by the church in need of assistance. The ever-



generous Franklin First congregation collected \$205 to give the girls seed money for their project. We love supporting our kids in their endeavors! If you have small personal care items (like toothpaste and toothbrush or hair care, etc.) that you think would be appropriate additions to their bags, the girls are accepting donations. Drop them by the church office.



Gerke Elementary Tutoring

Our tutoring program will happen again this fall with first grade students as we help them with their literacy skills. Franklin Schools have reorganized their system, and we are grateful for this partnership with Gerke and Principal Jim Rhoades. We do not know an exact start date, as the reorganization has shuffled things up and Mr. Rhoades is putting details together on his end. We do expect to tutor again on Thursdays after school. We will update you with details ASAP. If you plan to tutor again this year

or would like to come on board as a new tutor, please talk to Linda Smith, Karen Anderson, or Pastor Laura immediately. Background checks and Safe Sanctuary training are mandatory for new tutors.



Weekend Snack Pack Program

Our Snack Pack program will provide blessings for first grade students at Gerke Elementary. Pastor Laura attended the Gerke open house to invite signups and share about the program. Families can sign up to receive a weekend supply of shelf stable items. Our start date is to be determined, as signups are still in process. We are grateful for the grant from our UMC district to help offset the cost of this ministry, but it does not cover all the needs. If you would like to donate, you can designate your gift to the Snack Pack ministry or bring shelf stable food items to the church. The bags are packed on Wednesdays at 1:30, and new packers are always welcome.



Free Medical Clinic

Our Free Medical Clinic continues to operate on Tuesday evenings with registration from 5:30 – 6:30. Dr. Chamberlain and his volunteer staff

serve clients who have no insurance or are underinsured. The Clinic was abundantly blessed again this year with another grant funded by our local Rotary Club and the greater Rotary organization. Again, spread the word that this wonderful health care opportunity is available.

Bishop Palmer Announces "New Era of Church Planting"

Greetings, dear friends in Christ Jesus.

One of the great joys I have had serving you in this role is dreaming about, collaborating on and saying YES to launching new congregations and faith communities. All of this is done to help us fulfill the mission of **making disciples of Jesus**Christ for the transformation of the world. I am delighted to have one more opportunity to this end.

The Mason United Methodist Church reached its end with singular faith and dignity several months ago. The church building and property were just too strategically located to not think and pray about whether or not we were being called to launch something new in that area. Thoughtful use of resources from the Closed Church Fund created space to be able to think and strategize about the best way to respond to a missional opportunity. After a lot of conversation, prayer, data mining, and collaboration, I am delighted to announce to you that we will begin to lay the groundwork this Fall to launch a new United Methodist congregation in Mason, Ohio, making use of the facility and property that was home to the Mason United Methodist Church.

This new church launch in Mason will be done in collaboration with Resurrection, A United Methodist Church with multiple locations in greater Kansas City. This innovative approach between the West Ohio Conference, Great Plains Conference, and Resurrection will enable the new church in Mason to offer the Resurrection experience and access to Resurrection's fruitful track record of intentional disciple-making and missional impact. This marks a significant step in maximizing the strength and resources between conferences, ushering us into a *new era of church planting*.

Effective January 1, 2025, the Reverend Jenn Lucas will be appointed to organize and lead this new work. She will of course have the support of the Bishop and Cabinet as well as the Office of Fresh Starts and New Beginnings. Not later than August 31, I will announce who will be appointed as the next superintendent of the Great Miami River District. Please start now to *pray* for this new ministry and watch for more details as they unfold.

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung Assigned to the Ohio Episcopal Area

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung has been assigned to The Ohio Episcopal Area, including the East and West Ohio Conferences. His assignment will begin September 1, 2024. The announcement was made at the North Central Jurisdictional Conference on July 13.

Bishop Jung is the resident bishop of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and has served in this role since September 2012. He played a key role in Wisconsin's Imagine No Malaria Campaign, raising over \$1 million. He visited every congregation in the annual conference and provided oversight to the planting of over 30 congregations, Under his commitment to increase racial justice and radical inclusion, the Wisconsin Conference has reached 49% of its appointments being served by cross-racial leadership.

Prior to leading the Wisconsin Conference UMC, Bishop Jung served eight years as bishop of the Northern Illinois Conference (Chicago area). He was instrumental in inspiring the Harvest 2020 movement in Northern Illinois, which resulted in many new faith communities. He was committed to immigration justice and the sanctuary movement, and initiated Justice for Our Neighbors (JFON).

Previously, Bishop Jung served as an elder in the Wisconsin Conference, where he was a pastor and a district superintendent. Bishop Jung taught and chaired the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Kangnam University in South Korea. He also served as pastor of congregations in California, Texas, and South Korea.

He has served as president of the General Board of Global Ministries, chair of the UM Korean National Plan, and a member of the Board of Directors for Bread for the World. Bishop Jung serves as a member of the Ecumenical Forum for Korea at Geneva, Switzerland, and is actively involved in Korea peace and reconciliation efforts. He has served as faculty for the Two-Year Academy for Spiritual Formation since 2005 and has taught in various Five-Day Academy sessions in the U.S. and abroad. Previously, Bishop Jung served as president of United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), and as a member of the Board of Directors for the General Board of Discipleship, the UM National Hispanic Plan, the General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, the General Commission on United Methodist Men and JustPeace.

Bishop Jung is currently Adjunct Professor at Yonsei University in South Korea, and Claremont School of Theology.

Bishop Jung earned a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He also holds an M.A. from the Institute of Buddhist Studies, affiliated with the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA; an M.A. from the Dongguk University Graduate School in Seoul, South Korea; and a B.Th. from the Methodist Theological Seminary in Seoul, South Korea.

Im-Hyon, Bishop Jung's spouse, is an elder in the Wisconsin Conference and currently serves as the director of International Relations, Asia & Global Programs, for the Upper Room/ Discipleship Ministries. The Jung's are the parents of two adult sons, Jae-Hugh and Jae-Joon, who is married to Brittney. They are also the proud grandparents of Sydney Grace.

Bishop Gregory V. Palmer has announced the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Suzanne Allen as Great Miami River District Superintendent effective January 1, 2025. This ap-

pointment coincides with the appointment of the current superintendent, Rev. Jenn Lucas to Resurrection Mason.

"I could not be more pleased that Rev. Dr. Suzanne Allen has accepted my invitation to become a conference superintendent assigned to the Great Miami River District," Palmer said. "Suzanne's love for Jesus Christ and The United Methodist Church is obvious through her excellent preaching and her outstanding leadership in the churches she has served and as the Chair of West Ohio's Board of Ordained Ministry. She is one of the most thoughtful people I know."

As one of the Senior Pastors of Hyde Park Community United Methodist Church in Cincinnati, she is both humbled and excited. "I am looking forward to this new opportunity as we move into the next chapter of what it means to be United Methodist in West Ohio. In each of my appointments I have experienced the Holy Spirit working through the Bishop and cabinet as I have stepped into a new role, whether in a local church or extension ministry position," she said.

Suzanne has served churches in the West Ohio Conference since 1998. Her previous appointments include Defiance St. Paul's, Milford Trinity, Springboro First, and the Ohio River Valley District, West Ohio Conference, as an Assistant to the District Superintendent & Regional Missional Specialist.

Although this appointment announcement is being made at the end of Bishop Gregory Vaughn Palmer's assignment in West Ohio, incoming Bishop Hee-Soo Jung is fully aware and supports both of these appointments.

MOVING FROM CONSUMERISM TO COMMITMENT IN FAITH

Rev. Mike Slaughter, the now-retired pastor of Ginghamsburg Church in Ohio, once said "churches have lowered the bar of discipleship for membership." He indicated that church leaders were more eager to fill the pews (and pad our attendance numbers) than cultivate committed followers of Jesus Christ.

Harsh? Maybe. But maybe not harsh enough. Because over the course of the past few decades (maybe), we've been turning our churches into service providers.

WHAT WE LOOK FOR IN CHURCH

People come into church with a consumerist mentality and churches, afraid of losing people (and the metrics of attendance and giving they bring), try to meet the demands of these consumers.

"I want a church with great preaching."

"I want a church with an active singles ministry."

"I want a church with a strong children's program."

"I want a church with good worship and great music."

Do you see what all that has in common? The self.

Please, don't get me wrong. It's not altogether bad to look for things like that when looking for a faith community or church. The thing is, too many of us don't grow out of consuming church.

Ask any pastor and they'll tell you how so many people want something but nobody wants to be part of the team to make it happen.

Once, someone asked me why our church didn't have a particular ministry. I offered that we could start it together, and that I would help this person recruit to get it going. The ministry seemed like a

passion of theirs. They simply responded, "But then why am I giving offering for y'all's salary if I need to get this rolling?"

I think commitment

to church in this decade begins with de-centering ourselves. We really need to embody the opening sentence from Rick Warren's Purpose Driven Life: It's not about you. Because it's really not.

We gather with the purpose of loving Jesus and serving others. In order to do those both effectively, we have to be sacrificial; we have to embody sacrificial love, the kind that Jesus modeled and practiced.

CONSUMER OR COMMITTED?

At some point, our commitment to church (and more importantly, commitment to follow Jesus) requires us to let go of being a consumer of church and transition into being a servant of Christ. You

can't be both a consumer and a disciple.

This requires us to let go of our preferences for the sake of the gospel; for the sake of the mission of the church you're part of; for the sake of the person who hasn't stepped foot into your church yet.

I think another thing we need to do in our commitment to local church is to invest in the local community. Now, any time a pastors talk about "investing" in a community, you may (instinctively) start rolling your eyes thinking, "Here they go, talking about money. Again." I totally understand the distrust that many have when it comes to money and religion. Too many pastors have violated that trust and have taken advantage of people to line their pockets.

At the same time, Jesus knew the importance of money and talked about money more than anything else in his ministry, outside of the Kingdom of God.

But today, when I talk about investing (yes money is included) it goes beyond investing your hard-earned

income. We need to invest ourselves in our churches. We need to plant deep roots in the church that we have chosen so that we can weather all the storms that come from being in community together.

There will be seasons on our faith journeys when we can't do anything but receive. But like all seasons, that's not a permanent state.

When we're in a position to give ourselves for the sake of the church's mission (which hopefully is aligned with the message of Jesus' Gospel), we need to give ourselves to serve and love our neighbors. That looks different for different people.

If you are already part of a church community, what are ways that you can serve? How can you be more involved than just showing up to worship? What steps can you take move away from being a consumer of Christianity to a disciple of Christ?

If you are in a season, where you need all the help you can get — I hope your community is there to help you; nurse you; strengthen you; bring you hope and peace and joy. If you find yourself in a position to serve and give, I hope that you love and serve in the best to your capacity.
